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Letter from the Director...

In 2008, we report on 2007 domestic violence data and present a special supplement on long-awaited findings regarding sentencing in felony domestic violence cases. Approximately 15% of felony domestic violence cases from 2000-2005 statewide were dismissed, 58% of defendants received probation, 27% received a jail or prison sentence and the average sentence served after partial suspensions was 23 months. The study, *Sentencing in Felony Domestic Violence Cases* conducted by the New Mexico Sentencing Commission also examines victim/offender relationship, offender characteristics, incident characteristics, and sentencing considerations that we think you will find most interesting. You will find the full study presented in the *Special Supplement* section following the *Executive Summary*.

As usual, law enforcement reported domestic violence incidents are captured, as well as domestic violence reports from service providers throughout the state. Additionally, findings on new filings and disposed domestic violence cases in statewide district and magistrate courts are presented. Findings on all these data are reported in *Section One*.

In *Section Three*, you can see at a glance, county trends on 15 important domestic violence variables.

In 2007, we welcomed participation from the greatest number of law enforcement agencies in the history of the Central Repository (104). On behalf of myself and the Office of Injury Prevention, we thank you for persevering and continuing your work to identify, appropriately respond to, and document domestic violence cases in our state. We are pleased to report to you the extent, and in some cases, the outcomes of your efforts. We hope that you find the report helpful in your work and useful in any efforts you undertake to secure funds for future prevention, intervention, investigation, or prosecution programs.

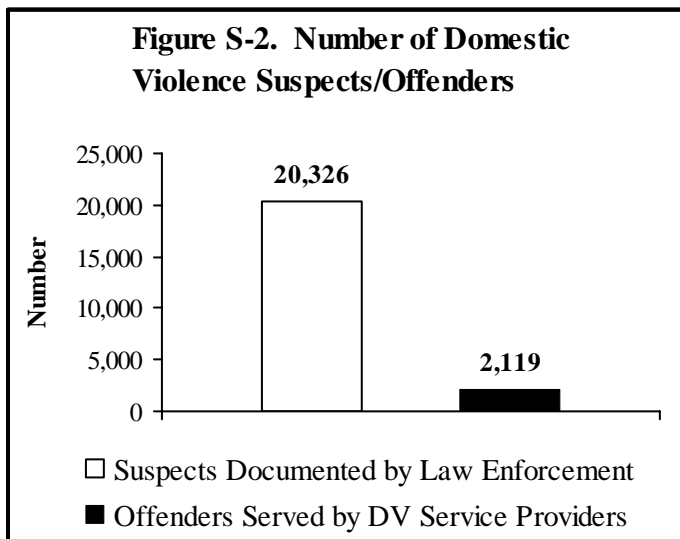
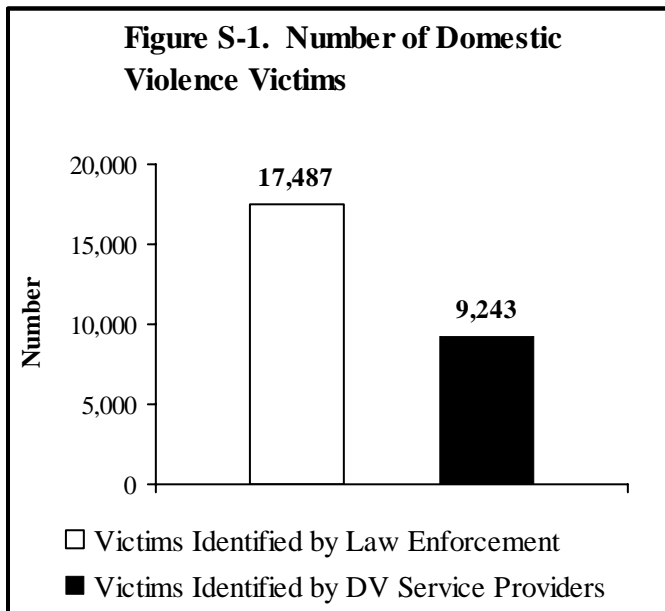

Domestic Violence in New Mexico 2007 Highlights

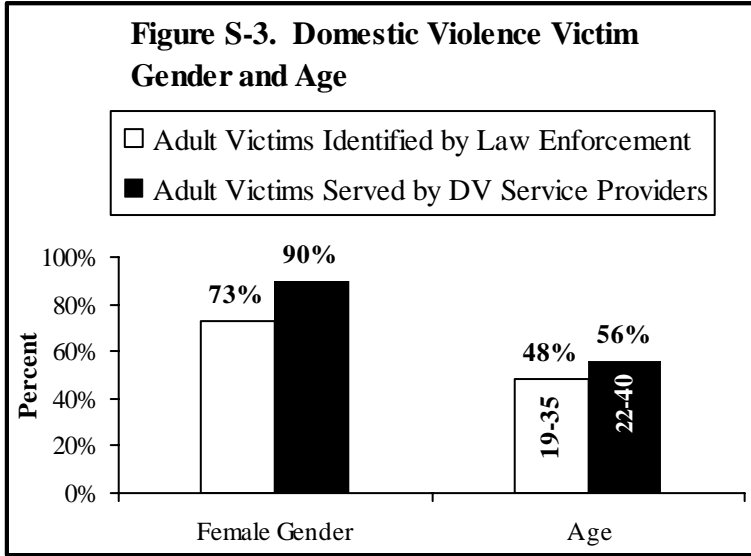

A. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE INCIDENCE

- The Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico (SVV) conducted in 2005 found that 1 in 4 New Mexican adults are victims of domestic violence in their lifetime. For the year, the survey estimated 201,267 incidents of domestic violence perpetrated upon 36,594 victims. In 2007, reports from law enforcement identified 22,286 domestic violence incidents perpetrated upon 17,487 victims.
- In 2007, law enforcement identified 162 stalking victims.
- In 2005, the SVV identified 17,177 stalking victims that experienced 245,631 stalking incidents in that year.
- There were 17,457 new clients served by 27 domestic violence service providers across the state; 53% (9,243) were adult victims, 35% (6,095) children, and 12% (2,119) offenders. Law enforcement reports identified 17,487 victims and 20,326 suspects.

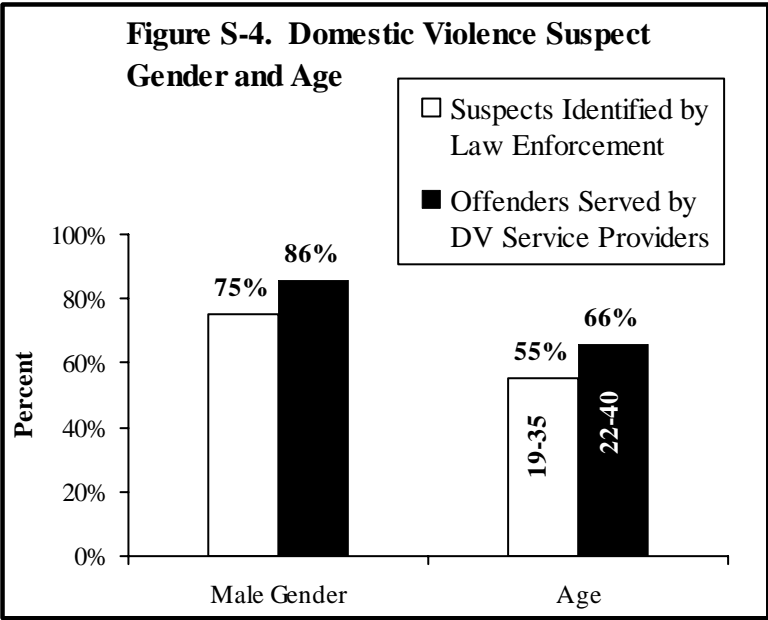


B. VICTIM DEMOGRAPHICS

➤ Approximately three-quarters (73% or 12,773) of the domestic violence victims identified by law enforcement were female. Ninety percent of the adult-victims served by reporting domestic violence service providers were female. Nationally, more than 960,000 incidents of violence against a current or former spouse, boyfriend or girlfriend

occur each year and about 85% of the victims are women (National Crime Victimization Survey, 1992-1996).

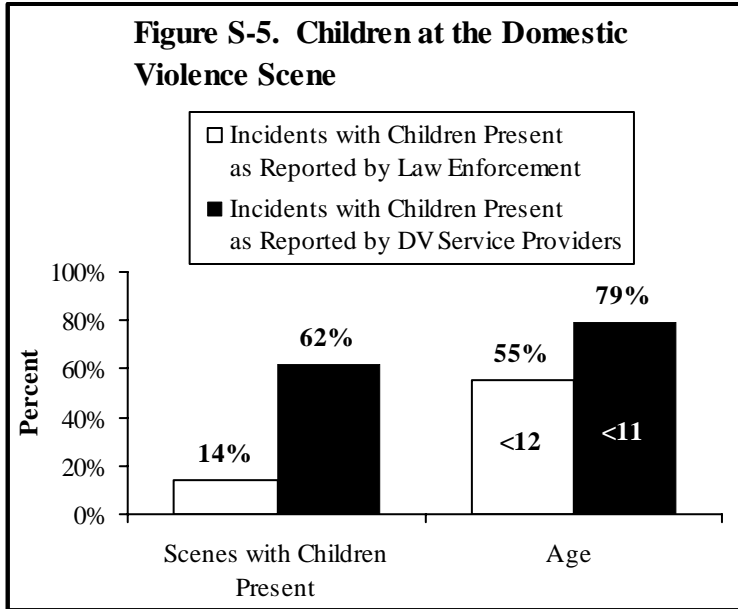
➤ New Mexico victims of domestic violence as reported by law enforcement were predominantly 19-35 years old (48%) and White (non-Hispanic)(46%) and Hispanic (35%). Only Blacks were represented significantly more among victims than their representation in the state population. Similarly, adult victims as reported by domestic violence service providers were predominantly 22-40 years old (56%) and Hispanic (55%) and White (non-Hispanic) (30%). Nationally, women 16-24 experienced the highest rates of intimate victimization (20 per 1000), versus 17 per 1000 for those 25-34 years of age. Black women nationally, experienced the highest rates of intimate victimization (12 per 1000) compared to Hispanic women (7 per 1000) and White (non-Hispanic) women (8 per 1000), (Violence By Intimates, Bureau of Justice Statistics, March 1998).



C. SUSPECT DEMOGRAPHICS

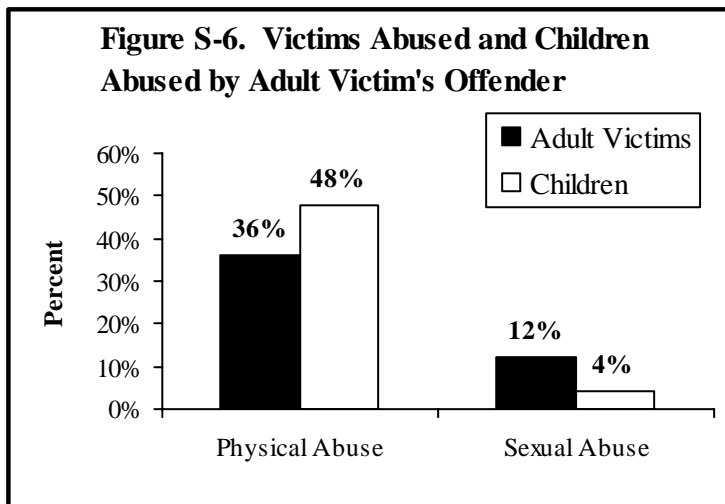
➤ Suspects, as reported by law enforcement, were predominantly White (non-Hispanic) (45%) and Hispanic (36%) males (75%), 19-35 years of age (55%). Offenders, as reported by domestic violence service providers, were predominantly Hispanic (48%) males (86%), 22-40 years of age (66%).

- The SVV found that a disproportionate number of males that were ever victims of stalking (51%), domestic violence (62%) and intimate partner violence (49%) were victimized by a male, as well.



D. CHILDREN VICTIM-WITNESSES DEMOGRAPHICS

- Of 8,089 law enforcement reports that documented the number of incidents with children at the scene, there were 1,108 (14%) incidents where at least one child was present.
- There were 3,184 children present at the scene of domestic violence incidents as reported by law enforcement, and half (55%) of the children who witnessed these incidents were not yet adolescents (12 years and under).



- There were 8,365 domestic violence service provider reports that identified 5,145 (62%) domestic violence incidents where children were present at the scene, for an average of 1 child witness for every 1.6 incidents. Three-quarters (79%) of children victim-witnesses served were under age 12.

- Nationally, more than half of female domestic violence victims live in households

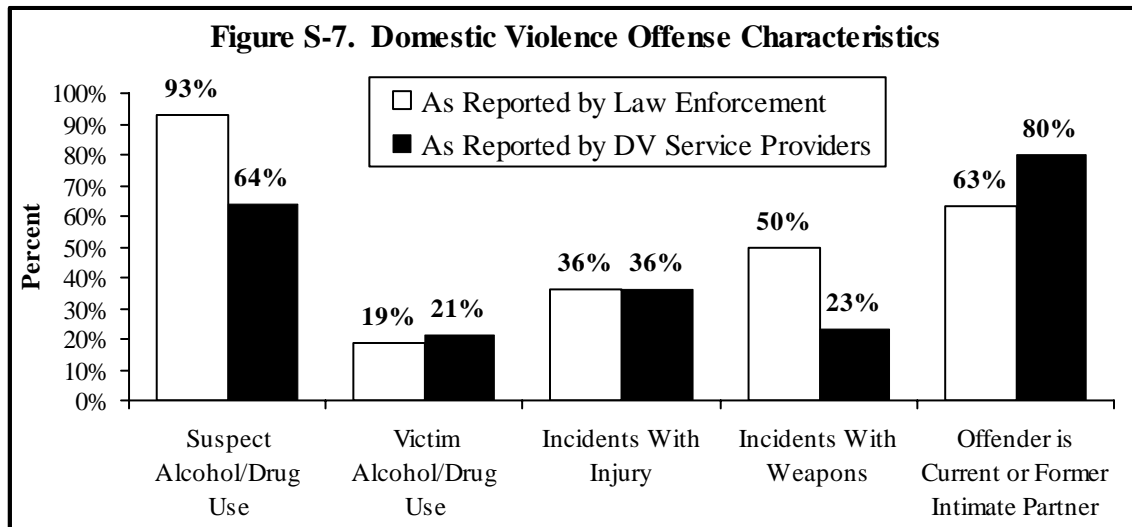
with children under age 12; and 4 in 10 offenders in state prisons for crimes against intimates had an average of 2.2 young children residing with them. (Violence By Intimates, Bureau of Justice Statistics, March 1998).

- In New Mexico, 48% of children victim-witnesses, as reported by domestic violence service providers, experienced *physical* abuse from the current offender of the adult victim, and 4% experienced *sexual* abuse from the current offender of the adult victim.

E. OFFENSE CHARACTERISTICS

1. Alcohol/Drug Use Incidence

- Approximately one-third (37%) of domestic violence cases reported by law enforcement identified *alcohol/drug use*. Of these, 93% involved *suspect* use of alcohol/drugs, and 19% involved *victim* use of alcohol/drugs. These percentages include the 12.5% of cases where both the victim and the suspect were using alcohol/drugs at the time of the domestic assault.
- Alcohol/drugs were used by 21% of *victims* served by domestic violence service providers. Approximately two-thirds (64%) of *offenders* of victims served by providers used alcohol/drugs at the time of the domestic violence incident. Nationally, nearly half the female victims of intimate violence reported that the offender was drinking or using illegal drugs at the time of the crime. This same pattern was found in a national survey of prison inmates, where more than half (55%) of these offenders were drinking or using drugs at the time of the offense, (Violence By Intimates, Bureau of Justice Statistics, March 1998).



2. Weapon Incidence

- A weapon was used in 50% (7,374) of domestic violence cases reported by law enforcement and 23% (1,850) of the cases reported by victims served by domestic violence service providers. The large disparity between weapon-related assaults in domestic violence cases reported by law enforcement and victims may be explained in part, by a difference in perception between the two parties regarding what constitutes a weapon. Police officers guided by state statute regard the use of fists, feet, elbows, etc., as “personal weapons”. Victims may define weapons as objects other than those defined as “personal weapons” by state statute such as a bat, gun, knife, etc.

- The SVV found that 32% of domestic violence, 33% of intimate partner violence and 31% of stalking incidents involve a weapon; and each of these crimes was significantly more likely to involve a weapon if the victim was male, than female: domestic violence (36% male, 30% female); intimate partner violence (41% male, 30% female); and stalking (39% male, 29% female). Among victims of intimate violence nationally, 17% of female victims and 29% of male victims reported that the offender had used a weapon (Violence By Intimates, Bureau of Justice Statistics, March 1998).

3. Injury Incidence

- Approximately one-third (36%) of law enforcement reported domestic violence cases involved injury to the victim. Similarly, 36% of adult victims served by domestic violence service providers reported being physically injured from the domestic assault. The SVV reported that a significant proportion of those who were ever victims of domestic violence (44%), intimate partner violence (47%) and stalking (44%) were injured in their assaults. Nationally, 7 in 10 female victims of intimate violence reported that they were physically attacked. Half (51%) of the female victims of intimate violence were physically injured, (Violence By Intimates, Bureau of Justice Statistics, March 1998).

4. Victim/Offender Relationship

- Current or former boyfriend/girlfriend comprised the victim/offender relationship of 45% of law enforcement reported cases; 18% were a current or former spouse; and 28% other relatives. Current or former boyfriend/girlfriend comprised the victim/offender relationship of 28% of domestic violence service provider reported cases and 52% were former or current spouses. Nationally, 33.9% of victims of prison inmates who experienced an intimate victimization, were spouses. However, national data on ex-spouses was categorized with boyfriend/girlfriend data making meaningful comparisons to the New Mexico data impossible (Violence By Intimates, Bureau of Justice Statistics, March 1998).

5. Domestic Violence and Homicides

- In 2007, there were 178 homicides statewide. Of these, 18% (32) were domestic-related. One-third respectively, of the domestic violence related homicides involved “personal” weapons (feet, fists, knee, belt, etc) (34%) or a firearm (31%). Knives and vehicles were the weapons of choice in 14% of the domestic-related homicides, respectively. An equal proportion (50%) of domestic-related homicide victims were female and male. Husbands (6) committed the most domestic violence homicides, followed by fathers and mothers (4, respectively). Interestingly, the number of domestic violence homicides committed by boyfriends (3) and ex-boyfriends (1) is equal to the number committed by girlfriends (2) and relatives of girlfriends (2).

6. Interpersonal Violence Reported to Law Enforcement

- In 2007, 47% of domestic violence victims who went for help reported their victimization incident to law enforcement. The SVV revealed significant differences in the rate of reporting to law enforcement by the victims of the three types of interpersonal violence crimes: domestic violence (38%), intimate partner violence

(41%), and stalking (34%). Further, the SVV found that domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were more likely to file criminal charges (1 in 7, respectively) than stalking victims (1 in 17). Again, domestic violence and intimate partner violence female victims were two times more likely to file charges than male victims. Conversely, female and male victims of stalking were equally likely to file criminal charges.

7. Rates of Suspect Arrest

- In 2007, 44% of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement resulted in a suspect arrest. The SVV found that arrest rates vary by the type of interpersonal violence crime. While 17%, respectively of domestic violence and intimate partner violence crimes resulted in a suspect arrest, only 5.5% of stalking crimes resulted in a suspect arrest. Moreover, in cases of domestic violence and intimate partner violence, more offender arrests were made when there was a female victim. With stalking crimes, the arrest rate was almost equal for crimes perpetrated against female (6%) and male victims (5%).

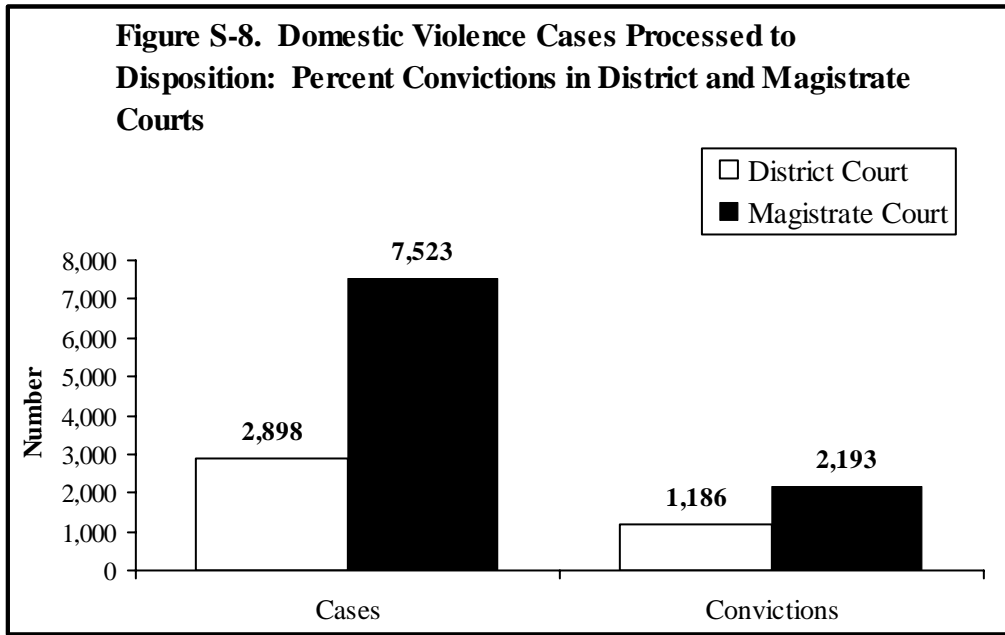
F. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND THE COURTS

1. Protection Orders and New Charges Filed

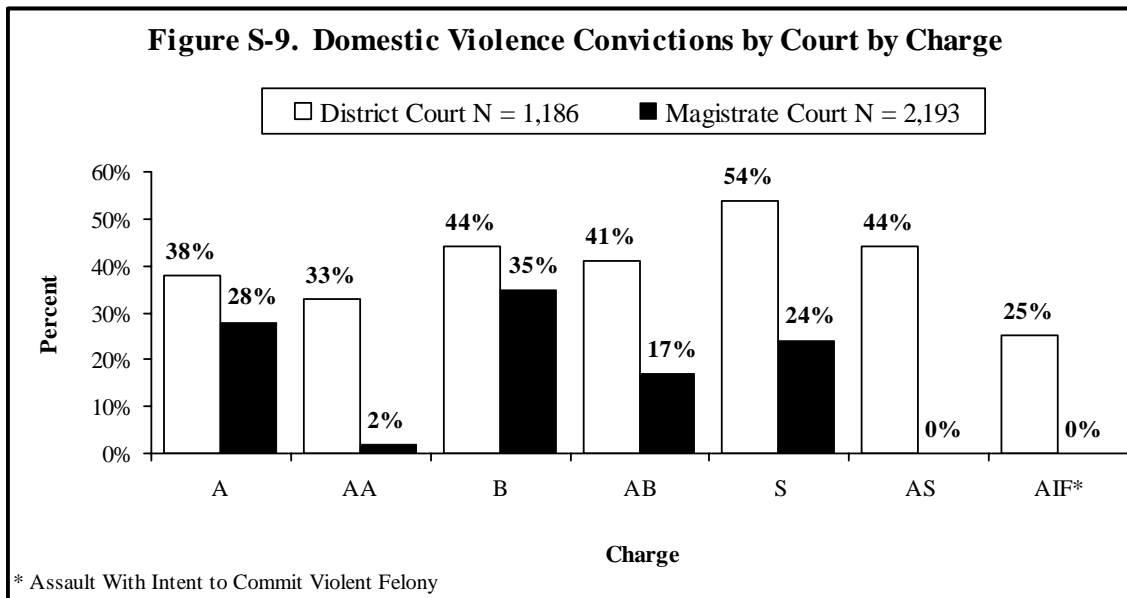
- In 2007, the number of protection or restraining orders issued in the district courts was equal to 20% of the number of domestic violence incidents reported to law enforcement. The SVV revealed similar results, as roughly one-fifth to one-quarter of domestic violence (21%), intimate partner violence (23%) and stalking (26%) victims obtained a restraining order. However, results from the SVV showed that female domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were 2.5 times more likely to obtain a restraining order than their male counterparts. Similarly, female stalking victims were almost two times more likely than males to obtain a restraining order. Furthermore, the SVV found that over half of all restraining orders in interpersonal violence crimes were violated: domestic violence (53.5%); intimate partner violence (56%); and stalking (51%); and restraining orders obtained by male intimate partner violence victims had the highest rate of violation (58%).
- Overall, there were 10,888 domestic violence charges filed in statewide district and magistrate courts, not including the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court, in 2007. This represents 49% of the total number of domestic violence cases reported by law enforcement for the same time period.

2. Dispositions in Interpersonal Violence Crimes

- There were 7,523 domestic violence cases processed to disposition in statewide magistrate courts in 2007. Of these 2,193 (29%) resulted in a conviction.
- There were 2,898 cases of domestic violence processed to disposition in statewide district courts in 2007. Of these 1,186 (41%) resulted in a conviction.



- Of the 2,193 convictions of disposed domestic violence cases in magistrate courts, *battery* had the highest percent of convictions, 35%, followed by *assault* (28%).

- Of the 1,186 convictions of disposed domestic violence cases in the statewide district courts, *stalking* (54%) had the highest conviction rate, followed by *battery and aggravated stalking* (44%, respectively).
- The SVV found that stalking offenders had the fewest outcomes with charges dropped (13%) compared to offenders of domestic violence (25%) and intimate partner

violence (28%). Additionally, stalking offenders had the highest rate of guilty pleas or convictions (51%) over domestic violence offenders (38%) and intimate partner violence offenders (39%). Offenders of each interpersonal violence crime involving a female victim were significantly more likely to plead guilty than offenders of a male victim. The rate of acquittals for offenders of male domestic violence and intimate partner violence were 4 and 5 times, respectively, the rate of offender acquittals for these crimes with a female victim. Conversely, offenders of stalking with a male victim were much less likely to obtain an acquittal (<1%) than stalking offenders with a female victim (5%).

3. Sentencing in Interpersonal Violence Crimes

- The New Mexico Sentencing Commission conducted both, a pilot study of sentencing of felony domestic violence cases in Bernalillo, Cibola, Sandoval, and Valencia Counties and a study of felony domestic violence sentencing in district courts statewide. Their findings are presented in the special supplement to this report, *Sentencing in Felony Domestic Violence Cases*, found in the section that follows.
- The purpose of the pilot study was to determine if the variables that the researcher proposed to collect could be collected from district attorney files. There were 222 cases from 2004 and 2005 analyzed, which included all cases with any domestic violence charge, even if the domestic violence charge was not the most serious in the case. Similarly, there were 2,627 statewide cases analyzed from 2000-2005 from the New Mexico Administrative Office of the Courts, Judicial Information Division (JID).
- Specific variables analyzed in both studies included the most serious charge in the case and case disposition. The pilot study also examined the most serious adjudicated charge in the case; victim/offender relationship; offender characteristics (gender, age, prior criminal history); and several incident characteristics (were children present, was the defendant present when the police arrived, did the victim have obvious physical injuries, and were there adult witnesses). Additionally, the pilot study examined sentencing considerations to determine the impact of *victim cooperation*, the *admission of priors* and *habitual offender* on sentencing outcomes.
- In general, 16% of cases were dismissed in the pilot study and 15% were dismissed in the statewide study. The pilot study showed 16% of convicted offenders of felony domestic violence cases received jail or prison, compared to 27.5% in the statewide study. Two-thirds (68%) of the convicted offenders in the pilot study received probation compared to 60% in the statewide study. The average probation sentence for all defendants who got probations was 26 months in the pilot study and 28 months in the statewide study. Since partial suspensions of jail/prison sentences are common in plea bargaining, the study presents findings on the average jail/prison length and the average partial suspension length per lead charge in the cases studied. The average jail/prison sentence after partial suspension in both the pilot and statewide studies was 23 months (22.3 and 22.67, respectively).
- To review all findings in full detail, please see the special supplement found in the following section of this report.
- The SVV found that roughly two-thirds of all those sentenced for interpersonal violence crimes were sentenced to jail or prison. The average sentence length for

convicted domestic violence offenders (3.04 years) was longer than that of intimate partner violence offenders (2.7 years) and stalking offenders (1.97 years). Domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders received a longer average sentence when the victim was a female, while stalking offenders received a slightly longer average sentence when the victim was a male. Offenders sentenced for stalking a male victim actually served a longer average sentence (2.0 years) than offenders sentenced for intimate partner violence with a male victim (1.5 years).

G. IMPLICATIONS OF THE FINDINGS

1. Underreporting of Interpersonal Violence and Law Enforcement Procedural Training

- In 2007, law enforcement identified 17,487 victims from 22,286 reported incidents of domestic violence. The SVV identified almost twice as many victims (36,594) and each experienced an average of 5.5 incidents in the previous year. Similarly, in 2007 law enforcement identified 162 stalking victims. The SVV identified 17,177 victims and each experienced an average of 14.3 incidents last year. There are numerous administrative and procedural issues that affect accurate reporting of domestic violence and stalking incidents ranging from whether and how police offense incident reports are written, how these reports are entered into law enforcement databases or otherwise counted, what aggregate information is submitted to the Central Repository and how information is entered into the Central Repository. The issues surrounding identification of stalking incidents and victims are particularly worrisome. The SVV demonstrated that while one-third of stalking victims reported their experience to law enforcement, there were significantly fewer arrests for stalking (5.5%) than for domestic and intimate partner violence (17% respectively). It is imperative to provide necessary training to all law enforcement officers, administrative personnel, and executive personnel whose policies guide law enforcement procedure regarding the description, documentation and data entry of interpersonal violence crimes.

2. Underreporting of Interpersonal Violence: Law Enforcement Interpersonal Violence Training, Victim Education and Advocacy, and Healthcare Surveillance

- Incidents of domestic violence go unreported to law enforcement due to refusal of family, friends, or neighbors to report. Furthermore, as many as 53% (4,436) of the adult victims who sought services from domestic violence service providers claimed they did not report their incident to law enforcement. This is similar to the 50% of adult victims who report their crime to law enforcement nationally. Nationally, most victims (15.4%) who do not report said they considered the victimization a *private or personal matter*. However, only slightly fewer victims (13.2%) did not report because they were *afraid of retaliation* by the offender, *believed that the police would do nothing* (7.3%), or *did not consider the incident was important enough* to report it to police (4.4%). These findings have implications regarding the need for prevention and treatment strategies that include law enforcement training on the dynamics of domestic violence, and victim training on adopting a safety plan and legal advocacy.
- Patients that are seen in the healthcare/emergency room setting with a domestic violence- and stalking-related injury are typically not reported to law enforcement and represent an additional area of underreporting. While many healthcare facilities use screening tools to identify patients who are victims of domestic violence, no

standardized monitoring system to reliably document the number of these individuals currently exists. Methods to determine healthcare utilization by victims of interpersonal violence through e-codes or billing databases have been unsuccessful and are unreliable at best, due to definitional problems of the codes, practitioner discretion and inconsistencies in naming injuries, and the insurance related intentions of billing databases. The need to rectify these problems is underscored by findings from the SVV which revealed substantial co-morbidity with interpersonal violence victims with regard to serious disabling injury and chronic mental health problems. Additionally, one-third to one-half of interpersonal violence victims were injured and over one-third of them sought medical treatment. Increased accuracy in reporting interpersonal violence incidents and identifying victims for referral to needed interventions requires interpersonal violence surveillance initiatives in New Mexico healthcare facilities.

3. Interpersonal Violence Prevention Aimed At Adolescents

- In 2007, of the 14,863 law enforcement incidents documenting the victim/offender relationship, 61% were perpetrated by a current or former intimate partner, 42% of these by current or former boyfriends/girlfriends who are or were dating or living together. Ninety-percent of adult victims who sought services from a domestic violence service provider were assaulted by a current or former intimate partner, 28% of these were dating or living together. The SSV found that two-thirds (66.5%) of domestic violence incidents were perpetrated by current or former intimate partners, one-third of these were dating or living together. Similarly, stalking behaviors begin in adolescents and the incidence of adolescent stalking is almost twice that of adolescent intimate partner violence. The high proportion of interpersonal violence cases perpetrated by those not yet married, demonstrate that true prevention requires early education initiatives on building healthy relationships during adolescence.

4. Alcohol and Drug Education and Treatment in the Prevention of Domestic Violence

- In 2007, alcohol and/or other drug use was documented in 37% of law enforcement incidents, 93% of these involved *suspect* use of alcohol/drugs, and 19% involved *victim* use of alcohol/drugs. Additionally, 21% of adult victims served by domestic violence service providers reported being under the influence of alcohol/drugs at the time of their incident. Findings from the SVV revealed that alcohol/drug use is significantly more likely among male victims and offenders than female victims and offenders. Implications for treatment for both victims and offenders include alcohol and drug prevention education and rehabilitation services with particular focus on males.

5. Stopping The Cycle of Domestic Violence: Helping Children from Violent Families

- On average in New Mexico, 1 in every 7 incidents of domestic violence reported by law enforcement involved a child witness and an average of two children were present at each. Of greater frequency, at least one child was present in 1 out of every 1.6 adult victim cases handled by domestic violence service providers. Too many children experienced physical abuse (48%) and sexual abuse (4%) at the hands of their adult-victim's offender. To be sure, the rates of physical and sexual abuse among these children and their national counterparts is grossly underreported. Even so, the information regarding children victim-witnesses is particularly disturbing since

research demonstrates that a significant number of children who witness their mothers being abused by their fathers suffer from anxiety and depression and act out with their parents and siblings. Additionally, children who witness abuse suffer poor health, low self-esteem, poor impulse control, sleeping difficulties, and feelings of powerlessness. Furthermore, they are at high risk for alcohol and drug use, sexual acting out, running away from home, isolation, loneliness, fear, and suicide.

- Perhaps the percent of *adult victims* (58%) and *offenders* (63%) in New Mexico who were *abused as children* is a testament to the validity of such research regarding the negative consequences of experiencing abuse in the home as a child. Since 79% of the children present at the scene of the incident (as reported by domestic violence service providers) were under the age of 13, there is a need for early identification, education, and therapeutic interventions for children living in violent families.

6. Interpersonal Violence Advocacy and Prevention

- In New Mexico in 2007, 27% of domestic violence victims identified by law enforcement were males. Findings from the SVV demonstrated that 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, 1 in 10 a victim of intimate partner violence and 1 in 14 a victim of stalking. More outreach must be done to identify male victims of interpersonal violence to offer prevention and treatment programs specific to males.

7. Providing Offender Treatment Programs

- In New Mexico, 75% of suspects identified by law enforcement and 86% of offenders identified by domestic violence service providers are *male*. Findings from the SVV revealed that 83% of stalking offenders and 80% of domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders respectively, are male. Even when males are the victims in interpersonal violence crimes, half to two-thirds are being victimized by a male. Perhaps greater outcomes in domestic violence prevention may be realized through greater availability of offender prevention and therapeutic programs that include strategies for addressing aggression in male socialization.
- Findings from the SVV reveal that almost half of the adults in New Mexico who were ever a victim of domestic violence, intimate partner violence or stalking were also sexually assaulted. This suggests that effective prevention and treatment programs for interpersonal violence must include components of sexual assault prevention and treatment or must provide referrals to appropriate sexual assault services.

8. Interpersonal Violence and Needed Changes in Law Enforcement, Prosecution and The Courts To Reduce The Risk of Harm for Male and Female Victims

- Findings from the SVV demonstrate that female victims are more likely than male victims to report their offense, two times more likely to file criminal charges against their offenders and are more likely to get a restraining order against their offenders, even though interpersonal crimes with male victims involve more alcohol/drugs, weapon use and more serious disabling injury. Additionally, while half of all restraining orders are violated, male victims of intimate partner violence crimes are more likely to have a restraining order violated, less likely to have their offenders

arrested, and significantly more likely that the charges against their offenders will be dropped or the offenders will obtain an acquittal. Further, if their offenders are convicted, offenders of male victims are more likely to serve less time in jail or prison than offenders of female victims.

- While all of the system failures that contribute to the high risk of harm for female victims of interpersonal violence were widely known, it is clear from these findings that interpersonal violence is dangerous for males, as well. While both genders do not utilize system protections as they should, male victims are even less likely than female victims to do so; and even when system protections are sought for intimate partner violence, violations of restraining orders are more frequent and convictions of their offenders less frequent for male victims. All of this speaks to: 1) the need for early education to correct misconceptions in gender socialization; 2) greater community education to increase awareness of the incidence and risk of interpersonal violence among males; 3) comprehensive training of law enforcement, prosecutors and judges regarding the high risk of harm for men and women victims of interpersonal violence and the development of protocols in their respective disciplines aimed at reducing the likelihood of harm, disability and death of all interpersonal violence victims.

9. Developing Appropriate Interpersonal Violence Prevention Programs with Gender, Race/Ethnicity, and Education Considerations

- Beliefs about personal safety for women, one's own personal safety and the likelihood of carrying something to protect oneself differ based on one's gender, education level and race/ethnicity. The higher the education level, the more likely females are to: 1) believe that personal safety for women today has gotten worse since they were children; 2) be somewhat or very concerned about their own personal safety; and 3) carry something with them to defend themselves or to alert other people. Fewer males, than females of every education level believe that personal safety for women has gotten worse. Indeed, more high school males believe that personal safety for women has improved.
- While more Whites (non-Hispanic) (53%) and Blacks (56%) believe that personal safety for women today has gotten worse, more American Indians (53%) are somewhat or very concerned about their own personal safety. Interestingly, there is a significant disconnect between Hispanic males and females regarding the personal safety for women today. The greatest proportion of Hispanic females (44%) report that personal safety for women today has gotten worse, while the greatest proportion of Hispanic males (40%) report that it has improved. More male (45%) and female (43%) respondents of mixed race/ethnicity carry something to defend themselves than respondents of other races/ethnicities, followed by White (non-Hispanic) females (36%) and American Indian males (33%).
- Since more females than males of every race/ethnicity are victims of interpersonal violence crimes, it is not surprising that more females, than males are concerned about their own personal safety. However, except for White (non-Hispanic) females, this does not result in the adoption of a protective behavior. Indeed, more males than females of every other race/ethnicity carry something to defend themselves. The implications regarding the differences in one's beliefs based on education, race and gender are unclear. However, more sensitivity to these distinctions in beliefs needs to be addressed in interpersonal violence prevention programs.

Sentencing in Felony Domestic Violence Cases

INTRODUCTION

Domestic violence is a significant problem in New Mexico. Each year several legislative proposals are introduced in the New Mexico State Legislature to enhance penalties for offenders who commit domestic violence. Notwithstanding public concern and legislative interest, little is known about domestic violence cases in New Mexico beyond incidence statistics. The New Mexico Interpersonal Violence Data Central Repository serves as a clearinghouse for law enforcement, service provider, and court information for the state. In 2005, the Department of Health, Office of Injury Prevention obtained funding to conduct the Survey of Violence Victimization. This survey provides more detailed information regarding the prevalence of domestic violence in New Mexico including some statistics regarding sentencing (Caponera, 2007). Sentencing in New Mexico has not been widely studied. Courts maintain an electronic record of the disposition and sentence in all cases, however other factors that may affect the outcome of a case are only maintained in paper form by other criminal justice agencies.

In 2006 the New Mexico Crime Victims Reparations Commission issued a request for proposal to award S.T.O.P. Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Grant monies to study sentencing in felony domestic violence cases. The New Mexico Sentencing Commission (NMSC) was awarded the sub grant. One of the conditions of the grant was that an advisory group be formed to recommend and approve the approach of the study.

Since sentencing in these types of cases had not been previously studied, one of the goals of the study was to determine which criminal justice agencies had the data elements needed. With limited funding it was decided by the project's advisory group to pursue two initial approaches that focused on information maintained by District Attorneys and District Courts.

METHODOLOGY

With regard to information available from District Attorneys, NMSC staff approached the District Attorneys in the Second District (Bernalillo county) and the Thirteenth District (Cibola, Sandoval, and Valencia counties) to seek their cooperation to review case files. Both districts agreed to participate. A data collection form was developed with assistance from the Second District Attorney Domestic Violence Division. The following variables were collected:

- Names of offender and victim
- Offender DOB
- Court filing date
- Court closing date
- Arrest characteristics
- Victim/Offender relationship
- Disposition
- Sentence
- Probation conditions
- Victim cooperation

Prior criminal history and protective order information was looked up using public resources available from the courts and the New Mexico Justice Information Sharing Council.

Case Selection

The purpose of the study was a pilot effort to determine if we could collect all the variables that we proposed from District Attorney files. To that end, cases were selected from a dataset made available to the NMSC by the New Mexico Administrative Office of the Courts, Judicial Information Division (JID). Cases with any domestic violence charge in the case were isolated. The sentencing information for the statewide data was also compiled from this file.

The dataset does not contain filing dates or disposition dates, however from the case numbers we were able to determine the year that the case was filed. For

Bernalillo County, we selected cases that were filed in 2005. For Cibola, Sandoval, and Valencia counties, we selected cases that were filed in 2004 and 2005. Table 1 contains the number of cases per county.

NMSC staff traveled to offices in Albuquerque, Bernalillo and Belen to collect data from files. Cases from Cibola were included in the study although since the number of files was small (10) we did not collect data from the files.

Of the 212 cases selected in Albuquerque, Bernalillo and Belen, we collected information on 72% of cases. In some cases we were not able to obtain and review the file because it had already been archived and in other cases the office was unable to find the court case number in their information system. The list of cases was derived from court case numbers. The district attorneys maintain a separate numbering system and store the court case number as well for cross referencing proposes.

FINDINGS

In the analysis below, we first describe the data we were able to collect on all 222 cases. We then narrow to cases for which we were able to obtain and review district attorney files.

Charges

Table 2 reports the most serious charge in the case. The charges have been recoded into 13 categories. The types of charges vary widely. The most common charge was aggravated battery against a household member (HHM) (all subsections of NMSA 30-3-16) (35.1%) followed by aggravated assault HHM (17.6%). The most common degree of charge that offenders were charged with was a third degree felony (35.6%).

Table 3 looks at the overall case disposition. In 16.4% of cases, all charges were dismissed. Nearly 84% of cases resulted in a conviction meaning either a

probation or jail/prison sentence. In 67.7% of cases offenders were placed on probation. Suspended sentences, deferred sentences and conditional discharges usually carry probation terms. The most common case disposition was a suspended sentence (32.7%). A suspended sentence occurs when a judge gives a jail or prison sentence and then suspends the entire sentence contingent on the offender's successful completion of probation for usually the same period of time. The next most common dispositions were deferred sentences (17.7%) and conditional discharges (17.3%). A deferred sentence is similar to a suspended sentence however after successfully completing probation the offender can request that the court dismiss the charge. In both a deferred and suspended sentence there is an adjudication

of guilt. In a conditional discharge an offender also is required to complete a term of probation, however there is no adjudication of guilt and after a successful completion of probation the charge does not appear on the offender’s record.

Nearly 16% of offenders received either a jail or a prison sentence. Eight percent of offenders received a jail sentence and 7.7% received a prison sentence.

The percentage of offenders that receive a jail/prison sentence may seem small; however, in conversations with officials from district attorney offices getting an offender on probation is seen as an effective way of getting an offender under the supervision of the court. If a violation occurs during the probation term an offender faces the possibility of the probation being revoked and the original sentence being imposed. Additionally attorneys in the Second District Attorney’s office routinely add special conditions in addition to the regular probation conditions in the plea agreement that become part of the judgment and sentence. Of the 96 cases with probation sentences reviewed in Bernalillo county; 60% of the offenders were required to get anger management training , 57% were required to go to domestic violence counseling, 67% were required to be assessed and/or get alcohol or drug treatment, and 43% were required to attend any programs that Adult Probation and Parole deemed necessary.

Table 4 looks at the most serious adjudicated charge in the case. The most common convicted charge was

aggravated battery HHM (29.6%) followed by battery HHM (27.4%).

Table 5 lists the total number of offenders by the overall case disposition collapsed into three categories. The highest percentage of offenders received a probation term (67.7%). Approximately 16% of offenders’ cases were either dismissed or they received a jail/prison term.

Determinants of Overall Case Disposition

Due to the small number of cases, we were not able to create a regression model that simultaneously looked at the effect of prior criminal history, offender characteristics, incident characteristics, and sentencing characteristics. In subsequent studies we plan on creating this type of a model, but for the purposes of the current study the effect of these factors are looked at individually.

Prior Criminal History

For each offender, we looked for other court cases they had prior to this case. We only identified cases and did not determine if the offender was convicted. We grouped cases in the following crime categories: Drug, DWI, Person, Property, Violent, and Domestic Violence. Patterns did emerge with some case types and dispositional categories. Offenders with a DWI case were more likely to get a jail/prison sentence on their domestic violence case though the relationship was not statistically significant. Twenty percent of offenders with a prior DWI case got a jail/prison sentence compared to 14% who did not have a prior DWI case. Offenders with a prior person crime case were more likely to get a jail/prison sentence and the relationship was statistically significant. Nearly 30% of offenders with a person crime prior case got a jail/prison sentence compared to 10.7% of offenders who did not have a prior person crime case.

Offenders with a prior property crime or a prior domestic violence crime were less likely to get probation, however the split between having their case entirely dismissed and jail/prison was almost equal.

There were too few offenders with drug and violent crime prior cases to analyze the impact on their current case. The impact of having any prior case was also analyzed. Offenders were grouped into two categories: those with no prior cases and those with at least one prior case. Forty percent of offenders had at least one prior case. Offenders with prior cases were more likely to receive a jail/prison sentence. Twenty-four percent of offenders with a prior case received a jail/prison sentence compared to 10.7% of offenders who did not have a prior case. This finding is statistically significant.

In almost 15% of the cases the victim was a household member not an intimate partner. The victim offender relationship was not a significant variable in determining the case disposition. Nearly 35% of

victims sought an order of protection against the offender. We did not differentiate cases where only a temporary order was sought from those that proceeded to get a permanent order of protection. Cases where an order of protection was sought were more likely to result in a jail/prison sentence. Twenty percent of cases where an order of protection was sought received a jail/prison sentence compared to 9.4% of cases where an order of protection was not sought.

Offender Characteristics

Eighty-seven percent of offenders were men. Male offenders were more likely to have prior cases. Forty-three percent of males had prior cases compared to 24.1% of females. Male offenders were more likely to get a jail/prison sentence with 18.3% of males receiving jail/prison sentence. No females received a jail/prison sentence. Females were more likely to receive a sentence of probation (75.9% compared to 66.5%) or to have their case dismissed (24.1% compared to 15.2%). These findings were statistically significant.

The average age of offenders was 32 years. There was no relationship between the age of the offender and overall case disposition.

Incident Characteristics

For the 152 files we reviewed at district attorney offices, we gathered the following variables regarding the incident: were children present, was the defendant present when the police arrived, did the victim have obvious physical injuries, and were there adult witnesses. Table 6 lists the number and percent of cases that had these incident characteristics. None of those incident characteristics impact the overall disposition in the case.

Sentencing Considerations

We gathered the following variables regarding sentencing consideration: victim cooperation, admission of priors, and habitual offender. With regard to victim cooperation, although the relationship was not statistically significant, in cases where the victim was cooperative, the case was less likely to be dismissed (7.7% compared to 22.0%).

Offenders with the inclusion of an admission of priors or a habitual offender charge were more likely to get a

jail/prison sentence. No cases were dismissed that had with an admission of priors or a habitual offender charge. All offenders with a habitual offender charge received a jail/prison sentence compared with 11.6% of offenders who did not have an admission of priors. Forty-six percent of offenders with an admission of priors received a jail/prison sentence compare to 10.9% of offenders who did not have an admission of priors. These results were statistically significant however it is important to note that the small number of cases that had either an admission of priors (13), or a habitual offender charge (4).

Statewide Data

The statewide data was used for all district courts excluding the Second District and the Thirteenth District since they were part of the pilot study. The dataset consisted of 2,627 disposed cases for the time period 2000 -2005. Consistent with the pilot study all cases with any domestic violence charge were selected even if the domestic violence charge was not the most serious charge in the case.

Aggravated Battery HHM was the most serious charge in 28.2% of cases. The second most frequent lead charge was Aggravated Assault HHM (15.6%) followed by False Imprisonment (13.5%). These were also the most frequent lead charges in the pilot study. On both the pilot and the statewide data these three charges constituted the lead charge in over 50% of the cases (65% in the pilot and 57% in the statewide data). Table 7 lists the most serious charge in the case.

Figure 1. OVERALL CASE DISPOSITION BY LEAD CHARGE - PILOT DATA

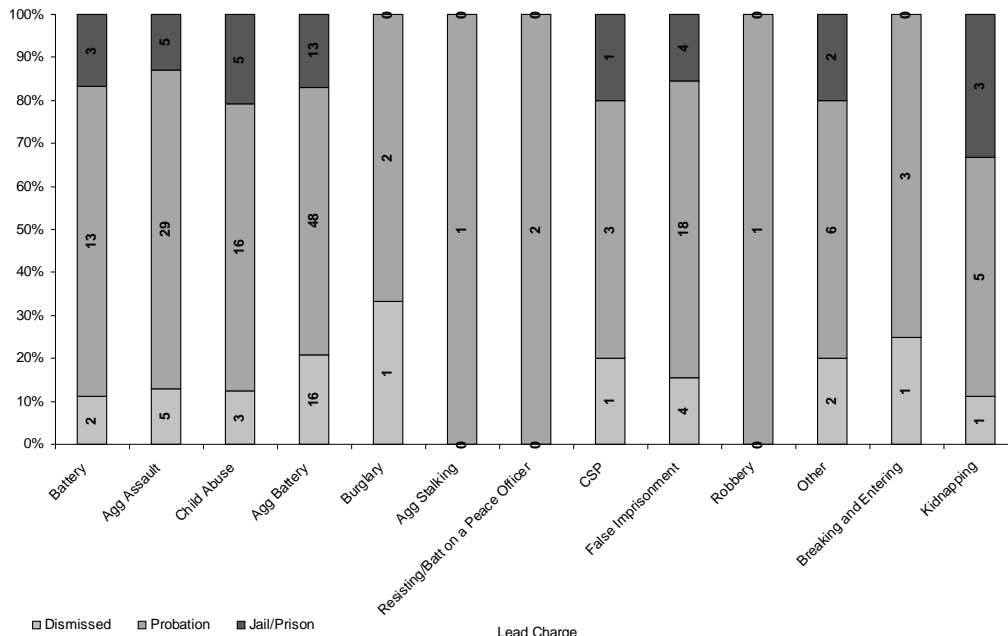
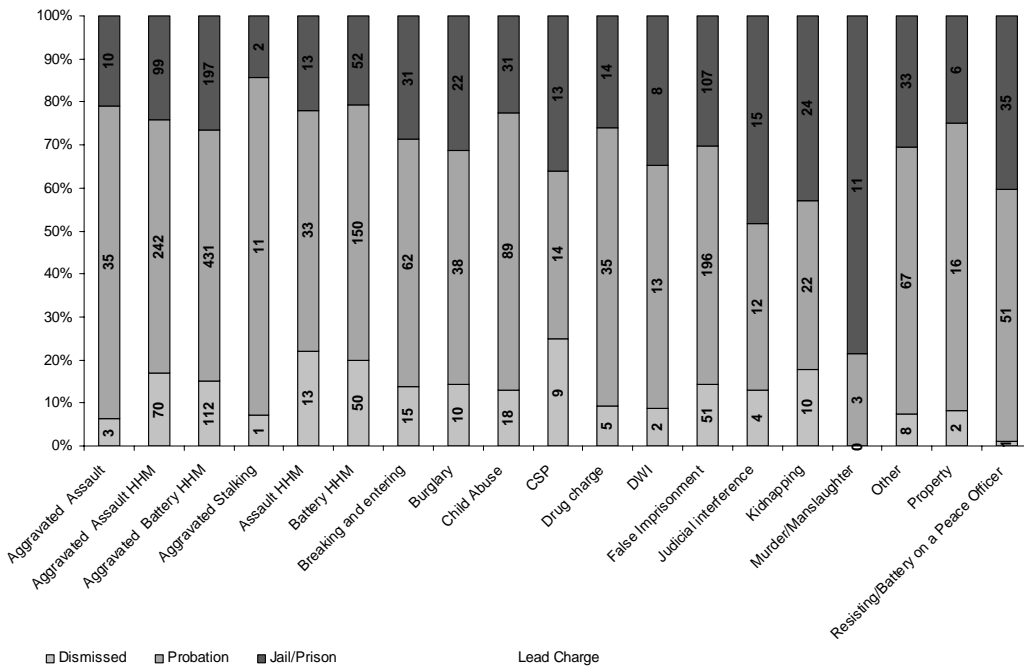


Figure 2. OVERALL CASE DISPOSITION BY LEAD CHARGE - STATEWIDE DATA



When looking at the overall disposition in the case, the percentage of cases dismissed in total for the statewide data was 14.6%; slightly lower than the pilot study (16.4%). The percentage of cases that resulted in jail/prison was higher (27.5%) than the pilot study (15.9%). It is important to remember the pilot was based on a shorter time period (just 2005 for the Second Judicial District and 2003-2005 for the

Thirteenth Judicial District) so the difference in overall disposition may not be reflective of the disposition pattern for these districts for the entire time period. Table 8 lists the overall case disposition for the statewide data. In some incidences the number of offenders in each lead charge category was small. The overall disposition and lead charge were combined to visually illustrate the

Figure 3. AVERAGE PROBATION SENTENCES

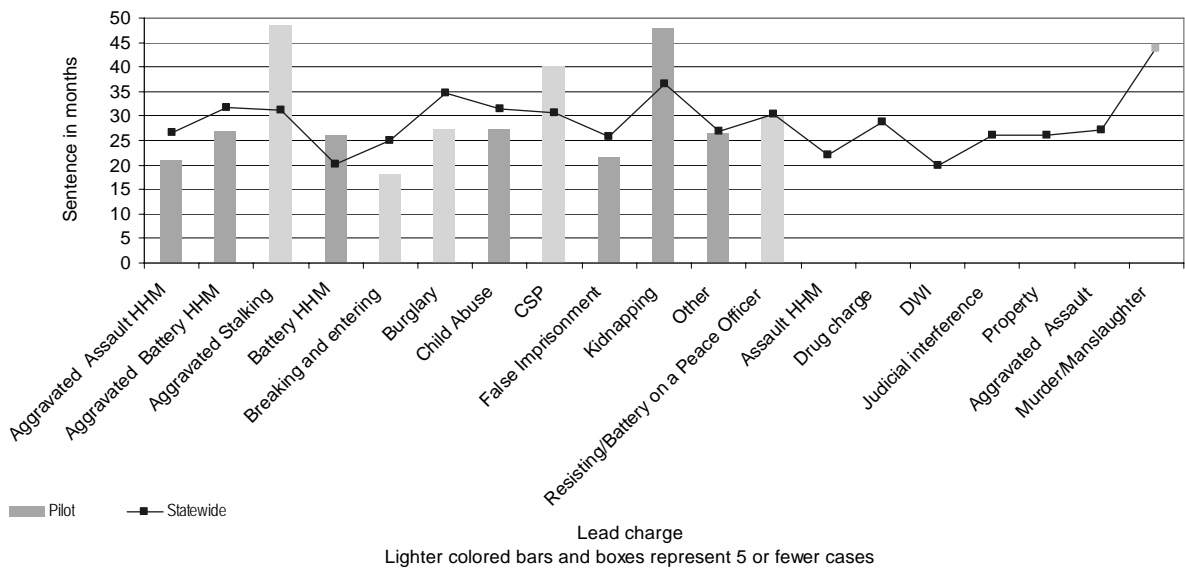
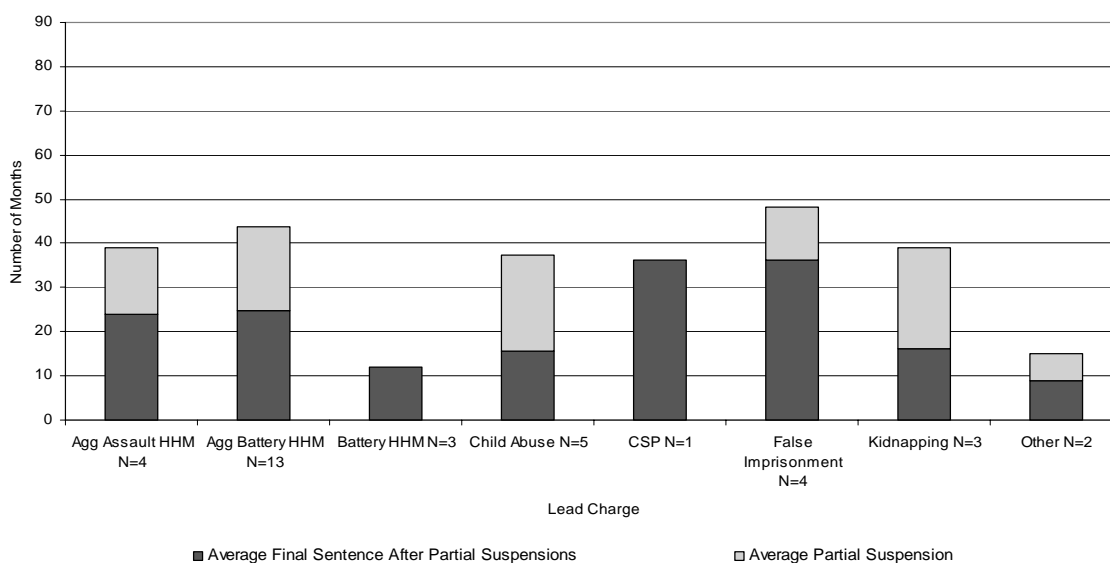


Figure 4. AVERAGE JAIL/PRISON SENTENCES - PILOT STUDY



overall disposition by charge. For each disposition type, the bar is labeled with the number of cases. Figure 1 reports the disposition type for each charge for the pilot study and Figure 2 reports the same information for the statewide data.

Sentence Lengths

The average sentence length in months for defendants who got either probation or jail/prison was calculated. The average probation sentence for all defendants who got probation was 26 months for the pilot and 28 months for the statewide data. Figure 3 compares the average probation sentence for the pilot and statewide data by lead charge. The pilot data is graphed using a bar chart and the statewide data is graphed using a line graph.

For defendants that received a jail/prison sentence, two components were looked at – the total sentence and any partial suspensions. For example a defendant may be sentenced to three years of which one year is suspended for a sentence of two years to be served in a Department of Corrections facility. Partially suspending a portion of the sentence is a strategy in plea negotiations in cases where there will be jail/prison sentence and a probation term after the jail/prison sentence. If the defendant violates probation after serving the jail/prison sentence the suspended portion of the sentence could be reinstated if the defendant is found to have violated their probation. The average total sentence and partial suspensions were computed. The overall average sentence for all cases before partial suspension was 38 months for the

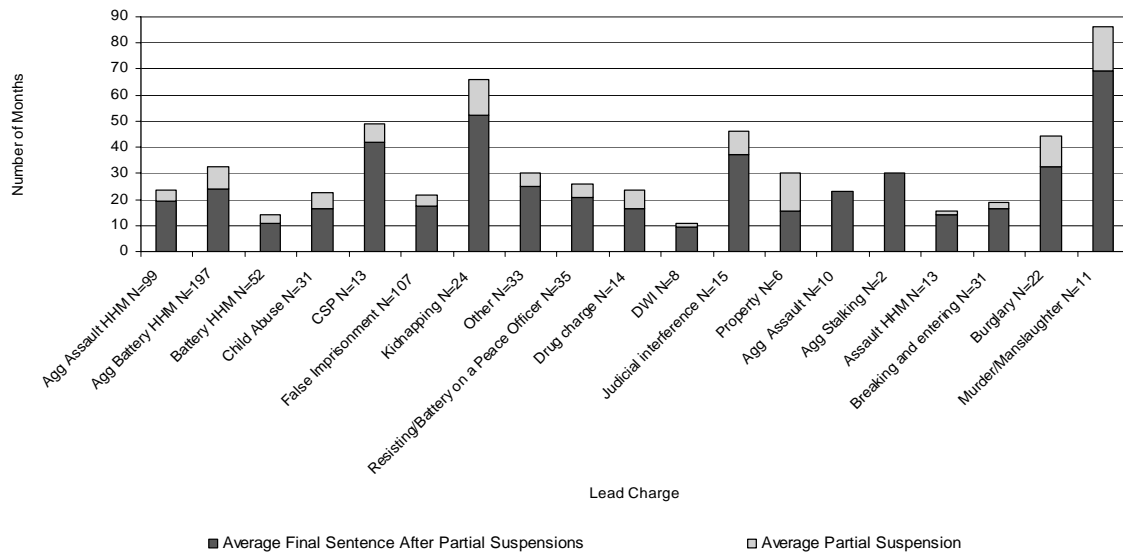
pilot study and 29 months for the statewide data. While this difference at first glance appears to be large the average sentence after partial suspensions is virtually the same for the pilot study and the statewide data (22.31 months and 22.67 months respectively).

The bars in Figures 4 and 5 illustrate the average total sentence and the average portion that defendants will serve. Since the pilot data is only for 35 cases, the average sentencing lengths should not be compared to the statewide data. The number of cases is noted after the charge. The longest average sentence is for cases where murder/manslaughter is the lead charge (86 months before partial suspensions and 69 months after). The next longest sentence is for cases where kidnapping is the lead charge (66 months before partial suspension and 52 months after). CSP cases have an average sentence of 49 months before partial suspensions and 42 months after. Figure 4 lists the average sentences for defendants in the pilot study by charge. Figure 5 lists the average sentences for defendants in the statewide data.

NEXT STEPS

During the pilot project we learned there is not a single data source that maintains all the information needed to study sentencing in domestic violence cases. The District Attorneys have the majority of the information needed; but unfortunately it is not available in an electronic format. It is not feasible to travel to district attorney offices to collect the incident characteristics, prior criminal history, and sentencing considerations for

all cases statewide. However, it is important to collect this information on a larger sample of cases to see if a sentencing model can be developed based on incident characteristics and other variables. In December 2007, the project advisory group endorsed a prospective approach to collecting this information statewide. The approach involves asking district attorney offices to fill out a data collection form provided by NMSC at the time of sentencing for every case that has a HHM crime. In talks with district attorneys, we learned that at the time of sentencing the information on the form is fresh in their minds and could be completed relatively quickly. Beginning July 1, 2008, NMSC staff will train District Attorney offices that voluntarily agree to complete the form. Additionally, NMSC will provide the district attorneys postage to send the completed forms back. The information will then be entered into a database and NMSC staff will look up offenders' prior court cases. ■

I. INTRODUCTION

In 2005, the Department of Health, Office of Injury Prevention obtained funds to conduct a statewide violence victimization survey. The survey was conducted by Schulman, Ronca and Bucuvalas, Inc. (SRBI) a national research organization with over 25 years experience conducting national and statewide surveys on health and trauma issues.

The purpose of the survey was to obtain state estimates of the prevalence and nature of victimization among adults in New Mexico. The sample for the Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico was drawn from a statewide sample of telephone households developed by random digit dialing (RDD). A statewide random sample of 4,000 adults aged 18 and older: 2000 males and 2000 females, were interviewed. Interviewing for the survey was conducted between December 6, 2005 and January, 22 2006. Comprehensive information regarding the survey methods used (sample construction, instrument design, programming, testing, interviewer selection, training, monitoring, conducting the interviews, response rates, field outcomes, data preparation and processing) is found in the *Survey Methods Report* available upon request from the Central Repository.

Preliminary findings from the Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico were published in *Incidence and Nature of Domestic Violence In New Mexico VI*, July 2006. Due to cost and other factors, statewide victimization surveys, like national victimization surveys, are not conducted each year, rather survey data is analyzed over a period of several years. A summary of the findings from the Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico in 2005, is found in **Appendix A**. It offers statewide rates of the incidence and prevalence of domestic violence, intimate partner violence and stalking, together with a discussion of the findings on selected characteristics of these interpersonal violence crimes. Selected findings from the survey can be found in the *Fact Sheet* of this report, as well. In 2007, additional findings from the Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico regarding beliefs about violent crime and accommodating behaviors were published in the *Incidence and Nature of Domestic Violence In New Mexico VII*, July 2007 report. A summary of these findings is found in **Appendix B**.

This report has three sections. *Section One* presents an analysis of domestic violence data from the New Mexico Interpersonal Violence Data Central Repository. *Section Two* presents a discussion of the implications of the findings presented and a review of the data limitations to highlight future data needs. *Section Three* presents an analysis of 15 important domestic violence variables for each individual county, so that the reader can access important domestic violence trends in his/her county at a glance.

The Central Repository is supported by the State of New Mexico Department of Health, Office of Injury Prevention and Behavioral Health Services Division and the New Mexico Crime Victims Reparation Commission Violence Against Women STOP Grant Program. It was established in 1998 to house data submitted from a variety of agencies statewide (law enforcement, district and magistrate courts, and domestic violence service providers) that deal with the issue of domestic violence. In 2001, the Central Repository began capturing statewide sexual assault data, as well. To this end, data from rape crisis centers, statewide mental health centers and sexual assault nurse examiner units (SANEs) that provide services for sexual assault victims are also submitted to the Central Repository.

SECTION ONE: Analysis of 2007 Domestic Violence Data from the Central Repository

I. DEFINITIONS

Domestic violence incidence as determined by law enforcement include all incidents of *assault*, *aggravated assault*, *battery*, and *aggravated battery* as outlined in the “Crimes Against Household Members Act” in statutes 30-3-10 through 3-3-16. Full definitions are found in **Appendix C**.

Data submitted from *law enforcement agencies* are used to determine statewide domestic violence *reported* incidence and the county rates of *reported* domestic violence.

Domestic violence cases as determined by *domestic violence service providers* include all *adult victims* who are accepted as clients by the providers for delivery of services. Data on children victim-witnesses and offenders served by domestic violence service providers are also analyzed and presented herein. None of the cases served by the domestic violence service providers are considered in the county reported rates of incidence to avoid possible duplication of reporting.

Domestic violence data from all *magistrate* and *district* courts include codes that capture *aggravated assault*, *aggravated battery*, *aggravated stalking*, *assault*, *battery*, *stalking* and *assault with intent to commit a violent felony*, all against a household member. These codes and the number of protection orders granted are extracted from the Administrative Office of the Courts Judicial Information System.

Currently, standardized data from each aforementioned discipline are submitted to the Central Repository on a quarterly basis. The data from the Central Repository analyzed for this report covers domestic violence data for the period 1/1/07 – 12/31/07.

II. FINDINGS

A. How Many Domestic Violence Incidents in 2007 Were Identified by Law Enforcement

There were 104 law enforcement agencies that submitted domestic violence data to the Central Repository during 2007 (see **Appendix D**). Data from each participating agency was extracted from police offense incident reports and submitted in aggregate form on the standardized *Law Enforcement Domestic Violence Data Collection Form* (see **Appendix E**).

The total number of reports for each variable analyzed from law enforcement will vary as all questions may not be answered on each report submitted. The number of reports considered for each question analyzed is stated throughout the report as the findings on each variable are discussed.

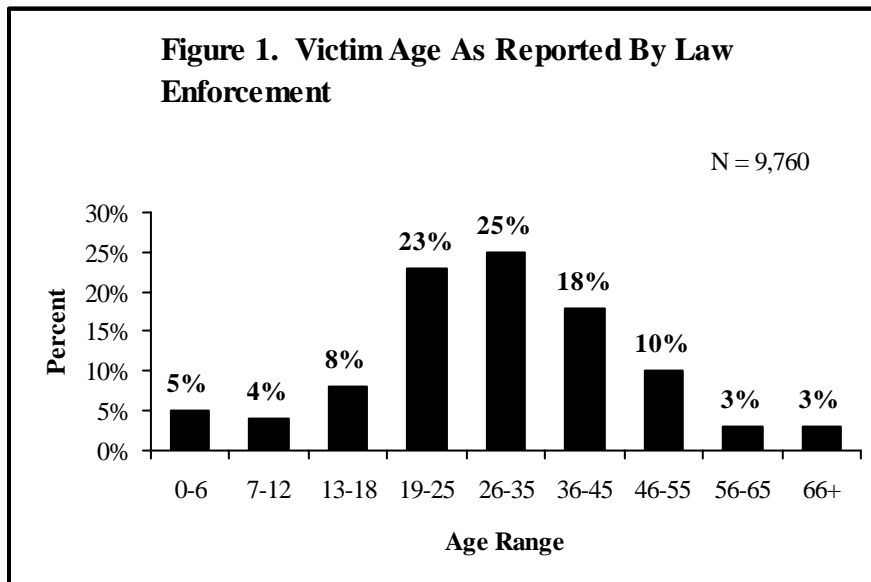

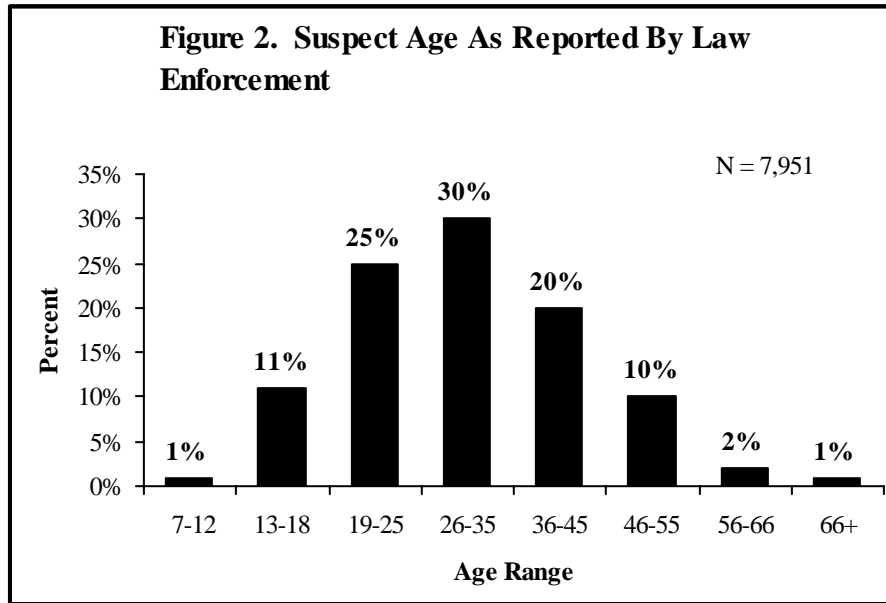
Of the 9,760 reports that identified *victim age*, the greatest proportion of all victims were in the age group 26-35 (25%), followed by 19-25 (23%). The age group 36-45 comprised 18% of the victims. See **Figure 1**.

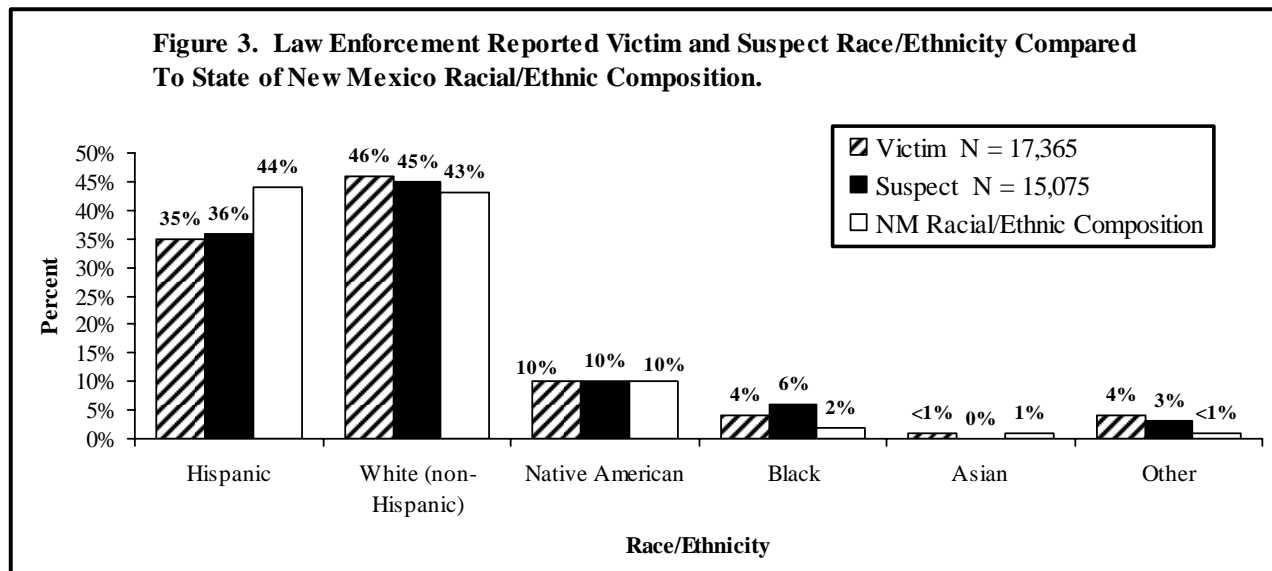
Of 7,951 reports that identified *suspect age*, the age group with the greatest proportion of reported suspects was 26-35 (30%), followed by 19-25 (25%) and 36-45 (20%). See **Figure 2**.

Of 17,365 domestic violence victims, 35% (6,129) were *Hispanic*, 46% (8,062) *White (non-Hispanic)*, 10% (1,783) *Native American*, and 4% (646) *Black*. Victims of “*other*” races comprised 4% (648) of all victims and *Asian* victims comprised <1% (97) of all victims. Likewise, of the 15,075 reports that identified *suspect ethnicity*, 36% (5,423) were *Hispanic*, 45% (6,833) *White (non-Hispanic)*, 10% (1,541) *Native American*, and 6% (846) *Black*. Suspects of “*other*” races comprised 3% (380) of all suspects and *Asian* suspects comprised <1% (52) of all suspects. F. Who Went For Help As A Result Of Domestic Violence

There were 27 domestic violence service providers of a possible 34 direct service providers (providers) that submitted data to the Central Repository for 2007 (see **Appendix H**). The seven domestic violence service providers that did *not* submit data for 2007 include: *Morning Star* (Albuquerque), *Family Harmony Project* (Crownpoint), *Laguna Family Services* (Laguna), *Prevention Services/Domestic Violence Program* (Dulce), *Jemez Domestic Violence Program* (Jemez), *Santa Ana Domestic Violence Program* and *El Puente* (Socorro).

Data from each participating agency was extracted from client intake information and submitted on the standardized *Domestic Violence Service Agencies Data Collection Form* (see **Appendix I**).

The total number of reports for each variable analyzed from service providers will vary as all questions may not be answered on each report submitted. The number of reports considered for each question analyzed is stated throughout the report as the findings on each variable are discussed.

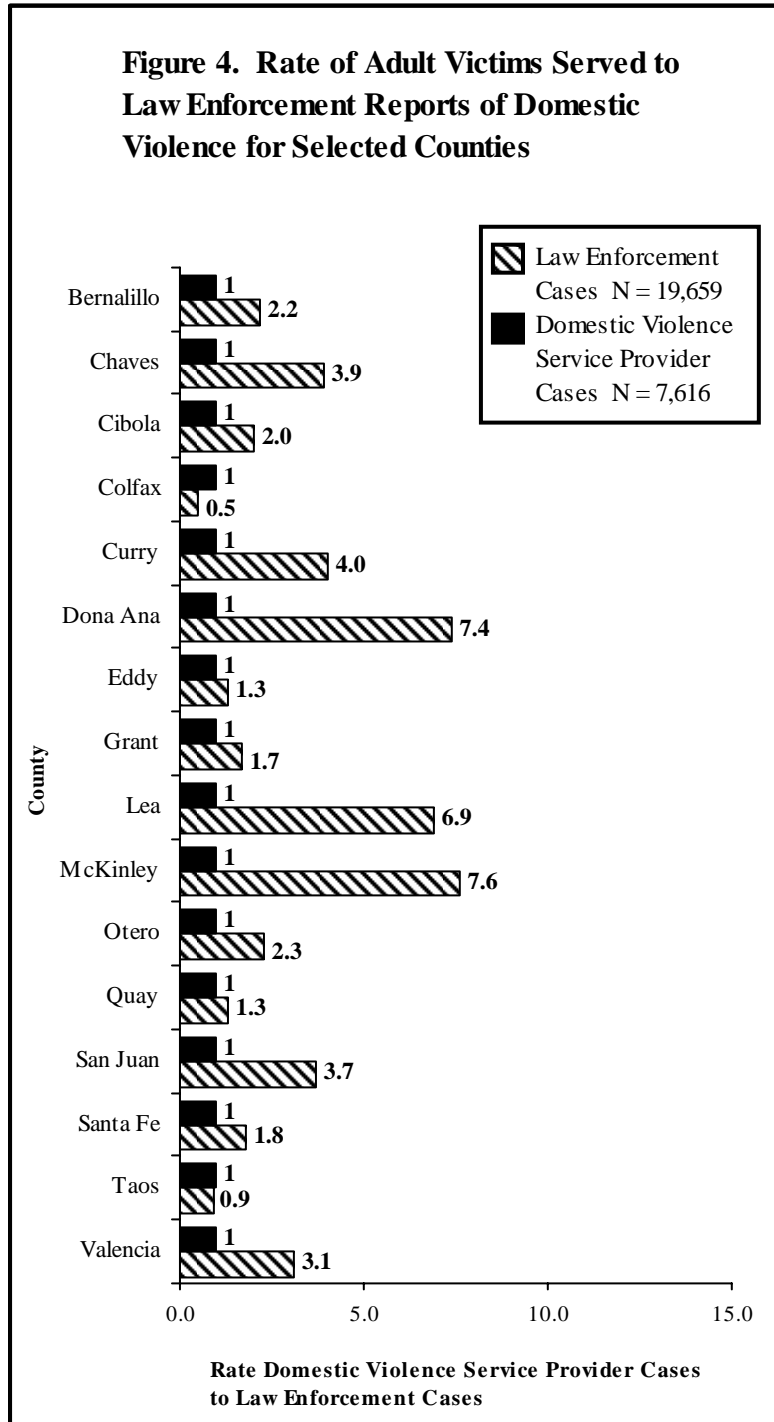
1. Number Seeking Services

There were 17,457 new clients served during 2007, which is a 5% decrease in the number of clients served in 2006.

An analysis was conducted comparing the number of adult victims served to the number of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement (in counties with the law enforcement agency from the largest city reporting, *and* where the direct service provider reported in all four quarters of 2007). This analysis revealed that *McKinley County* had the fewest number of victims receiving services relative to the

number of incidents reported to police (1 out of 7.6), followed by *Dona Ana County* (1 out of 7.4), *Lea County* (1 out of 6.9) and *Curry County* (1 out of 4.0). See **Figure 4**.



Adult victims who went for help in 2007 (9,243) represent 41% of domestic violence cases identified by law enforcement.

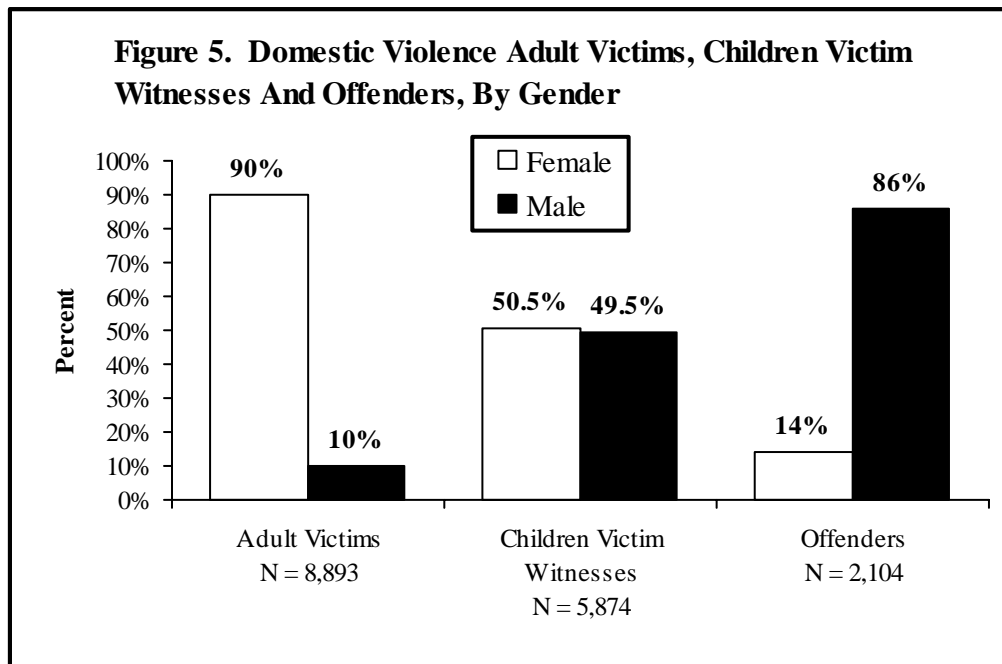
Offenders who went for treatment (2,119) represent 9.5% of domestic violence cases identified by law enforcement.

2. Gender of Those Served

Survivor gender was documented in 8,893 of 9243 adult victims served. Ninety percent (7,987) of the *adult victims* served were *female*. Conversely, 86% (1,818) of the 2,104 reports that documented *offender* gender, reported the offender was *male*. Gender was documented in 5,874 of the 6095 *children victim-witnesses* served. There was an insignificant difference in the number of *female* children (50.5%) and *male* children (49.5%) who witnessed the abuse of an adult victim. See **Figure 5**.

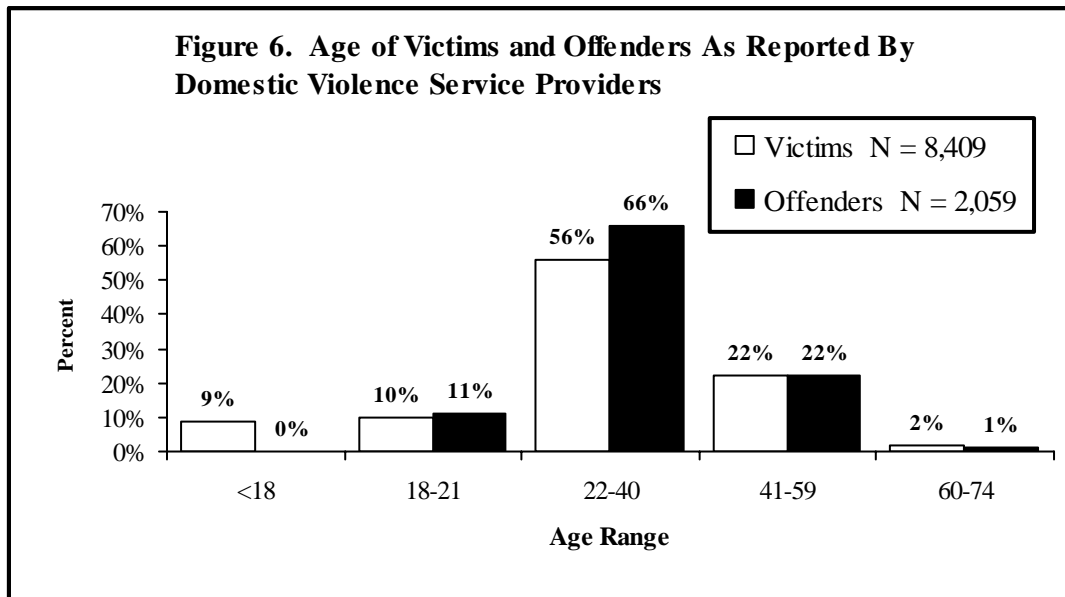

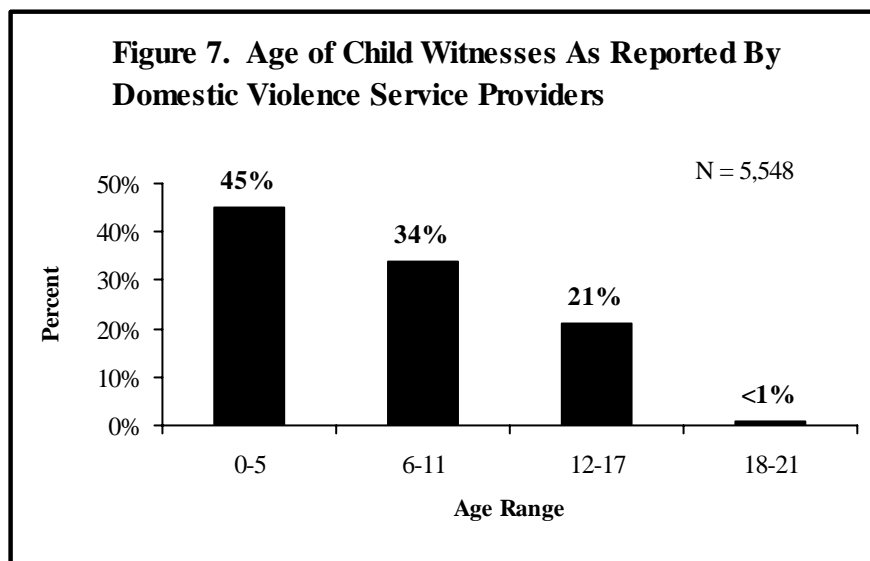
3. Ages of Those Served

The age of the *adult victim* was documented in 8,409 provider reports. Adult victims, 56% (4,734) were predominately 22-40 years of age, 22% (1,851) were 41-59 years of age, and 10% (840) were 18-21 years of age. Victims *age 60 and older* comprised 2% (218) of all adult victims served and those *<18 years* comprised 9% (766) of adult victims served. See **Figure 6**.



Of the 2,059 reports that documented *offender age*, 66% (1,354) were 22-40 years old, 22% (452) were 41-59, and 11% (220) were 18-21. Offenders age 60 and older comprised 1% (31) of all offenders served and those <18 years of age comprised <1% (2) of all offenders. Refer to Figure 6.

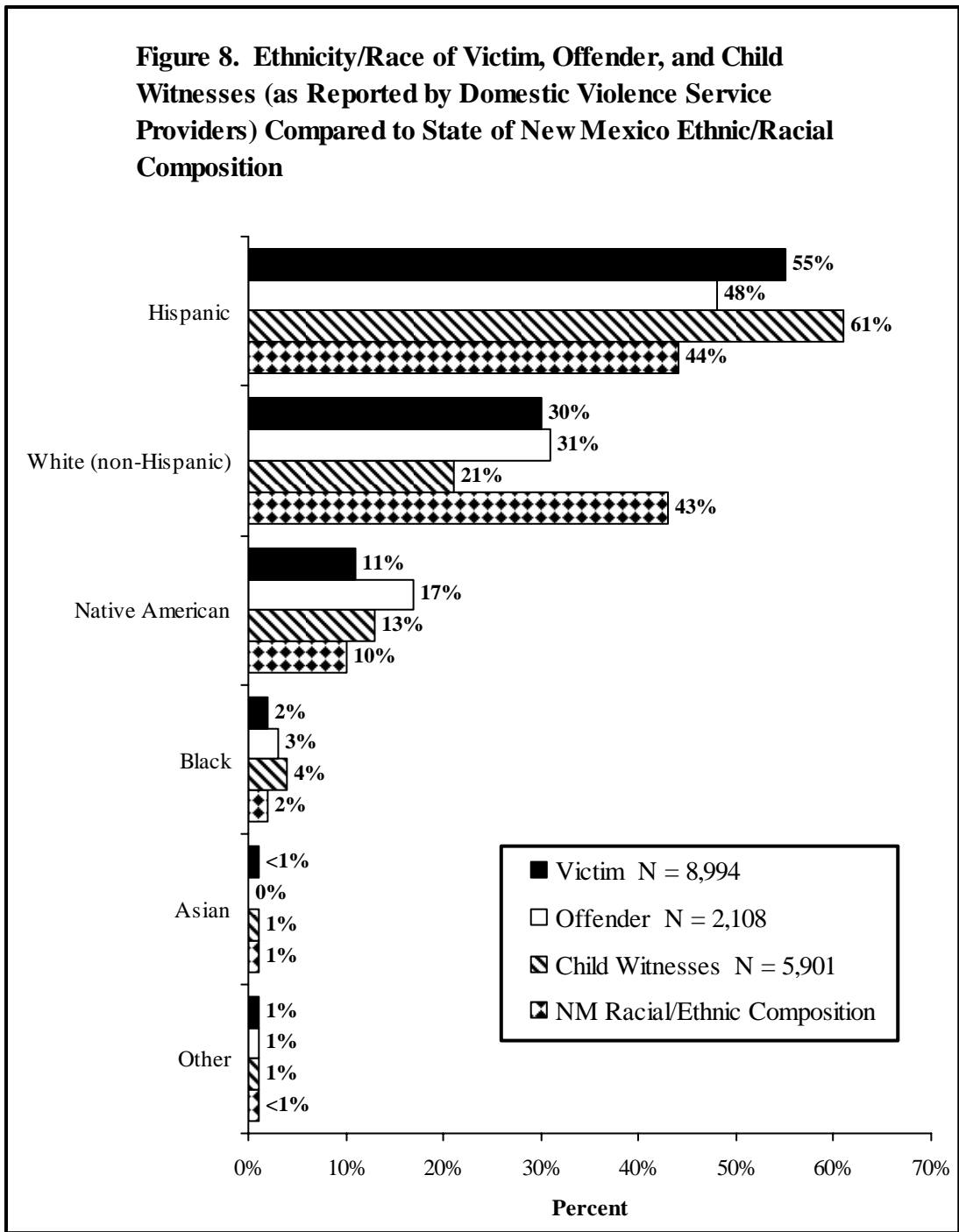
The age of *children victim-witnesses* was documented in 5,548 of the 6,095 children served. Forty-five percent (2,470) of the *children victim-witnesses* were between 0-5 years old, 34% (1,898) were 6-11 years old, 21% (1,152) were 12-17 years old, and <1% (2) were 18-21 years old. 4. Race/Ethnicity of Those Served

The *race/ethnicity of the adult victim* was identified in 8,994 reports. Of these, 55% (4,977) were *Hispanic*, 30% (2,670) *White (non-Hispanics)*, 11% (1,001) *Native American*, 2% (200) *Black*, 1% (87)

Other, and <1% (59) Asian. For a comparison of adult victim racial/ethnic distribution to the racial/ethnic composition of New Mexico, see Figure 8.

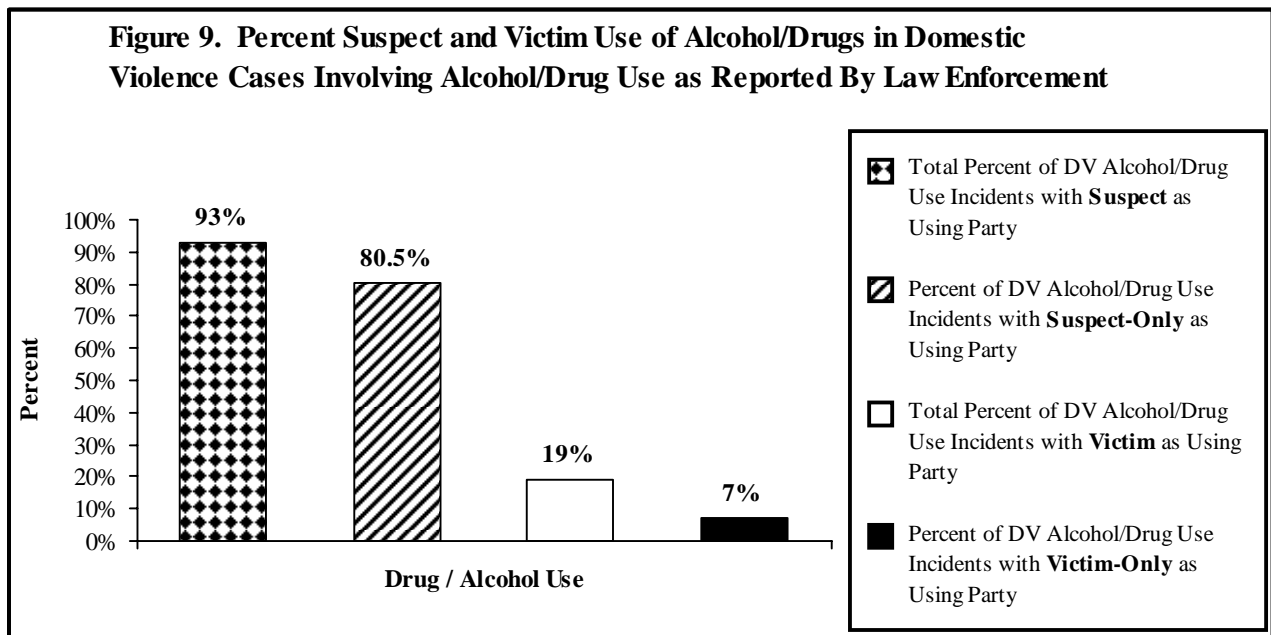


Hispanics comprised 61% (3,572) of the 5,901 children victim-witnesses where race/ethnicity was documented, followed by 21% (1,219) White (non-Hispanic), 13% (796) Native Americans, 4% (239) Blacks, 1% (40) Asians, and 1% (35) Other. Refer to Figure 8.

Of the 2,108 offender reports that documented *offender race/ethnicity*, the racial/ethnic group with the greatest number of offenders represented were *Hispanics*, 48% (1,019), followed by *White (non-Hispanics)*, 31% (657), *Native Americans*, 17% (351), *Blacks*, 3% (65), and *Other race/ethnicity*, 1% (14). 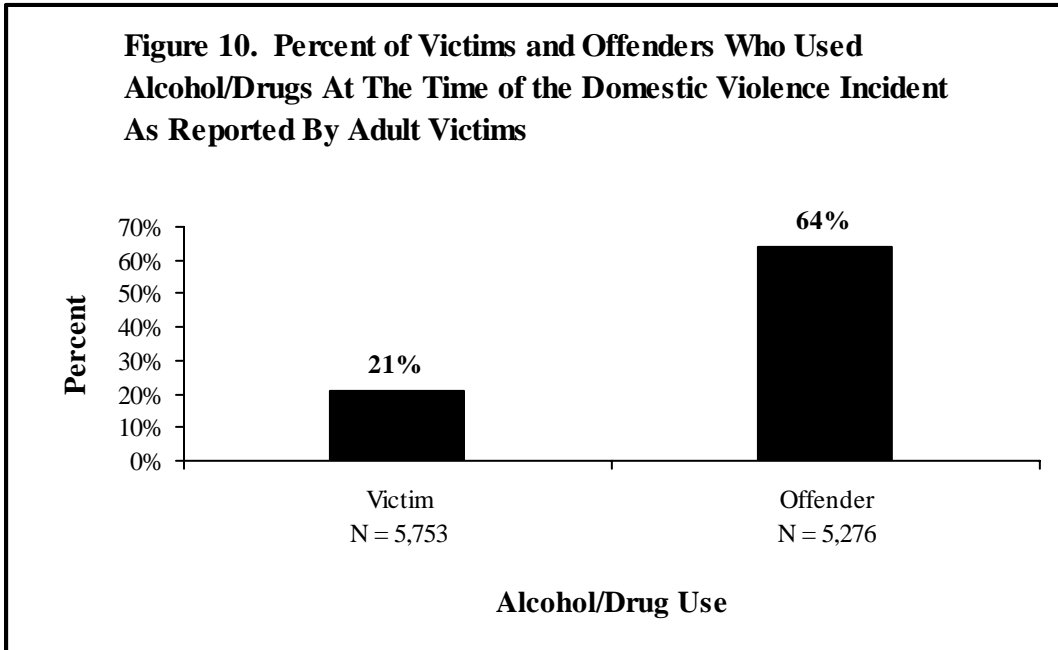

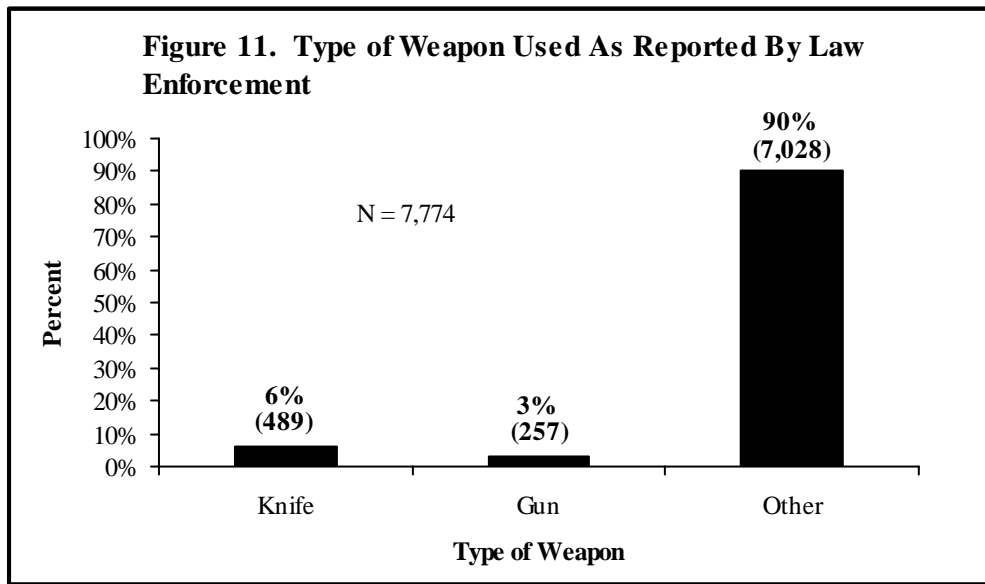

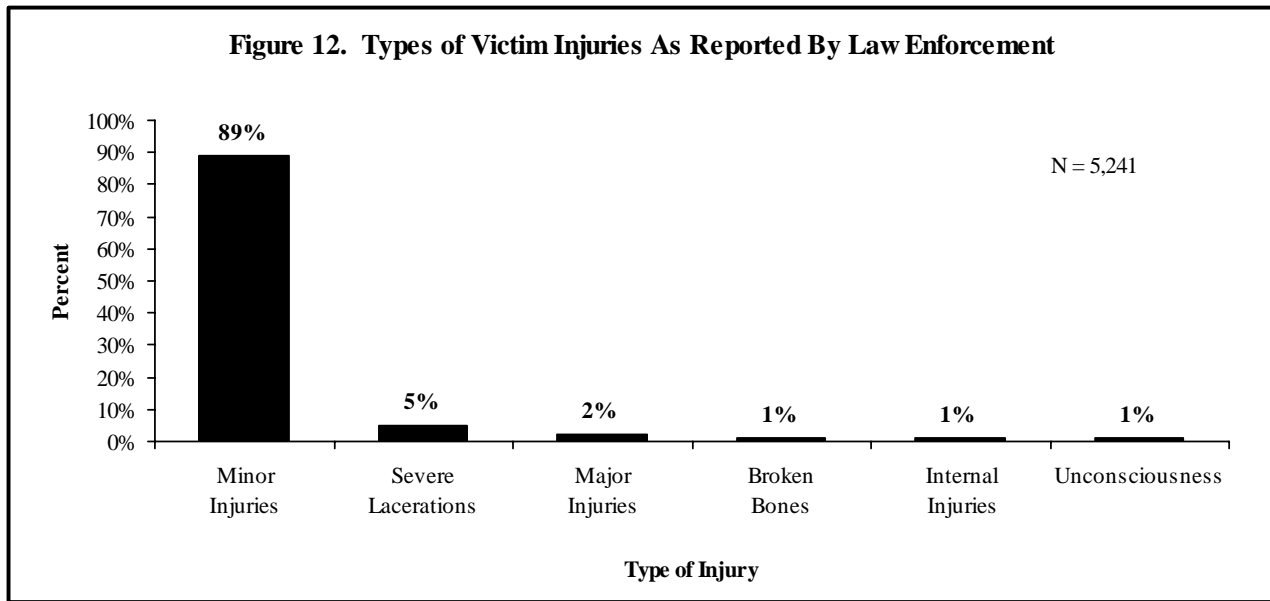

The type of injury sustained was documented in 5,241 cases. *Minor* injuries comprised 89% (4660) of all injuries reported, *severe lacerations* 5% (266), *major* injuries 2% (104), *broken bones* and *internal injuries* 1% each (59 and 75, respectively) and 1% (67) of victims were rendered *unconscious*. See **Figure 12**.

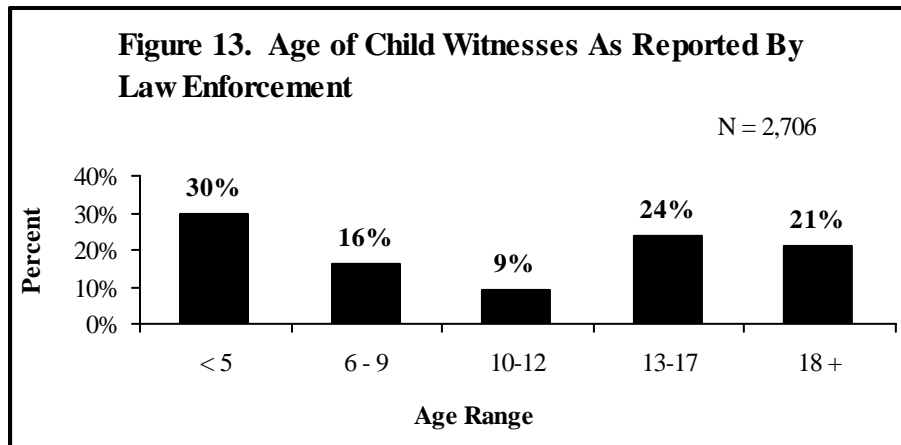

The ages of the children were documented in 2,706 cases. Almost one-third (30%) of these children were under 5 years of age, 16% were 6-9 years of age, and 9% were age 10 - 12. Therefore, over half (54%)

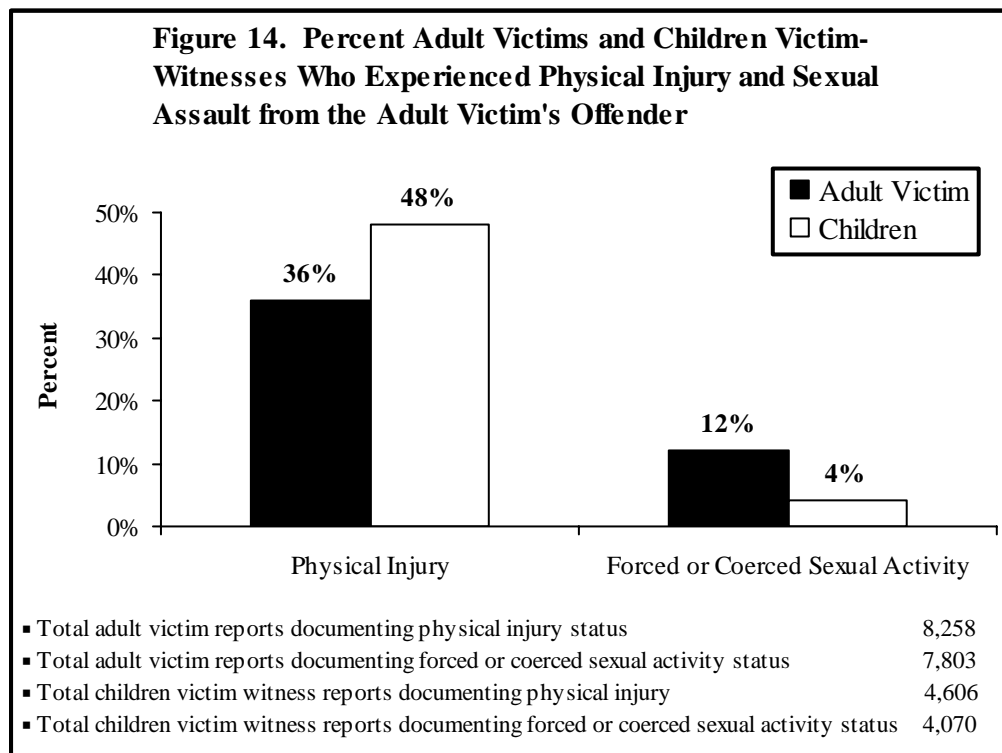
of those children who witnessed domestic violence incidents were not yet adolescents. Adolescents between the ages of 13 - 17 comprised 24% of the children at the domestic violence scenes, while young adults, 18-21, comprised 21% of those who witnessed domestic abuse. See **Figure 13**.



There were 8,089 law enforcement reported domestic violence incidents that documented both the number of *incidents* with children present and the number of *children* present. Of these incidents, 1,108 had children present and the total number of children present was 1,993 or 1.8 children per incident. The analysis of these incidents allow for a more accurate determination of the average number of children present when children witness family violence incidents.

M. What About Injury and Sexual Assault Among Adult Victims and Children Who Went For Help

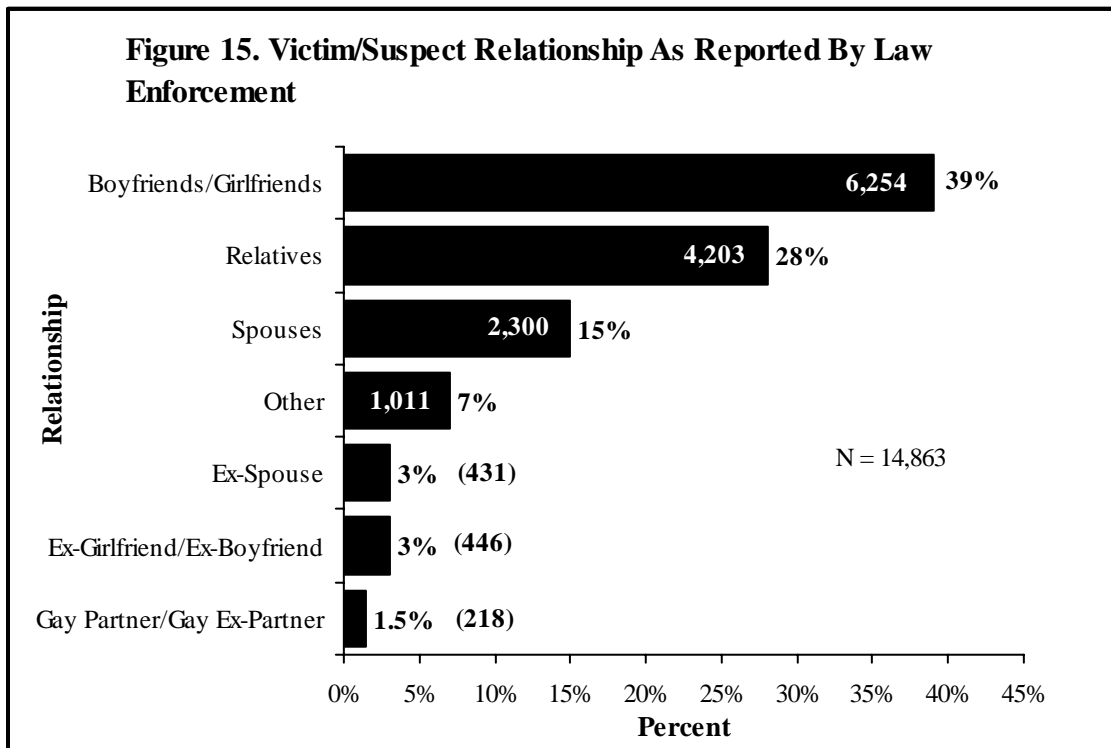
Of 8,258 service provider reports, 2,990 (36%) *adult victims* reported being *physically injured* from the domestic assault. Similarly, there were 7,803 provider reports that identified 963 (12%) victims who experienced *forced or coerced sexual activity* from the current offender. See **Figure 14**.



There were 4,606 service provider reports that identified 2,203 (48%) of *children victim-witnesses* that experienced *physical abuse* from the current offender of the adult victim. Similarly, there were 4,070 provider reports that identified 183 (4%) *children victim-witnesses* who experienced *sexual abuse* from the current offender of the adult victim. Refer to Figure 14.

N. Who Are The People Hurting Their Partners or Family Members

Of 20,326 suspects reported by law enforcement, their relationship to the victim was documented among 14,863. Of these, a total of 42% were *boyfriend/girlfriend* (39%) and *ex-boyfriend/girlfriend* (3%). The *victim/suspect relationship* in 18% was *spouse* (15%) and *ex-spouse* (3%). *Relatives* accounted for 28% of identified *victim/suspect relationships*. See Figure 15.



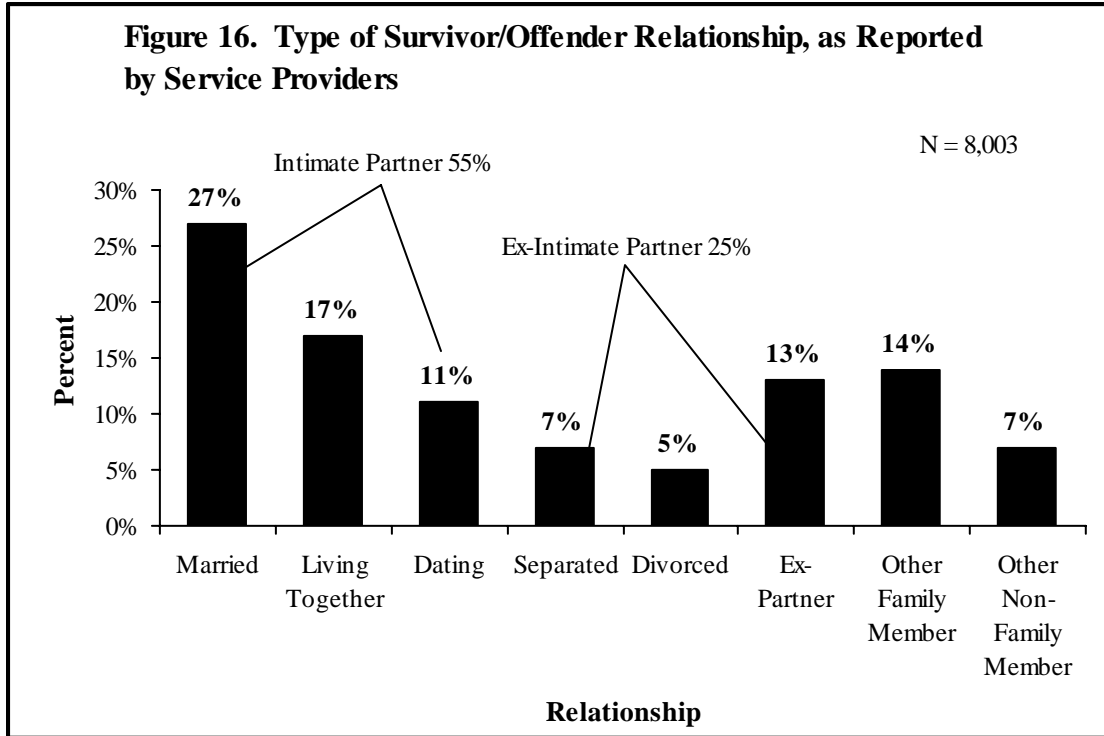
The *victim/offender relationship* was documented in 8,003 service provider victim reports. Over one-quarter, 27% (2,131) of victims were *married* to their offender, and an additional 17% (1,392) were *living together*. Another 11% (853) were *dating* their offender and 25% were either an *ex-partner* (13% or 1,027), *separated* (7% or 570) or *divorced* (5% or 377). Therefore, 80% of those receiving direct services were the result of violence perpetrated by a former or current intimate partner. See Figure 16.

O. How Many Deaths in New Mexico Are Domestic Violence-Related and What Are The Circumstances of These Incidents

Information obtained on domestic violence-related homicides was provided by the Office of the Medical Investigator and the New Mexico Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

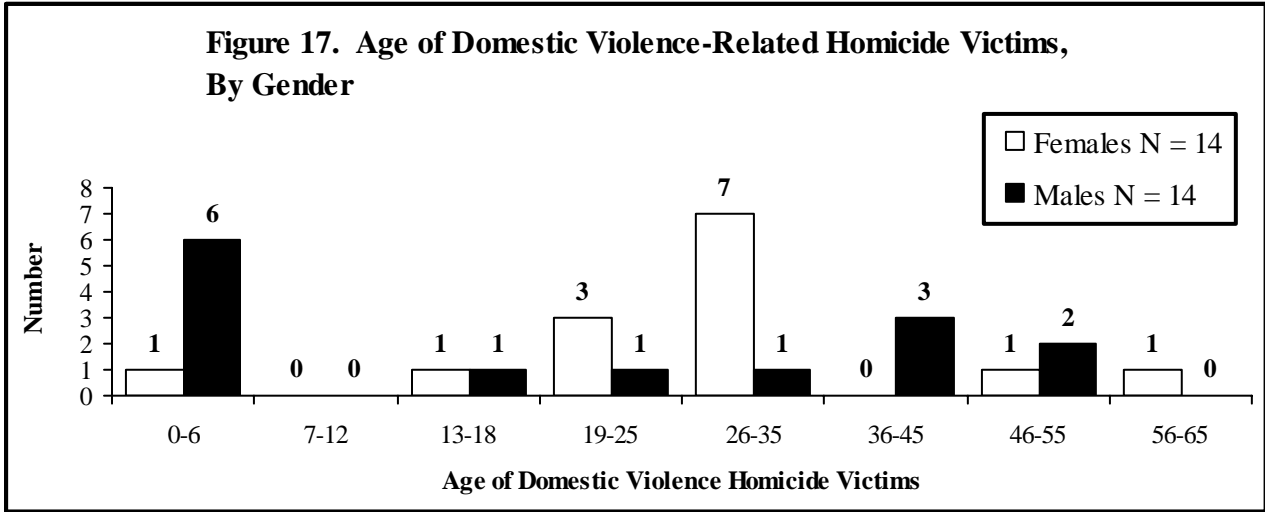

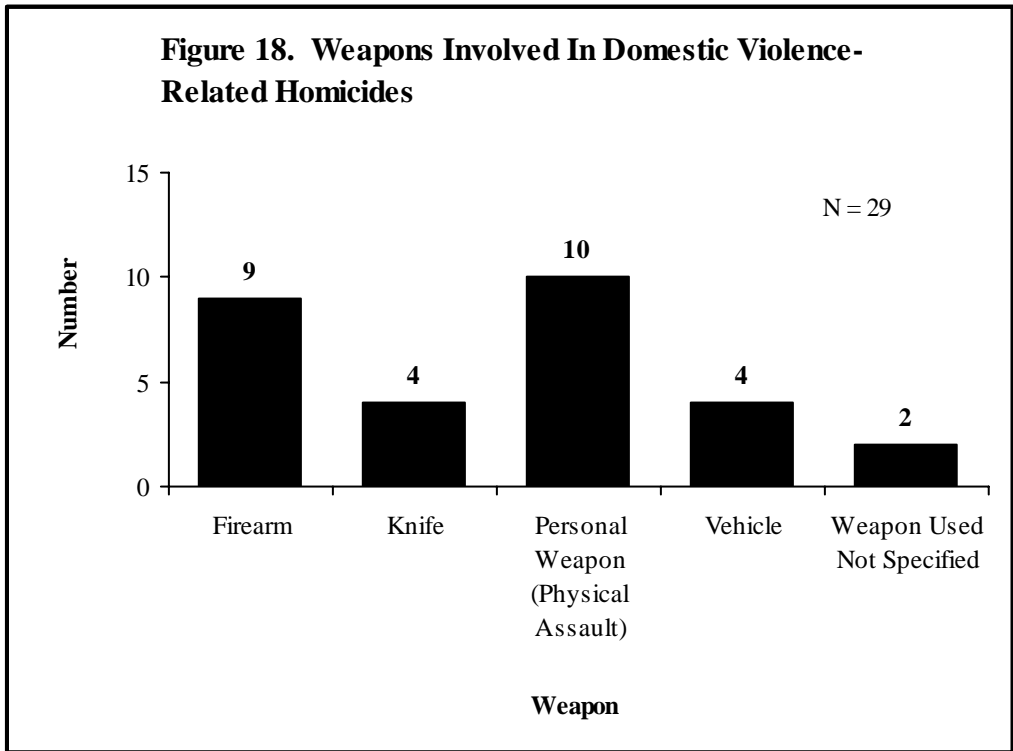
Most domestic violence-related homicides (6) occurred in Bernalillo County. These 6 domestic-related homicides represent 8% of the 71 homicides in Bernalillo County in 2007. Counties in which the domestic violence homicides represent a greater proportion of all homicides, include: *San Juan County*, 4 of 20 (20%); *McKinley County*, 3 of 7 (43%); *Valencia County*, 3 of 4 (75%). In *Torrance County*, of two reported homicides, both were domestic violence related. Similarly, in *Lincoln County*, the only homicide reported was domestic violence-related.

The ages of the domestic violence homicide victims was documented in 29 cases. Most victims of domestic violence homicides (8) were ages 26-35, followed by those 0-6 years of age (7). There were 4 victims, ages 19-25 and 3 victims respectively, that were ages 36-45 and 46-55. Two victims were ages 13-18 and one victim was age 56. There were 14 female victims of domestic-related homicides and 14 male victims. When age was examined by gender of the homicide victims, most *males* (6) were age 0-6, while the ages of most *female* domestic violence homicide victims (7) were 26-35. See **Figure 17**.

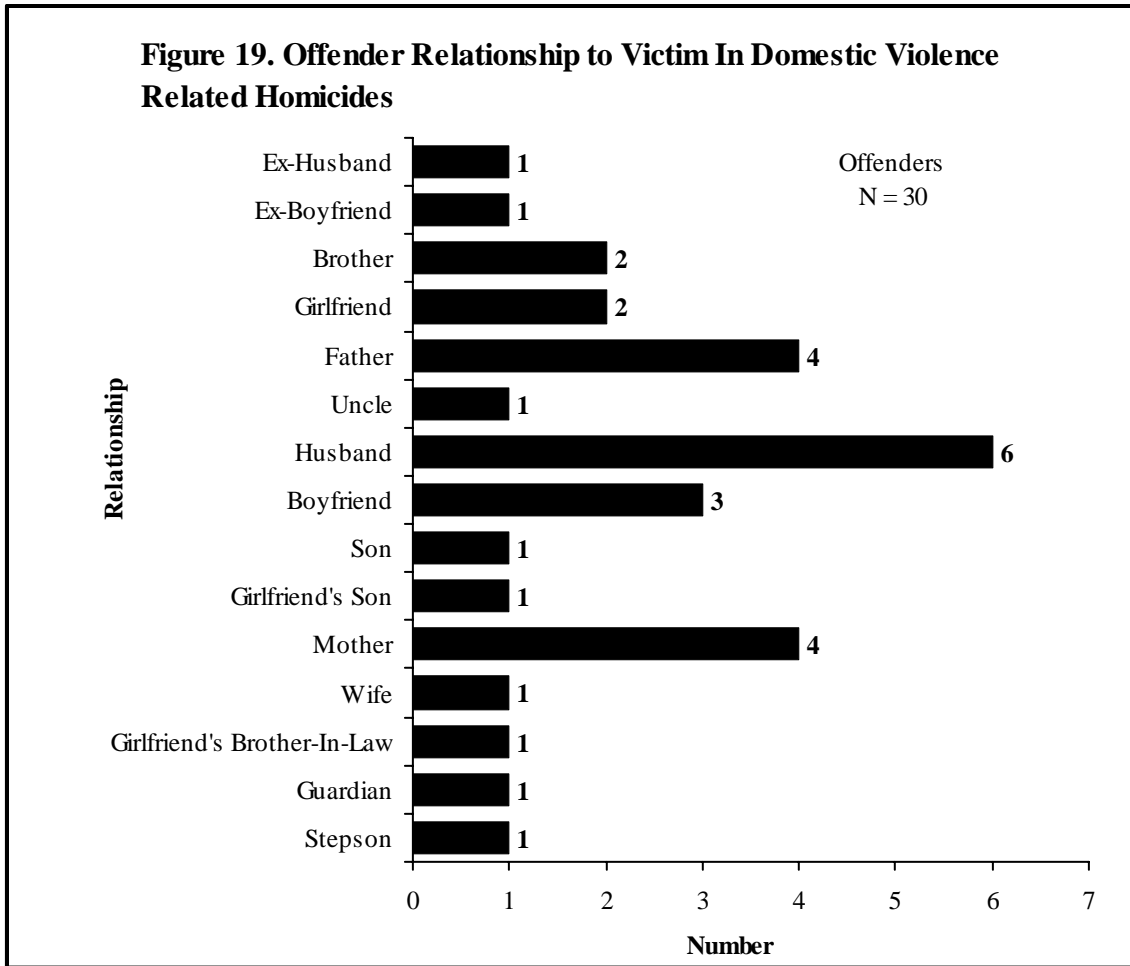


Most (34% or 10) domestic violence homicides involved “*personal*” weapons (feet, fists, knee, belt, etc.) followed by *firearms*, 31% (9). *Knives* and *vehicles* were responsible for 4 or 14% of domestic violence homicides respectively. In another 1% (2) of domestic violence-related homicides, the cause of death was not specified. See **Figure 18**.



Of the 30 domestic violence homicides that documented the specific *victim/offender relationship*, *husbands* (6) committed the most domestic violence homicides, followed by *fathers* and *mothers* (4, respectively). *Boyfriends* (3) and *ex-boyfriends* (1) committed four of the domestic violence homicides. Similarly, *girlfriends* (2) and *relatives of girlfriends* (2) were responsible for four domestic violence

homicides. In all, *current romantic partners* were responsible for 14 of the 29 homicides. See **Figure 19**. Of the two suicides associated with intimate partner violence, both were *husbands* of the victims.



P. How Long Have Domestic Violence Victims Been In A Relationship With Their Offenders

There were 7,467 reports that documented the *length of relationship* between the victim and offender. The greatest number of victims (1,761 or 24%) reported a relationship with a duration of 3-5 years, followed by those who reported a relationship of 6-10 years (1,567 or 21%) and 1-2 years (1,550 or 21%). Twenty-three percent (1,737) were together *11 years or longer* and 11% (852) were together *less than a year*. See **Figure 20**.

Q. How Many Victims and Offenders Have Been Victims Of Abuse When They Were Children

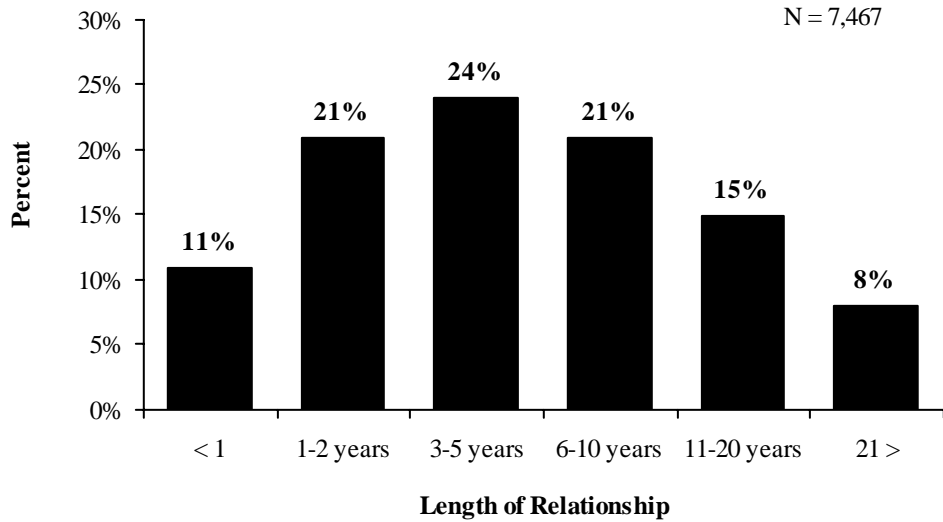
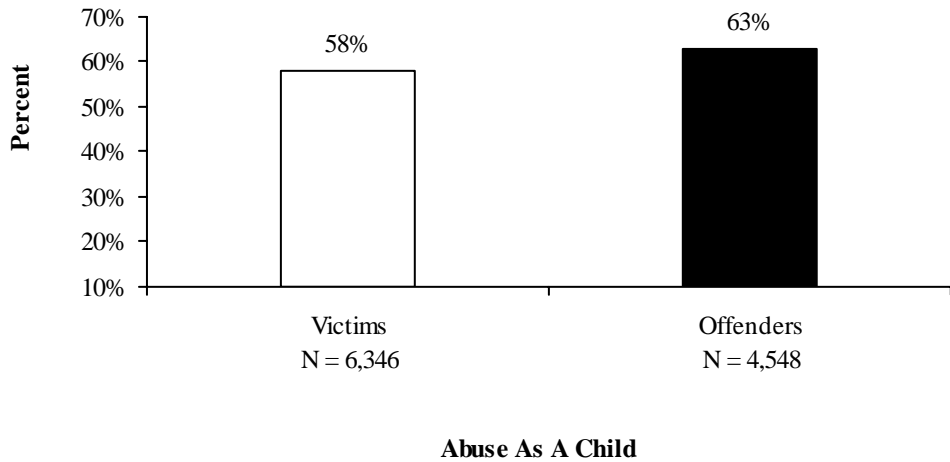


Figure 21. Percent of Victims and Offenders Who Experienced Child Abuse or Witnessed Abuse As A Child As Reported By Adult Victims Seeking Services

Past victim abuse and/or the witnessing of abuse as a child was documented in 6,346 provider reports. Over half (58% or 3,652) of *adult victims* reported experiencing *abuse as a child*. See **Figure 21**. Additionally, 71% or 5,894 of 8,323 of adult victims reported experiencing at least one prior domestic violence incident as an adult.

Figure 20. Length of Victim/Offender Relationship As Reported By Domestic Violence Service Providers

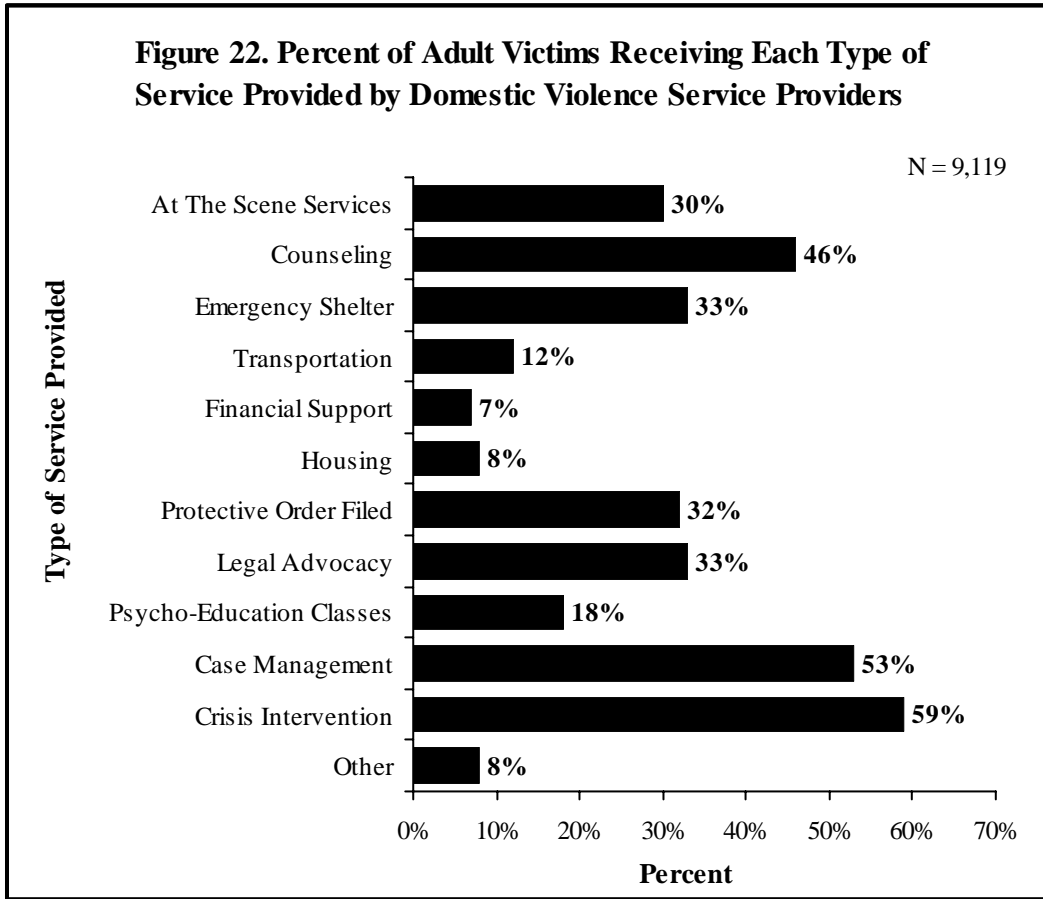
In 2007, there were 1,453 offender reports that documented past abuse. Of these, 45% (647) reported experiencing abuse as a child. However, when *victims* were asked if their *offender* was abused as a child, 63% (2869 of 4,548) reported that their offender experienced abuse as a child. Refer to Figure 21.

R. Who Refers Adult Victims for Help and What Kind of Services Do They Receive

Adult Victims were mostly *self-referred* (27%) and referred by *law enforcement* (23%) to service providers for assistance.

The service that most adult victims received was *crisis intervention* (59%), followed by *case management* (53%) and *counseling* (46%). See **Figure 22**.



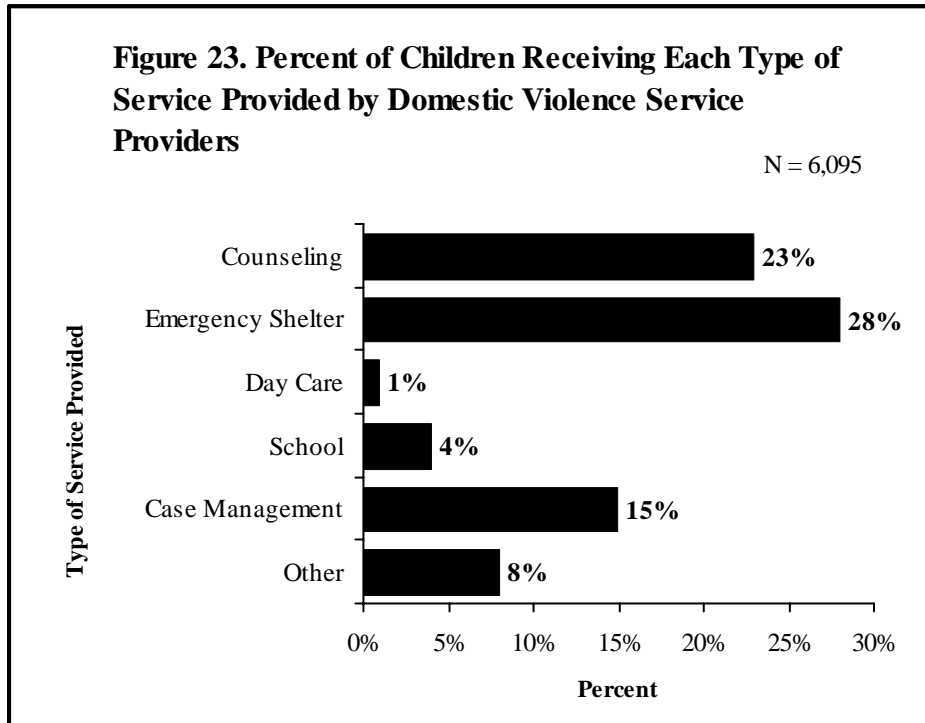

S. Who Refers Children for Help and What Kind of Services Do Children Receive

Children were mostly referred by a *family member/relative* (43%). Those referred by *law enforcement* (18%) were a distant second, followed by children who were *self-referred* (11%) and referred by *adult court* (3%).

The specified service that most children received was *emergency shelter* (28%), followed by *counseling* (23%), and *case-management* (15%). However, half (52% or 3,149) of children victim-witnesses received “other” services. Of these, 2,673 (44%) were *at-the-scene services* provided by *Resources, Inc.*, in Bernalillo County. See **Figure 23**.

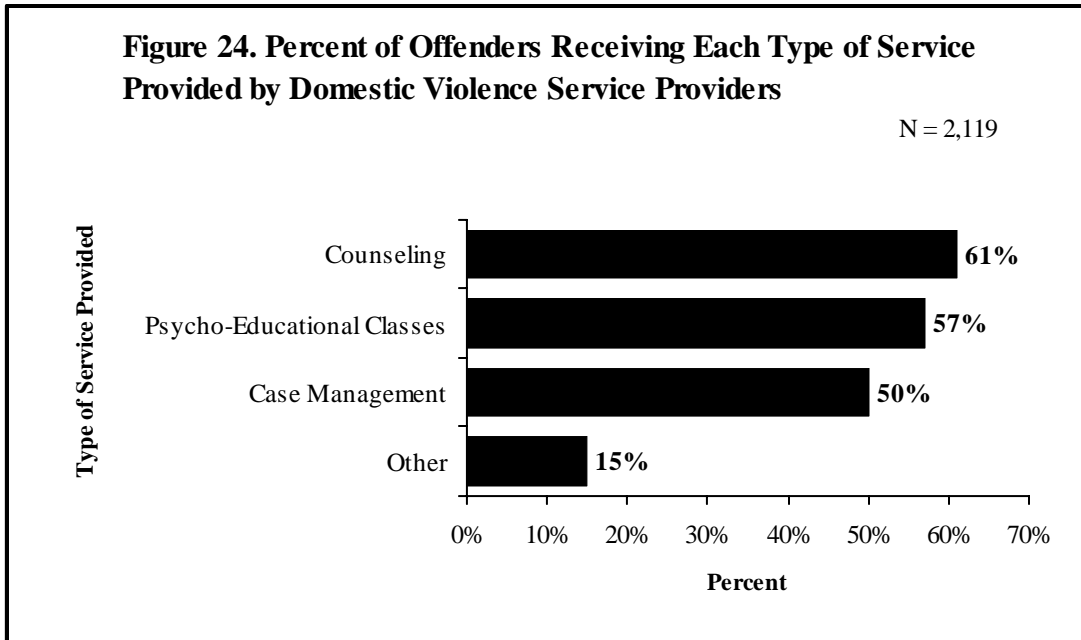
T. Who Refers Offenders for Help and What Kind of Services Do Offenders Receive

Offenders were mostly referred by *adult court* (80%). Offenders were also referred from *Law Enforcement* (4%), *CYFD Child Protective Services* (3%), and *Juvenile Court* (2%). In contrast to self-referred adult victims (27%), only 7% of offenders were *self-referred* for treatment.

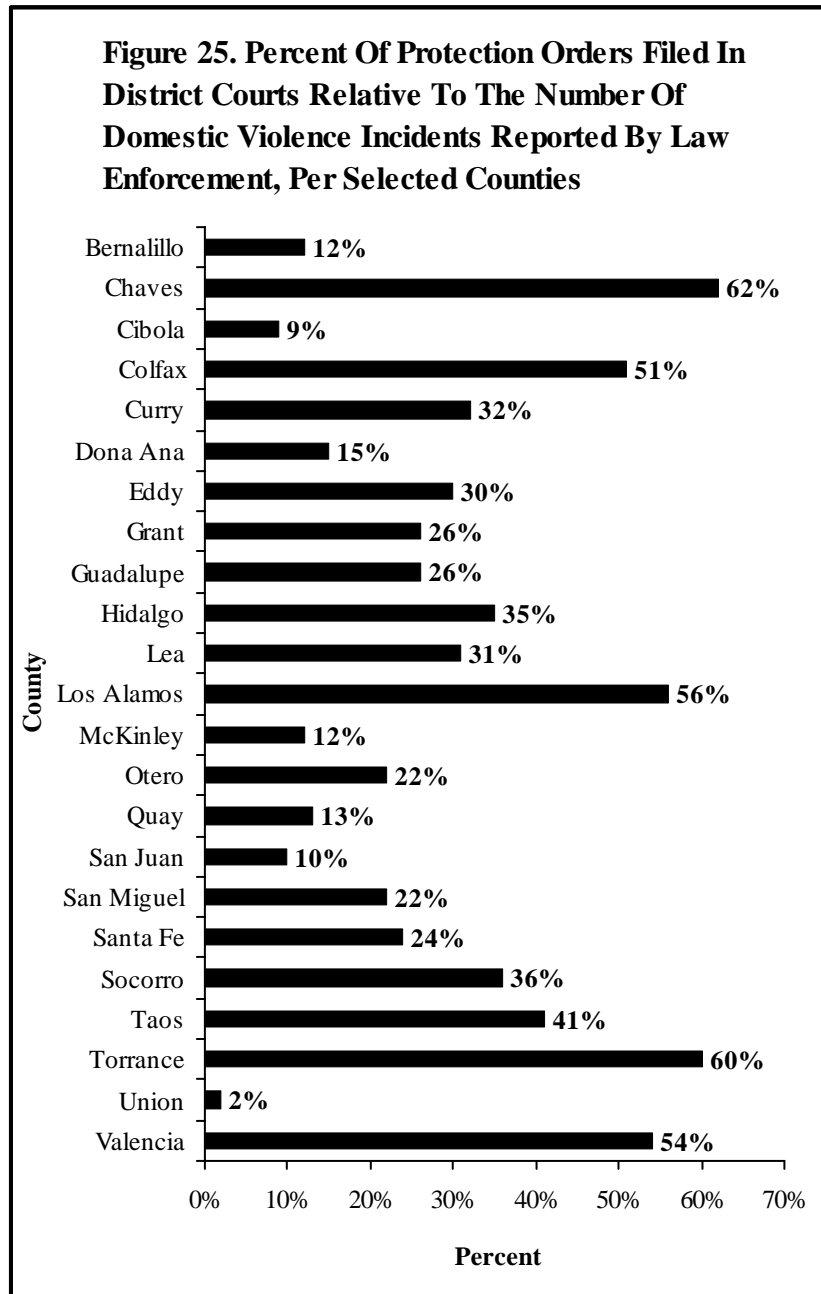

In counties with the most complete reporting (those with the law enforcement agency from the largest city in the county reporting and with a minimum of 20 cases) a comparison was made between the number of protection orders filed in each county and the number of domestic violence cases reported to law enforcement in each county. *Chaves County* had the highest number of protection orders filed in District Court relative to the number of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement in *Chaves*

Y. How Many Domestic Violence Charges Were Filed in District and Magistrate Courts in 2007

In law enforcement there is an undetermined number of domestic violence cases documented and processed as other crimes, such as fire, destruction of property, vandalism, homicide, false imprisonment, car collisions, etc., that are not known to be domestic violence related, or when known, are not always entered into each law enforcement agency’s database coded as domestic-related. Therefore, the family violence nature of the crime is not captured. This same problem in capturing some domestic violence incidents is true in the courts, as well.

With aggregate data, the best approach to capture as much reliable domestic violence incidents as possible, is to establish a consistent definition of domestic violence when extracting such data from law enforcement and court information systems. To this end, domestic violence cases examined from the courts include the following law enforcement charges, all perpetrated against a household member: *assault (A)*, *aggravated assault (AA)*, *battery (B)*, *aggravated battery (AB)*, *stalking (S)*, *aggravated stalking (AS)*, and *assault with intent to commit violent felony (AIF)*. Data from all 32 district courts (**Appendix J**) and 48 magistrate courts (**Appendix K**) were extracted from the statewide Administrative Office of the Courts automated system. Data from the *Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court (BCMC)* case management database system were not provided to the Central Repository for this report.

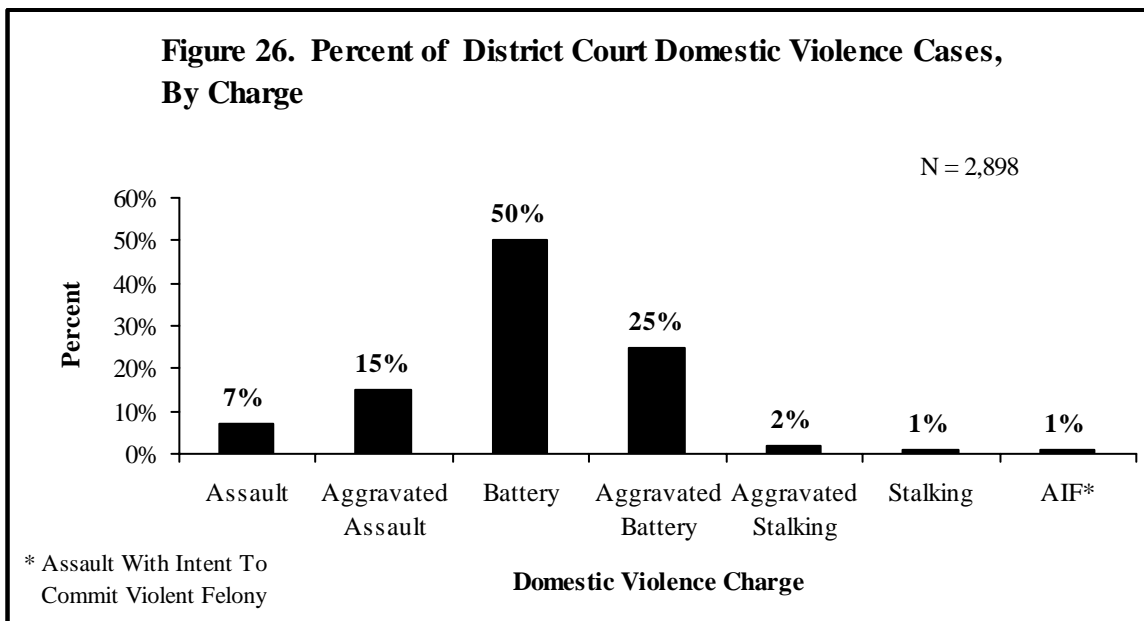
Of the 2,898 domestic violence cases disposed by the district courts in 2007, almost two-thirds (65%) were handled by four district courts: the *Albuquerque District Court*, 1,227 (42%); the *Las Cruces District Court*, 354 (12%); the *Aztec District Court*, 179 (6%); and *Clovis District Court*, 143 (5%).

AA. What Types of Domestic Violence Charges Are Processed In the Courts

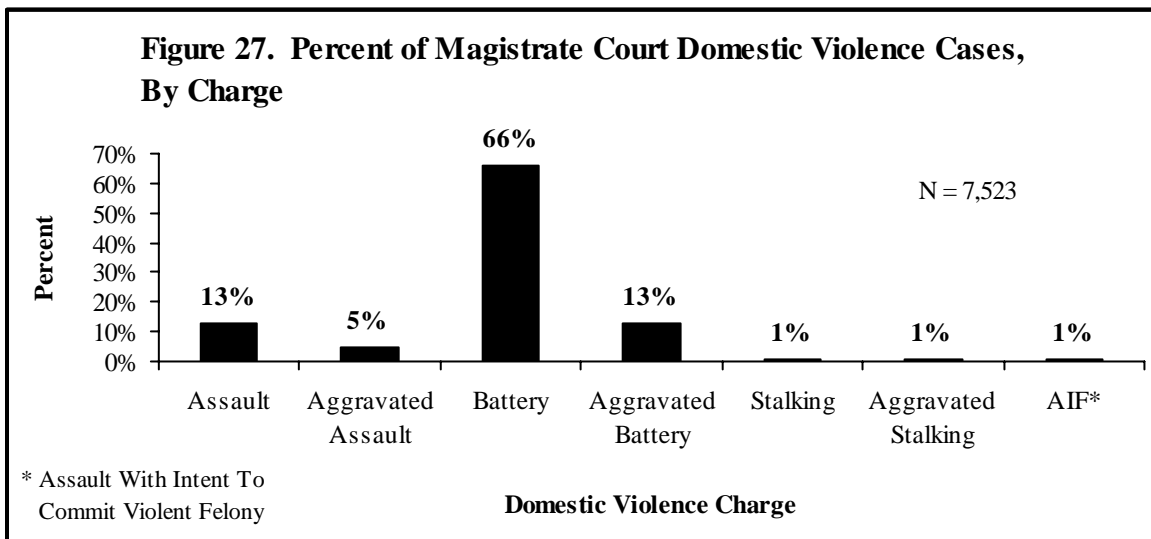
1. District Court

Three-quarters (75%) of district court domestic violence cases included charges of *battery* (50%) or *aggravated battery* (25%). *Aggravated assault* and *assault* comprised 15% and 7% of domestic violence cases, respectively. *Aggravated stalking* comprised 2% of domestic violence cases, while *stalking* and *assault with intent to commit violent felony* comprised 1%, respectively. See **Figure 26**.



2. Magistrate Court

Of 7,523 disposed cases of domestic violence in magistrate courts, 79% were *battery* (66%) and *aggravated battery* (13%) charges. *Assault* and *aggravated assault* comprised 13% and 5% of cases, respectively. *Stalking*, *aggravated stalking*, and *assault with intent to commit violent felony* comprised 1%, respectively, of domestic violence cases disposed by the magistrate courts (see **Figure 27**). These small proportions of domestic violence crimes with aggravating circumstances in magistrate courts are a reflection of the purview of the magistrate courts. Normally, crimes with aggravating circumstances, such as *aggravated battery*, *aggravated stalking*, *aggravated assault* and *assault with intent to commit a violent felony* are processed as felonies in the district courts.

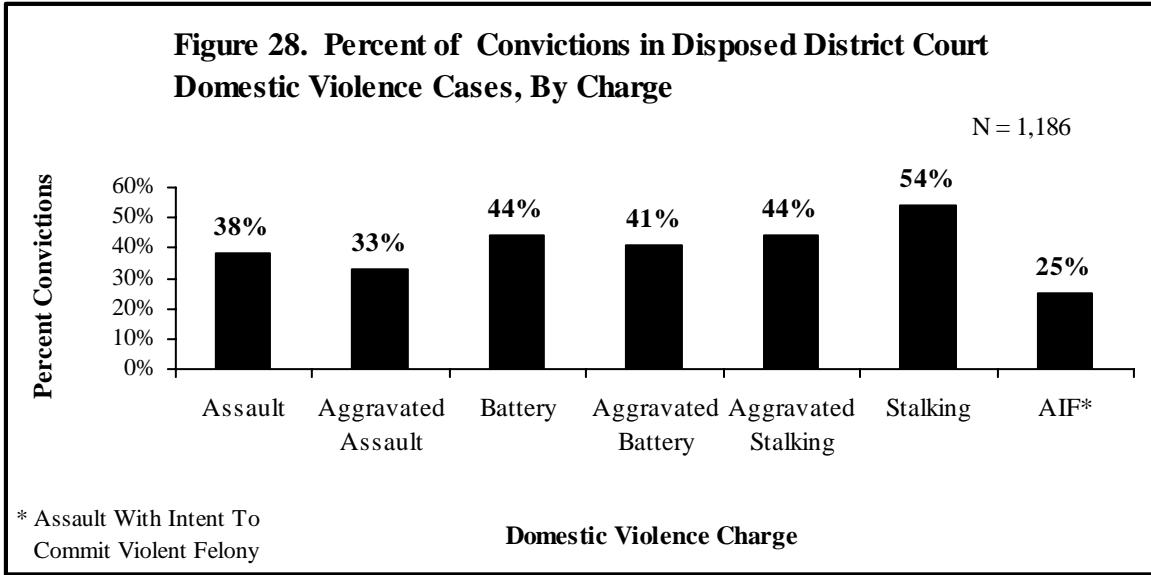

Of all the domestic violence cases handled by the district courts, *stalking* had the highest percent of convictions (54%), followed by *aggravated stalking* and *battery* (44%, respectively). One-third of disposed *assault* (38%) and *aggravated assault* (33%) cases obtained a conviction and one-quarter of disposed cases of *assault with intent to commit violent felony* obtained a conviction. 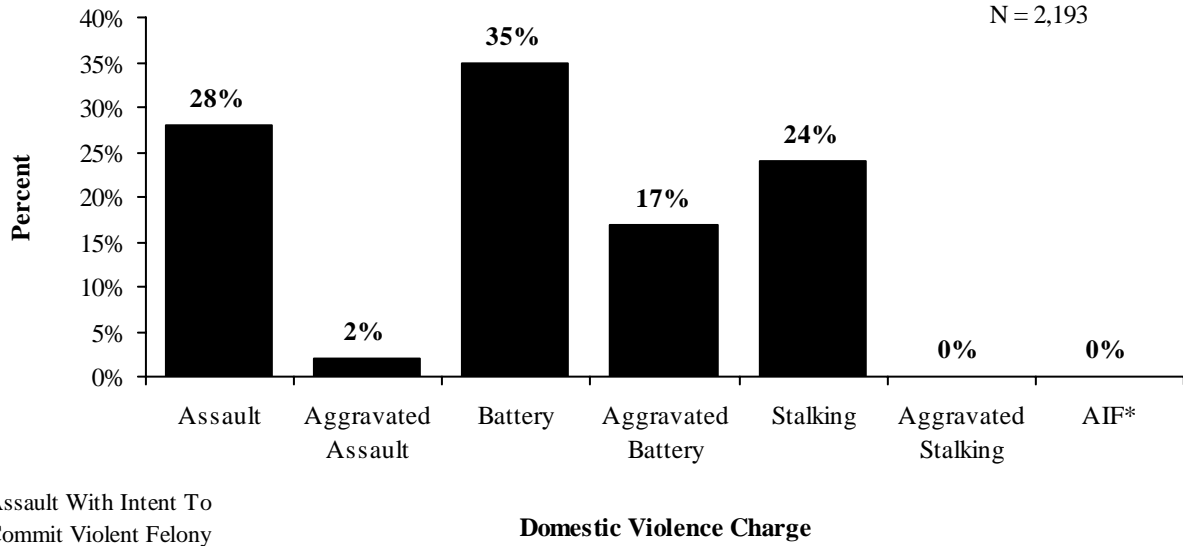

SECTION TWO: Implications and Limitations of the Data

I. IMPLICATIONS OF THE FINDINGS

A. Underreporting of Interpersonal Violence and Law Enforcement Procedural Training

- In 2007, law enforcement identified 17,487 victims from 22,286 reported incidents of domestic violence. The SVV identified almost twice as many victims (36,594) and each experienced an average of 5.5 incidents in the previous year. Similarly, in 2007 law enforcement identified 162 stalking victims. The SVV identified 17,177 victims and each experienced an average of 14.3 incidents last year. There are numerous administrative and procedural issues that affect accurate reporting of domestic violence and stalking incidents ranging from whether and how police offense incident reports are written, how these reports are entered into law enforcement databases or otherwise counted, what aggregate information is submitted to the Central Repository and how information is entered into the Central Repository. The issues surrounding identification of stalking incidents and victims are particularly worrisome. The SVV demonstrated that while one-third of stalking victims reported their experience to law enforcement, there were significantly fewer arrests for stalking (5.5%) than for domestic and intimate partner violence (17% respectively). It is imperative to provide necessary training to all law enforcement officers, administrative personnel, and executive personnel whose policies guide law enforcement procedure regarding the description, documentation and data entry of interpersonal violence crimes.

B. Underreporting of Interpersonal Violence: Law Enforcement Interpersonal Violence Training, Victim Education and Advocacy, and Healthcare Surveillance

- Incidents of domestic violence go unreported to law enforcement due to refusal of family, friends, or neighbors to report. Furthermore, as many as 53% (4,436) of the adult victims who sought services from domestic violence service providers claimed they did not report their incident to law enforcement. This is similar to the 50% of adult victims who report their crime to law enforcement nationally. Nationally, most victims (15.4%) who do not report said they considered the victimization a *private or personal matter*. However, only slightly fewer victims (13.2%) did not report because they were *afraid of retaliation* by the offender, *believed that the police would do nothing* (7.3%), or *did not consider the incident was important enough* to report it to police (4.4%). These findings have implications regarding the need for prevention and treatment strategies that include law enforcement training on the dynamics of domestic violence, and victim training on adopting a safety plan and legal advocacy.
- Patients that are seen in the healthcare/emergency room setting with a domestic violence- and stalking-related injury are typically not reported to law enforcement and represent an additional area of underreporting. While many healthcare facilities use screening tools to identify patients who are victims of domestic violence, no standardized monitoring system to reliably document the number of these individuals currently exists. Methods to determine healthcare utilization by victims of interpersonal violence through e-codes or billing databases have been unsuccessful and are unreliable at best, due to definitional problems of the codes, practitioner discretion and inconsistencies in naming injuries, and the insurance related intentions of billing databases. The need

to rectify these problems is underscored by findings from the SVV which revealed substantial comorbidity with interpersonal violence victims with regard to serious disabling injury and chronic mental health problems. Additionally, one-third to one-half of interpersonal violence victims were injured and over one-third of them sought medical treatment. Increased accuracy in reporting interpersonal violence incidents and identifying victims for referral to needed interventions requires interpersonal violence surveillance initiatives in New Mexico healthcare facilities.

C. Interpersonal Violence Prevention Aimed At Adolescents

- In 2007, of the 14,863 law enforcement incidents documenting the victim/offender relationship, 61% were perpetrated by a current or former intimate partner, 42% of these by current or former boyfriends/girlfriends who are or were dating or living together. Ninety-percent of adult victims who sought services from a domestic violence service provider were assaulted by a current or former intimate partner, 28% of these were dating or living together. The SSV found that two-thirds (66.5%) of domestic violence incidents were perpetrated by current or former intimate partners, one-third of these were dating or living together. Similarly, stalking behaviors begin in adolescents and the incidence of adolescent stalking is almost twice that of adolescent intimate partner violence. The high proportion of interpersonal violence cases perpetrated by those not yet married, demonstrate that true prevention requires early education initiatives on building healthy relationships during adolescence.

D. Alcohol and Drug Education and Treatment in the Prevention of Domestic Violence

- In 2007, alcohol and/or other drug use was documented in 37% of law enforcement incidents, 93% of these involved *suspect* use of alcohol/drugs and 19% involved *victim* use of alcohol/drugs. Additionally, 21% of adult victims served by domestic violence service providers reported being under the influence of alcohol/drugs at the time of their incident. Findings from the SVV revealed that alcohol/drug use is significantly more likely among male victims and offenders than female victims and offenders. Implications for treatment for both victims and offenders include alcohol and drug prevention education and rehabilitation services with particular focus on males.

E. Stopping The Cycle of Domestic Violence: Helping Children from Violent Families

- On average in New Mexico, 1 in every 7 incidents of domestic violence reported by law enforcement involved a child witness and an average of two children were present at each. Of greater frequency, at least one child was present in 1 out of every 1.6 adult victim cases handled by domestic violence service providers. Too many children experienced physical abuse (48%) and sexual abuse (4%) at the hands of their adult-victim's offender. To be sure, the rates of physical and sexual abuse among these children and their national counterparts is grossly underreported. Even so, the information regarding children victim-witnesses is particularly disturbing since research demonstrates that a significant number of children who witness their mothers being abused by their fathers suffer from anxiety and depression and act out with their parents and siblings. Additionally, children who witness abuse suffer poor health, low self-esteem, poor impulse control, sleeping difficulties, and feelings of powerlessness. Furthermore, they are at high risk for alcohol and drug use, sexual acting out, running away from home, isolation, loneliness, fear, and suicide.

- Perhaps the percent of *adult victims* (58%) and *offenders* (63%) in New Mexico who were *abused as children* is a testament to the validity of such research regarding the negative consequences of experiencing abuse in the home as a child. Since 79% of the children present at the scene of the incident (as reported by domestic violence service providers) were under the age of 13, there is a need for early identification, education, and therapeutic interventions for children living in violent families.

F. Interpersonal Violence Advocacy and Prevention

- In New Mexico in 2007, 27% of domestic violence victims identified by law enforcement were males. Findings from the SVV demonstrated that 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, 1 in 10 a victim of intimate partner violence and 1 in 14 a victim of stalking. More outreach must be done to identify male victims of interpersonal violence to offer prevention and treatment programs specific to males.

G. Providing Offender Treatment Programs

- In New Mexico, 75% of suspects identified by law enforcement and 86% of offenders identified by domestic violence service providers are *male*. Findings from the SVV revealed that 83% of stalking offenders and 80% of domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders respectively, are male. Even when males are the victims in interpersonal violence crimes, half to two-thirds are being victimized by a male. Perhaps greater outcomes in domestic violence prevention may be realized through greater availability of offender prevention and therapeutic programs that include strategies for addressing aggression in male socialization.
- Findings from the SVV reveal that almost half of the adults in New Mexico who were ever a victim of domestic violence, intimate partner violence or stalking were also sexually assaulted. This suggests that effective prevention and treatment programs for interpersonal violence must include components of sexual assault prevention and treatment or must provide referrals to appropriate sexual assault services.

H. Interpersonal Violence and Needed Changes in Law Enforcement, Prosecution and The Courts To Reduce The Risk of Harm for Male and Female Victims

- Findings from the SVV demonstrate that female victims are more likely than male victims to report their offense, two times more likely to file criminal charges against their offenders and are more likely to get a restraining order against their offenders, even though interpersonal crimes with male victims involve more alcohol/drugs, weapon use and more serious disabling injury. Additionally, while half of all restraining orders are violated, male victims of intimate partner violence crimes are more likely to have a restraining order violated, less likely to have their offenders arrested, and significantly more likely that the charges against their offenders will be dropped or the offenders will obtain an acquittal. Further, if their offenders are convicted, offenders of male victims are more likely to serve less time in jail or prison than offenders of female victims.
- While all of the system failures that contribute to the high risk of harm for female victims of interpersonal violence were widely known, it is clear from these findings that interpersonal violence is dangerous for males, as well. While both genders do not utilize system protections as they should, male victims are even less likely than female victims to do so; and even when system protections are

sought for intimate partner violence, violations of restraining orders are more frequent and convictions of their offenders less frequent for male victims. All of this speaks to: 1) the need for early education to correct misconceptions in gender socialization; 2) greater community education to increase awareness of the incidence and risk of interpersonal violence among males; 3) comprehensive training of law enforcement, prosecutors and judges regarding the high risk of harm for men and women victims of interpersonal violence and the development of protocols in their respective disciplines aimed at reducing the likelihood of harm, disability and death of all interpersonal violence victims.

I. Developing Appropriate Interpersonal Violence Prevention Programs with Gender, Race/Ethnicity, and Education Considerations

- Beliefs about personal safety for women, one's own personal safety and the likelihood to carry something to protect oneself differ based on one's gender, education level and race/ethnicity. The higher the education level, the more likely females are to: 1) believe that personal safety for women today has gotten worse since they were children; 2) be somewhat or very concerned about their own personal safety; and 3) carry something with them to defend themselves or to alert other people. Fewer males, than females of every education level believe that personal safety for women has gotten worse. Indeed, more high school males believe that personal safety for women has improved.
- While more Whites (non-Hispanic) (53%) and Blacks (56%) believe that personal safety for women today has gotten worse, more American Indians (53%) are *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety. Interestingly, there is a significant disconnect between Hispanic males and females regarding the personal safety for women today. The greatest proportion of Hispanic females (44%) report that personal safety for women today has gotten worse, while the greatest proportion of Hispanic males (40%) report that it has improved. More male (45%) and female (43%) respondents of *mixed race/ethnicity* carry something to defend themselves than respondents of other races/ethnicities, followed by White (non-Hispanic) females (36%) and American Indian males (33%).
- Since more females than males of every race/ethnicity are victims of interpersonal violence crimes, it is not surprising that more females, than males are concerned about their own personal safety. However, except for White (non-Hispanic) females, this does not result in the adoption of a protective behavior. Indeed, more males than females of every other race/ethnicity carry something to defend themselves. The implications regarding the differences in one's beliefs based on education, race and gender are unclear. However, more sensitivity to these distinctions in beliefs needs to be addressed in interpersonal violence prevention programs.

II. LIMITATIONS OF THE DATA AND FUTURE DATA NEEDS

While it is extremely important to have a statewide estimate of domestic violence based on standardized data collected from several disciplines or service domains (law enforcement, domestic violence service providers, and district and magistrate courts), there are several areas of data collection that need to be upgraded and/or expanded to improve the quality of the data. The goal is to obtain a clearer picture of domestic violence in our state with regard to its burden on families, the criminal justice, judicial, and healthcare systems and the economic toll on individuals, professional helping agencies and the State of New Mexico.

A. Law Enforcement

- Improve the accuracy of domestic violence victim and suspect identification. Data submitted to the Central Repository by law enforcement agencies are in aggregate form and derived from officer-submitted offense incident reports. The way an individual officer completes the offense incident form directly impacts what is counted as a domestic violence incident and the identification of suspects and victims. For instance, victims in the Albuquerque Police Department database are identified by a "V" code on the offense incident report. However, an officer responding to a domestic violence incident may fill in a "PR" code as "person reporting" or "I" code for "person interviewed" rather than a "V" code and these victims would not be counted. The same is true for suspect designations. This in part, explains why 22,286 reported domestic violence incidents only had 17,487 victims and 20,326 suspects identified. Additionally, some law enforcement agencies simply do not complete the victim and suspect information requested on the standardized law enforcement data collection form. Better identification of victims and suspects involved in domestic violence cases is warranted, as well as better identification and reporting of stalking incidents.
- The Albuquerque Police Department and the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office do not differentiate crimes committed by *boyfriends* and *girlfriends* but instead categorize them together. This makes it impossible to differentiate the incidence of *boyfriend* offenders from the incidence of *girlfriend* offenders. Since true prevention of domestic violence requires changes in offender behavior, the actual number of offenders by gender is needed to justify gender-specific curriculum development in prevention programs.
- Injuries as currently defined by terms on the offense incident reports are not mutually exclusive. For instance, some *internal injuries* and *severe lacerations* may also be *major injuries*. A more sensitive value for representing the type of injuries incurred is needed to more accurately define and count the kinds of injuries actually being incurred by victims, suspects and police. Further, more effort should be made to accurately capture injuries to law enforcement personnel responding to domestic violence incidents.

B. District Attorney's Offices

- Greater study must be focused on what the district attorney's offices need to process domestic violence cases in a timely and accurate manner, and then appropriate steps taken to address identified roadblocks. In practice, those district attorney's offices that have a specialized prosecution unit, i.e. one or more prosecutors assigned exclusively to domestic violence cases (depending on the size of the court's jurisdiction) have less cases dismissed for lack of preparation and therefore, more cases prosecuted. For this reason, all statewide district attorney's offices should be encouraged to establish a specialized prosecution unit.
- Greater advances in vertical prosecution which prosecute crimes based on evidence and do not require the victim to press charges or testify, would greatly reduce the high number of dismissals for this reason. Requiring victims who fear retribution from the offender or economic ruin for themselves and their children to testify as a requirement of prosecution, merely encourages the cycle of abuse. In the end, only 29% of disposed magistrate court cases of domestic violence ended with an offender conviction. Furthermore, the percent of cases that did not make it to disposition is not exactly clear from currently provided data. This is not encouraging news for victims whose purpose for involving the court is to obtain protection from the offender. Indeed, it is the frequency of such experiences which discourages survivors from reporting subsequent assaults perpetrated on themselves and their children.

- Data needs from the Administrative Office of the District Attorney's (AODA) include case disposition information such as the number of convictions at trial, the number of pled cases and pled to lesser charges, the number of trial acquittals, and sentencing information on both misdemeanor and felony domestic violence charges. Currently, no reliable data from the AODA has been made available to the Central Repository.
- The New Mexico Sentencing Commission study proposed the “Next Step” in obtaining sentencing information from district attorney’s offices:

“During the pilot project we learned there is not a single data source that maintains all the information needed to study sentencing in domestic violence cases. The District Attorneys have the majority of the information needed; but unfortunately it is not available in an electronic format. It is not feasible to travel to District Attorneys’ offices to collect the incident characteristics, prior criminal history, and sentencing considerations for all cases statewide. However, it is important to collect this information on a larger sample of cases to see if a sentencing model can be developed based on incident characteristics and other variables. In December 2007, the project advisory group endorsed a prospective approach to collecting this information statewide. The approach involves asking District Attorneys’ offices to fill out a data collection form provided by NMSC at the time of sentencing for every case that has a HHM (household member) crime. In talks with District Attorneys, we learned that at the time of sentencing the information on the form is fresh in their minds and could be completed relatively quickly. Beginning July 1, 2008, NMSC staff will train District Attorneys’ offices that voluntarily agree to complete the form. Additionally, NMSC will provide the District Attorneys’ postage to send the completed forms back. The information will then be entered into a database and NMSC staff will look up offenders’ prior court cases.”

- It is recommended that the Administrative Office of the District Attorneys support this initiative and accordingly, exercise its influence with the District Attorneys’ offices statewide to adopt and implement the use of this data collection form.

C. The Courts

- While the Administrative Office of the Courts provides domestic violence information to the Central Repository for all district and magistrate courts throughout the state, the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court (BCMC) does not participate. This is quite disturbing, since it is the largest jurisdiction in the state and handles the most misdemeanor cases. A better effort should be made on the part of BCMC to address whatever obstacles exist that prevent them from reporting on their court’s activity regarding domestic violence crimes in Bernalillo County.
- In the last five years, law enforcement officers have been trained in the investigation of domestic violence cases to promote prosecution based on case evidence versus victim testimony, as is done in homicide, suicide and other crimes. However, many magistrate judges throughout the state still dismiss evidence-based prosecution cases if the victim does not appear, as well. The recommendation is for all magistrate judges to be trained on the merits of evidence-based prosecution so that cases without victim testimony will still be accepted for prosecution.

D. Domestic Violence Service Providers

- There are seven agencies that provide services to domestic violence victims that are not active in our statewide surveillance: *Family Harmony Project* (Crownpoint), *Laguna Family Services* (Laguna), *Prevention Services/Domestic Violence Program* (Dulce), *Jemez Domestic Violence Program* (Jemez), *Santa Ana Domestic Violence Program* and *El Puente* (Socorro). These programs serve the needs of American Indians. Unfortunately, no organization that represents American Indians has been successful in capturing their victimization experience and sharing the information with statewide professional helping organizations, state government and the legislature. This lack of information makes it extremely difficult to consider the needs of American Indian victims and formulate an appropriate response to address them. Therefore, American Indian organizations are encouraged to establish a standardized system of data capture and information sharing to improve statewide and community response to violence in their families.

E. Medical Facilities

- The process for collecting standardized domestic violence data from statewide medical facilities is not yet completed. Since many times the first, and perhaps only contact a victim may have with the "helping system" is through a hospital emergency department or physicians' office, this creates a significant void in the Central Repository data and represents a major obstacle in accurately defining the scope and nature of domestic violence in our state. Moreover, until better protocols are established for identifying patient visits associated with interpersonal violence, a significant portion of the total cost of interpersonal violence to individuals, their communities and the state cannot be estimated.

F. Closing Comments

The aforementioned improvements in data collection will ultimately be required to answer the type of domestic violence questions that are most critical in guiding public policy decisions, program development and the most effective allocation of resources. To this end, the Central Repository Director will continue to pursue collaborations with statewide agencies (both current participants and non-participants) and the State Department of Health and the Department of Public Safety to develop a process for enhancing our present data collection system.

Appendix A. Survey of Violence Victimization Summary

I. INTRODUCTION

Nationally, victimization surveys such as the National Crime Victims Survey and the National Violence Against Women Survey capture more comprehensive estimates of crimes, and in particular, interpersonal violence crimes than that which is captured by law enforcement. While New Mexico law enforcement agencies have reported their incidents of domestic violence, intimate partner violence, stalking and sexual assault to the Central Repository, determining the rates of these crimes that were *never* reported to law enforcement was not possible. The long term goal to rectify this problem and make possible more accurate estimates on the prevalence and incidence of interpersonal violence in New Mexico was to conduct our own statewide victimization survey. To this end, in 2005 the *Statewide Survey of Victimization in New Mexico* (SSV) was conducted, asking 2000 adult men and 2000 adult women about their experiences of violence. While all data captured from this survey will be analyzed over the course of time, several discouraging realities are clear from the preliminary findings of this survey:

1. The rates of domestic violence, intimate partner violence and stalking in New Mexico are staggering; and higher than national comparable rates found in the National Violence Against Women Survey (NVAWS), the most comprehensive victimization survey to date;
2. These interpersonal violence crimes are significantly under-reported to law enforcement;
3. There are significantly more victims of interpersonal violence than ever identified by law enforcement or service providers statewide, especially in the case of stalking;
4. There are significant co-morbidity and healthcare utilization associated with interpersonal violence; and
5. There are significant differences between males and females in the experience and adjudication of interpersonal violence crimes.

II. FINDINGS

A. Prevalence and Incidence of Interpersonal Violence

Fifteen percent or 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, and 32% or 1 in 3 adult females. Unfortunately, there is no comparable national rate available, as only physical assault in general, is captured.

Ten percent or 1 in 10 adult males has been the victim of intimate partner violence in his lifetime compared to 7% nationally (NVAWS). One-quarter (25%) or 1 in 4 adult females has been the victim of intimate partner violence in her lifetime compared to 22% nationally (NVAWS).

Seven percent or 1 in 14 adult males has been the victim of stalking in his lifetime compared to 4% nationally (NVAWS). One-quarter (25%) or 1 in 4 females has been the victim of stalking in her lifetime compared to 12% nationally (NVAWS).

In 2005 in New Mexico, 28,256 cases of domestic violence were reported to law enforcement, and 18,778 victims identified, which is half (51%) of the victims identified (36,594) in the SSV in the same time period. Domestic violence victims reported an average of 5.5 victimizations each by their offender in the last year, resulting in an estimated 201,267 incidents of domestic violence in New Mexico in 2005.

In 2005, law enforcement identified 206 stalking victims. The SSV identified 17,177 stalking victims in the same time period (83 times as many). Stalking victims reported experiencing an average of 14.3 stalking incidents each in the last year, resulting in an estimated 245,631 incidents of stalking in New Mexico in 2005.

B. Interpersonal Violence and Injury

Each year, law enforcement and service providers report the number of domestic violence victims that are injured as a result of their assault. In 2005, over one-quarter (28%) of law enforcement reported domestic violence incidents resulted in victim injury; and service providers reported that one-third (34%) of the adult victims they served were injured. Findings from the SSV reported that a significant proportion of those who were ever victims of domestic violence (44%), intimate partner violence (47%) and stalking (44%) were injured in their assaults. However, until now, we have never known how many victims of interpersonal violence sought medical care as a result of their injuries. In New Mexico, no standardized or centralized reporting process exists for capturing information on how many victims of interpersonal violence seek medical care.

C. Interpersonal Violence and Healthcare Utilization

Findings from the SSV reveal that slightly over one-third of those in New Mexico who were ever victims of domestic violence (35%), intimate partner violence (37%) and stalking (38%) went for medical treatment as a result of their injuries.

What we do not know, is how much healthcare utilization occurs as a result of co-morbidity among interpersonal violence victims. For instance, the SSV revealed that adults who were ever victims of domestic violence (16.5%), intimate partner violence (17%) and stalking (16%), experienced serious, disabling injury at twice the rate of the non-victimized population (8%). Additionally, adults who were ever victims of domestic violence (12%), intimate partner violence (11%) and stalking (12%) were nearly four times more likely to suffer from one or more chronic mental health conditions than non-violence victims (3%).

D. Men as Victims and Offenders in Interpersonal Violence

It is widely reported nationally and locally that most victims of interpersonal violence are females and most offenders are males. What was not known, and is most interesting, is that most *male* victims of interpersonal violence are victimized by a *male*, as well. A significant proportion of males who were ever victims of stalking (51%), domestic violence (62%) and intimate partner violence (49%) were victimized by a male.

E. Relationship Between Victims and Offenders of Interpersonal Violence

Two-thirds (66%) of victims of intimate partner violence were assaulted by an ex-romantic partner. Most (33%) stalking victims were stalked by someone they knew but not a relative or ever a romantic interest. Stalking victims were equally likely to be stalked by a stranger (28%) as an ex-romantic partner (27.5%).

F. Interpersonal Violence Involving Sexual Assault

The proportion of New Mexico adults who were ever stalked and also sexually assaulted in their lifetimes (48%) was greater than those who were ever domestic violence victims and sexually assaulted (45%) and intimate partner violence victims and sexually assaulted (44%). However, in the course of one's lifetime, one could be stalked by one person and sexually assaulted by another. A better measure of the rate of sexual assault by the same individual who commits physical assault is obtained by examining intimate partner violence in the last 12 months. Among intimate partner violence victims last year, 11.5% reported being sexually assaulted by their intimate partner. More female intimate partner violence victims were sexually assaulted (13%) than male intimate partner violence victims (9%).

G. Gender Differences in Interpersonal Violence

1. Interpersonal Violence and Weapons

In 2005, over one-third (38%) of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement involved a weapon. However, with aggregate reporting instead of individual records, it was not possible to determine if there was a difference in the rate of weapon use among the interpersonal violence crimes or if there was a difference in weapon use based on the gender of the victim. The SSV revealed that 32% of domestic violence, 33% intimate partner violence and 31% stalking incidents involved a weapon; and each of these crimes was significantly more likely to involve a weapon if the victim was male, than female: domestic violence (36% males, 30% female); intimate partner violence (41% male, 30% female); and stalking (39% male, 29% female).

2. Interpersonal Violence and Restraining Orders

Over the last four years, the Central Repository has reported that the average number of protection or restraining orders issued by the District Courts was equal to roughly one-quarter (26%) of the number of domestic violence incidents reported to law enforcement. The SSV revealed similar results, as roughly one-quarter of domestic violence (21%), intimate partner violence (23%) and stalking (26%) victims obtained a restraining order. However, results from the SSV showed that female domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were 2.5 times more likely to obtain a restraining order than their male counterparts. Similarly, female stalking victims were almost two times more likely than males to obtain a restraining order.

As a result of the SSV, we have our first measure of how many restraining orders are violated by the offender. Over half of all restraining orders in interpersonal violence crimes were violated: domestic violence (53.5%); intimate partner violence (56%); and stalking (51%); and

restraining orders obtained by male intimate partner violence victims had the highest rate of violation (58%).

3. Interpersonal Violence Reported to Law Enforcement and Rate of Arrests

Over the last three years, the Central Repository reported that an average of 54% of domestic violence victims who went for help reported their victimization incident to law enforcement. The SSV revealed significant differences in the rate of reporting to law enforcement by the victims of the three types of interpersonal violence crimes: domestic violence (38%), intimate partner violence (41%), and stalking (34%). While one-third of stalking victims reported their victimization to law enforcement, there were fewer arrests for stalking (5.5%), than for domestic violence and intimate partner violence (17%, respectively). Moreover, in cases of domestic violence and intimate partner violence, more offender arrests were made when there was a female victim. With stalking crimes, the arrest rate was almost equal for crimes perpetrated against female (6%) and male victims (5%).

4. Interpersonal Violence and Criminal Charges

Domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were more likely to file criminal charges (1 in 7, respectively) than stalking victims (1 in 17). Again, domestic violence and intimate partner violence female victims were two times more likely to file charges than male victims. Conversely, female and male victims of stalking were equally likely to file criminal charges.

H. Dispositions in Interpersonal Violence Crimes

Stalking offenders had the fewest outcomes with charges dropped (13%) compared to offenders of domestic violence (25%) and intimate partner violence (28%) offenders. Additionally, stalking offenders had the highest rate of guilty pleas or convictions (51%) over domestic violence offenders (38%) and intimate partner violence offenders (39%). Offenders of each interpersonal violence crime involving a female victim were significantly more likely to plead guilty than offenders of each with a male victim. The rate of acquittals for offenders of male domestic violence and intimate partner violence were 4 and 5 times, respectively, the rate of offender acquittals for these crimes with a female victim. Conversely, offenders of stalking with a male victim were much less likely to obtain an acquittal (<1%) than stalking offenders with a female victim (5%).

Roughly two-thirds of all those sentenced for interpersonal violence crimes were sentenced to jail or prison. The average sentence length for convicted domestic violence offenders (3.04 years) was longer than that of intimate partner violence offenders (2.7 years) and stalking offenders (1.97 years). Domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders received a longer average sentence when the victim was a female, while stalking offenders received a slightly longer average sentence when the victim was a male. Offenders sentenced for stalking a male victim actually served a longer average sentence (2.0 years) than offenders sentenced for intimate partner violence with a male victim (1.5 years).

APPENDIX B. RESPONDENT BELIEFS ABOUT PERSONAL SAFETY FOR WOMEN TODAY, THEIR OWN PERSONAL SAFETY AND ACCOMMODATING BEHAVIOR

- The SVV data was examined to assess respondents' beliefs about personal safety for women today, beliefs about their own personal safety, and accommodating behavior, specifically whether or not they carry something with them to defend themselves or alert other people. These variables were examined by the respondents' education level, race/ethnicity and whether or not they have been a victim of interpersonal violence (victims/non-victims).

1. Education Level

- Overall, the higher the education level, the more likely respondents are to believe that personal safety for women today has gotten worse. While this is true for males and females, the average proportion of females of every education level (51%) is significantly more than their male counterparts (38%) that believe that it *has gotten worse*. In fact, more high school males actually believe that personal safety for women *has improved* (36%), than believe it *has gotten worse* (30%).
- For females, the higher the education level, the more likely they are to be *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety. Over half (54%) of female respondents with a college/post-college degree report being *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety compared to 42% of those with some high school or less.
- Male respondents by education level, report the inverse of females with regard to beliefs about their own personal safety. More males with some high school or less (42%) are concerned about their own personal safety, compared to 26% of males with a college/post-college degree.
- The higher the education level for females, the more likely they are to carry something with them to defend themselves. Almost one-third (31%) of college/post-college women report they carry something compared to 11% of women with some high school or less.
- For males, more high school graduates and those with some college education (26%, respectively) carry something to defend themselves, than males from any other education level.

2. Race/Ethnicity

- Over half of *White (non-Hispanics)* (53%) and *Blacks* (56%) believe that personal safety for women today *has gotten worse* since they were a child, while slightly over one-third (38%, respectively) of *Hispanics* and *American Indians* believe this to be the case.
- There is a dramatic disconnect between Hispanic males and females with regard to beliefs about personal safety for women today. The greatest proportion of females (44%) report that personal safety for women today *has gotten worse*, while the greatest proportion of males (40%) report that it *has improved*.
- More *American Indians* (53%) report being *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety than respondents from all other racial/ethnic groups. An equal proportion

of *Blacks* (50%, respectively) are *somewhat or very concerned* as were *not really or just a little concerned*.

- For males, more *American Indians* (58%) and *Blacks* (55%) are *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety than males from other racial/ethnic groups where more reported being *not really or just a little concerned*. Slightly over one-quarter of *Hispanic* males and females, and one-third respectively of *White (non-Hispanic) females* and *American Indian males* carry something with them to defend themselves.

3. Victim/non-Victim Status

- While more *victims* (48%) than *non-victims* (41%) in New Mexico believe that personal safety for women *has gotten worse*, more respondents in both groups believe it *has improved or stayed about the same*. Ironically, however, twice as many *female non-victims* believe that personal safety for women today *has gotten worse* (46%) than believe it *has improved* (23%).
- More females whether they have ever been a victim or not, are *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety than their male counterparts; and significantly more *female victims* are *somewhat or very concerned* (55%), than *female non-victims* (41%).
- Slightly over one-third of male and female *victims* carry something with them to defend themselves compared to less than one-quarter of *non-victims* that carry something to defend themselves.

APPENDIX C. DEFINITIONS

Domestic violence incidence as determined by law enforcement include all incidents of assault, aggravated assault, battery, and aggravated battery as outlined in the “Crimes Against Household Members Act” as follows:

30-3-10. Short Title.

This act (30-3-10 to 30-3-16 NMSA 1978) may be cited as the “Crimes Against Household Members Act”.

30-3-11. Definitions

As used in the Crimes Against Household Members Act (30-3-10 to 30-3-16 NMSA 1978), “household member” means spouse, former spouse or family member, including a relative, parent, present or former step-parent, present or former in-law, a co-parent of a child or a person with whom a person has had a continuing personal relationship. Cohabitation is not necessary to be deemed a household member for the purposes of the Crimes Against Household Members Act.

30-3-12. Assault against a household member.

- A. Assault against a household member consists of:
 - (1) an attempt to commit a battery against a household member; or
 - (2) any unlawful act, threat or menacing conduct that causes a household member to reasonably believe that he is in danger of receiving an immediate battery.
- B. Whoever commits assault against a household member is guilty of a petty misdemeanor.

30-3-13. Aggravated assault against a household member.

- A. Aggravated assault against a household member consists of:
 - (1) unlawfully assaulting or striking at a household member with a deadly weapon; or
 - (2) willfully and intentionally assaulting a household member with intent to commit any felony.
- B. Whoever commits aggravated assault against a household member is guilty of a fourth degree felony.

30-3-14. Assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony.

- A. Assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony consists of any person assaulting a household member with intent to kill or commit any murder, mayhem, criminal sexual penetration in the first, second or third degree, robbery, kidnapping, false imprisonment or burglary.
- B. Whoever commits assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony is guilty of a third degree felony.

30-3-15. Battery against a household member.

- A. Battery against a household member consists of the unlawful, intentional touching or application of force to the person of a household member, when done in a rude, insolent or angry manner.
- B. Whoever commits battery against a household member is guilty of a petty misdemeanor.

30-3-16. Aggravated battery against a household member.

- A. Aggravated battery against a household member consists of the unlawful touching or application of force to the person of a household member with intent to injure that person or another.
- B. Whoever commits aggravated battery against a household member by inflicting an injury to that person that is not likely to cause death or great bodily harm, but that does cause painful temporary disfigurement or temporary loss or impairment of the functions of any member or organ of the body, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- C. Whoever commits aggravated battery against a household member by inflicting great bodily harm or doing so with a deadly weapon or doing so in any manner whereby great bodily harm or death can be inflicted, is guilty of a third degree felony.
