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Letter from the Director...

Domestic violence incidents reported to law enforcement in 2010 (19,587) represent a 31% decrease since 2005. There is also progress to report with regard to identifying the victim in domestic violence cases. Training of police officers on identifying a *primary aggressor* in domestic violence incidents has resulted in better victim identification by law enforcement, resulting in a 19% increase in domestic violence victims identified since 2005. A total of 22,435 victims of domestic violence were identified in 2010.

Law Enforcement identification of stalking incidents and stalking victims remains grossly underreported. In 2005, the *Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico* (SVV) found that 16% of New Mexicans (25% women and 7% men) experienced stalking at some point in their lifetime; and 2% of adult women and 0.4% of adult men in New Mexico were victims of stalking that year. It was the first time *reported* and *unreported* stalking data was captured in our state. It was natural to be skeptical at the degree of stalking prevalence because it represented a condition rarely identified and documented by law enforcement. However, just this year, data from the *National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey* found that 4% of adult women and 1.3% of adult men nationally, were victims of stalking in 2010. These numbers exceed the rates of stalking found in the SVV, demonstrating that our findings are not only realistic, but perhaps under captured.

Other SVV findings demonstrated that only 34% of stalking victims reported their victimization, so it is unrealistic to expect that all stalking cases would come to the attention of law enforcement. In the law enforcement stalking cases, ages of the victims are not reported to the Central Repository. However, even if all the victims of the 125 stalking cases were adults, this number represents only 0.008% of adult men and women in New Mexico, which is 250 times less than that reported for *female* stalking victims in the SVV and 50 times less than that reported for male *stalking* victims in the SVV.

The SVV found that 87% of stalking victims were also victims of sexual assault and/or domestic violence. These victims and their families need referrals to appropriate services. Without properly identifying stalking victims, these critically needed referrals do not happen. New Mexico simply has to do a better job at identifying and responding to stalking crimes. As a result of the SVV findings, in 2006 a Violence Against Women STOP Grant funded the development of the first stalking protocol for New Mexico, "A Guide to Encourage Best Practices for Law Enforcement in Stalking Investigations" which was approved by the New Mexico Sheriffs' and Police Association in 2007. The law enforcement handbook, *Responding to Sexual Violence, Domestic Violence and Stalking* outlines stalking statutes and appropriate law enforcement response to stalking incidents. We encourage law enforcement administration and officers to utilize these resources and enforce stalking statutes to make the changes necessary to improve law enforcement response to stalking victimizations.

In this year's report, *Section One* presents law enforcement reported domestic violence incidents, as well as domestic violence reports from service providers throughout the state. Additionally, findings on new filings and disposed domestic violence cases in statewide district and magistrate courts are presented. *Section Two* presents a discussion of the implications of the findings; and in *Section Three*, you can see at a glance, county trends on 15 important domestic violence variables.

On behalf of myself and the Office of Injury Prevention, we thank you for all your efforts to identify, appropriately respond to, and document domestic violence and stalking cases in our state; and we wish you a safe and healthy 2012.

Domestic Violence in New Mexico 2010 Highlights

A. DOMESTIC AND INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE PREVALENCE

- The *Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico* (SVV) conducted in 2005 found that 1 in 4 (24%) New Mexico adults are victims of domestic violence in their lifetime. Additionally, the SVV found that approximately 1 in 5 (18%) New Mexico adults were victims of intimate partner physical violence in their lifetime: 1 in 4 women; and 1 in 10 men. (Caponera, 2006).
- Nationally, the *National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey* (NISVS) found that 1 in 4 women in the U.S. has experienced severe physical violence by an intimate partner in her lifetime, and 1 in 3 experienced being pushed, slapped or shoved by an intimate partner. Similarly, the NISVS found that 1 in 7 men in the U.S. has experienced severe physical violence by an intimate partner in his lifetime, and 1 in 4 has been slapped, pushed or shoved by an intimate partner. (Black, Basile, et al, [NISVS] 2011).
- In the 12 months prior to the SVV, 2.0% of adult men and 2.4% of adult women in New Mexico were victims of intimate partner physical violence. Nationally, in 2010 (12 months prior to the NISVS), 4.5% of men were victims of intimate partner physical violence, 2.0% victims of severe physical violence. Similarly, the NISVS reported that 3.6% of women were victims of intimate partner physical violence, 2.7% victims of severe physical violence.

B. UNDERREPORTING OF INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE IN NEW MEXICO

- In 2010, statewide law enforcement agencies identified 22,435 victims of domestic violence. Of these, 64% (14,358) involved victims of intimate partner physical violence. This total represents 0.9% of adult men and women in New Mexico, and demonstrates that the number of intimate partner physical violence victims that come to the attention of statewide law enforcement is 2.7 to 4 times less than that reported for women in the SVV (2.4%) and NISVS (3.6%), respectively, and 2 to 5 times less than that reported for men in the SVV (2.0%) and the NISVS (4.5%), respectively.

C. STALKING PREVALENCE

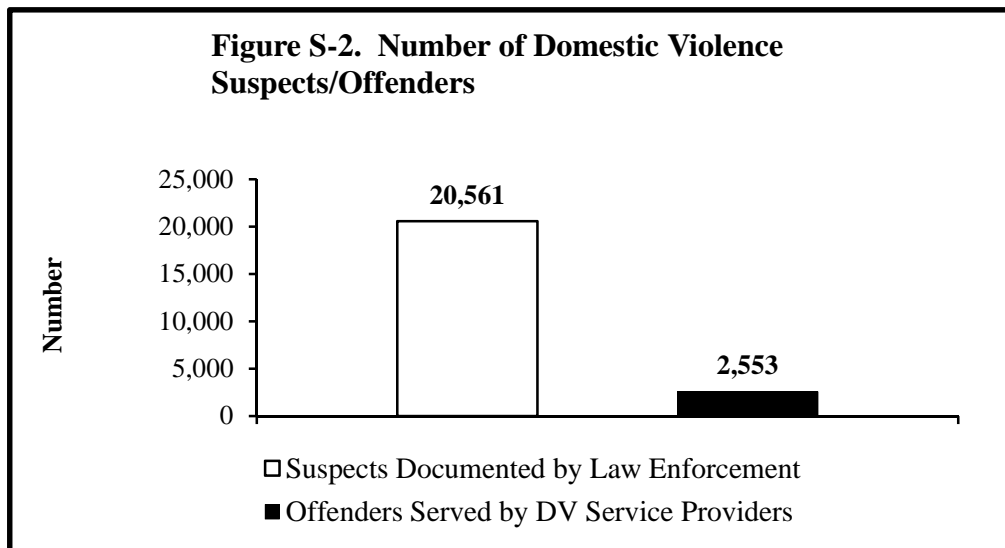
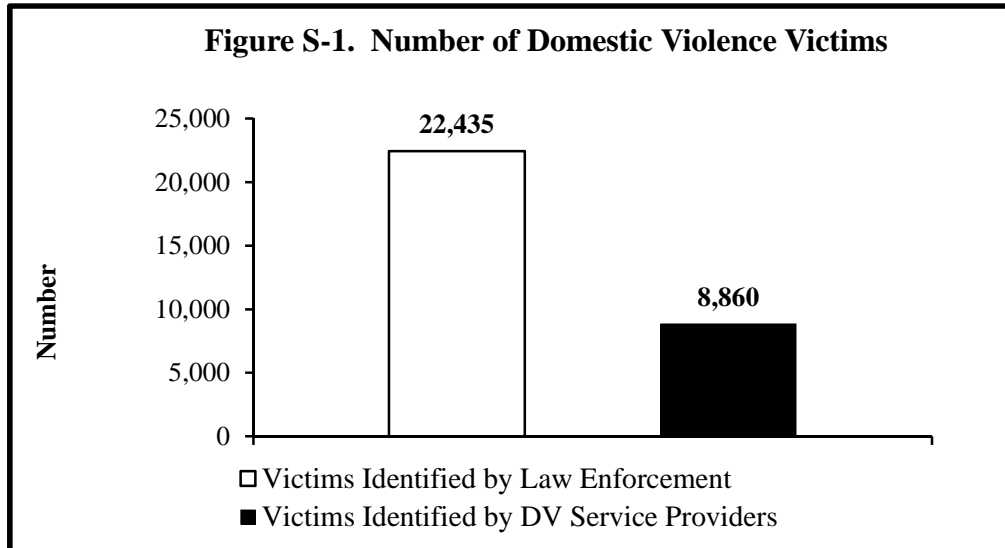
- The SVV found that 1 in 6 New Mexicans were victims of stalking in their lifetime: 1 in 4 (25%) women; and 1 in 14 (7%) men. Nationally, in 2010, the NISVS found that 1 in 6 (16%) women and 1 in 19 (5%) men has experienced stalking in their lifetime.
- In the 12 months prior to the SVV, 2.0% of adult women and 0.4% of adult men were victims of stalking in New Mexico. Nationally in 2010, the NISVS found that 4% of adult women and 1.3% of adult men were victims of stalking.

D. UNDERREPORTING OF STALKING INCIDENTS IN NEW MEXICO

- In 2010, statewide law enforcement agencies identified 2,330 victims of harassment and 125 stalking victims. The ages of the stalking victims are not reported. However, even if all stalking victims were 18 and older, this represents 0.008% of the adult men and women in New Mexico, and demonstrates that the number of stalking victims that come to the attention of statewide law enforcement is 250 to 500 times less than that reported for *women* in the SVV (2.0%) and NISVS (4%), respectively, and 50 to 163 times less than that reported for *men* in the SVV (0.4%) and NISVS (1.3%), respectively.

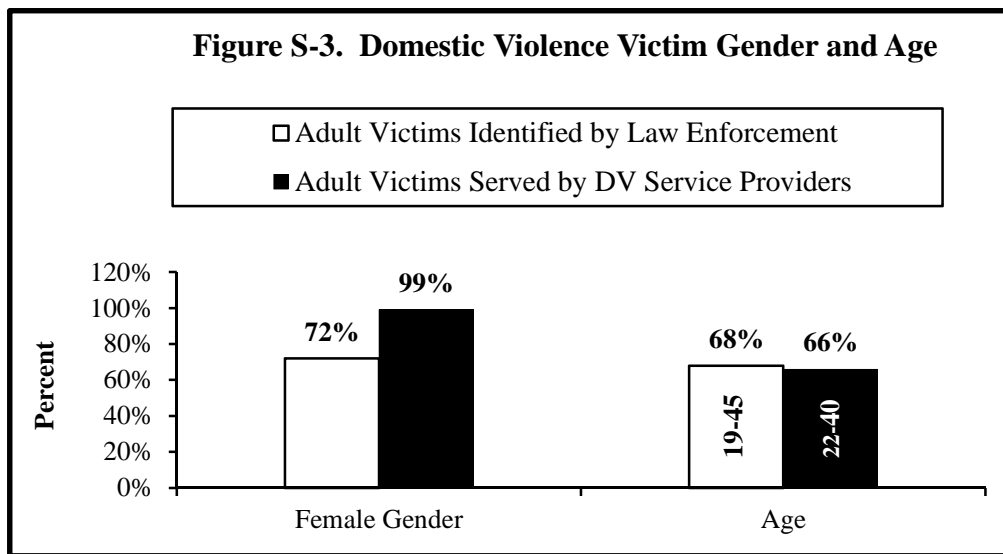
E. IDENTIFIED DOMESTIC VIOLENCE VICTIMS AND SUSPECTS

- There were 15,423 new clients served by 31 domestic violence service providers across the state; 57% (8,860) were adult victims, 26% (4,030) children, and 16% (2,533) offenders. Law enforcement reports identified 22,435 victims and 20,561 suspects.



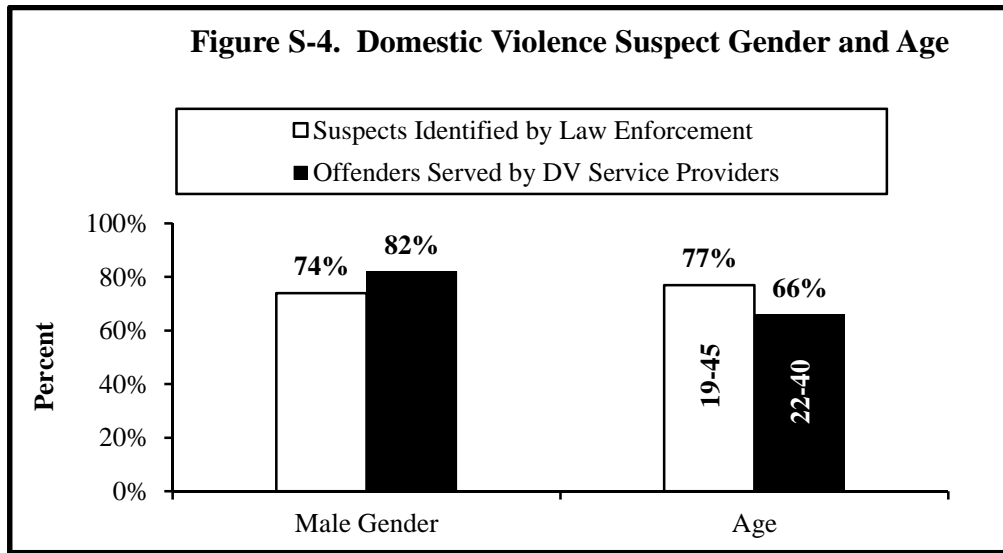
F. VICTIM DEMOGRAPHICS

- Approximately three-quarters (72% or 12,701) of the domestic violence victims identified by law enforcement were *female*. Ninety-nine percent of the adult-victims served by reporting domestic violence service providers were female.
- New Mexico victims of domestic violence as reported by law enforcement were predominantly 19-45 years old (68%). *Hispanics* (52%) and *Native Americans* (16%) were represented significantly more among victims than their representation in the state population (46% and 9%, respectively). Similarly, adult victims as reported by domestic violence service providers were predominantly 22-40 years old (66%) and *Hispanic* (55%).



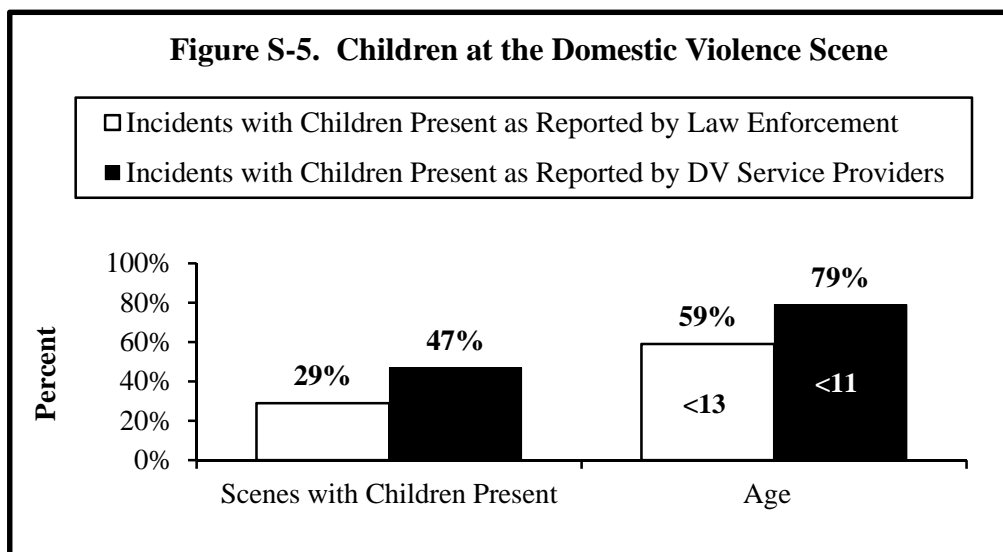
G. SUSPECT DEMOGRAPHICS

- Suspects, as reported by law enforcement, were predominantly *male* (74%), *Hispanic* (52%), and 19-45 years of age (77%). Offenders, as reported by domestic violence service providers, were predominantly *male* (82%), *Hispanic* (53%) and 22-40 years of age (66%).
- The SVV found that a disproportionate number of males that were ever victims of stalking (51%), domestic violence (62%) and intimate partner violence (49%) were victimized by a male, as well. Nationally, the NISVS reported that 44.3% of males ever victims of stalking were victimized by a male.

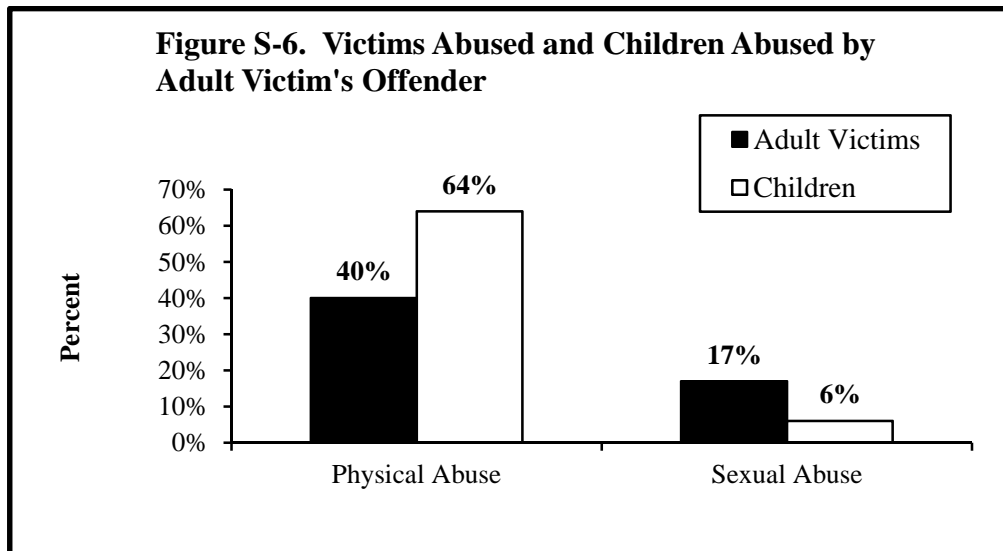


H. CHILDREN VICTIM-WITNESSES DEMOGRAPHICS

- Of 13,972 law enforcement reports that documented the number of incidents with children at the scene, there were 4,098 (29%) incidents where at least one child was present.
- There were 6,787 children present at the scene of domestic violence incidents as reported by law enforcement, and over half (59%) of the children who witnessed these incidents were not yet adolescents (12 years and under).
- There were 6,406 domestic violence service provider reports that identified 2,980 (47%) domestic violence incidents where children were present at the scene, or at least 1 child witness for every two (2.1) incidents. Over three-quarters (79%) of children victim-witnesses served are age 12 and under.



- In New Mexico, 64% of children victim-witnesses, as reported by domestic violence service providers, experienced *physical* abuse from the current offender of the adult victim, and 6% experienced *sexual* abuse from the current offender of the adult victim. Similarly, 40% of adult victims reported being *physically injured* from the domestic assault and 17% experienced *forced or coerced sexual activity* from the current offender. Nationally, the NISVS reported that 8.7% of women that were victims of intimate partner physical violence, were also raped by their intimate partner.



I. OFFENSE CHARACTERISTICS

1. Alcohol/Drug Use Incidence

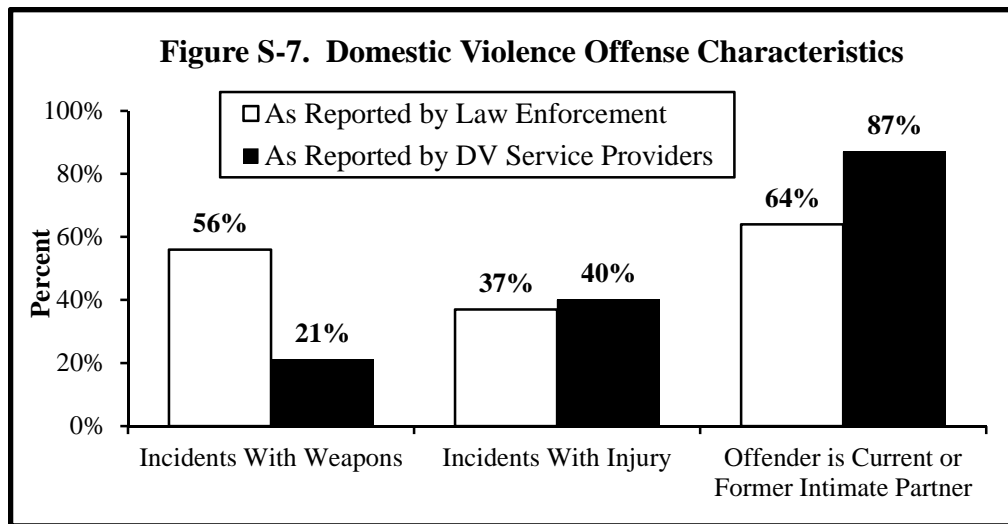
- Approximately one-third (35%) of domestic violence cases reported by law enforcement identified *alcohol/drug use*. Of these, 92% involved *suspect* use of alcohol/drugs, and 18% involved *victim* use of alcohol/drugs. These percentages include the 11% of cases where both the victim and the suspect were using alcohol/drugs at the time of the domestic assault.
- Alcohol/drugs were used by 27% of *victims* served by domestic violence service providers. Nearly two-thirds (64%) of *offenders* of victims served by providers used alcohol/drugs at the time of the domestic violence incident. Nationally, nearly half the female victims of intimate violence reported that the offender was drinking or using illegal drugs at the time of the crime.

2. Weapon Incidence

- A weapon was used in 56% (7,873) of domestic violence cases reported by law enforcement and 21% (1,305) of the cases reported by victims served by domestic violence service providers. The large disparity between weapon-related assaults in domestic violence cases reported by law enforcement and victims may be explained in

part, by a difference in perception between the two parties regarding what constitutes a weapon. Police officers guided by state statute regard the use of fists, feet, elbows, etc., as “personal weapons”. Victims may define weapons as objects other than those defined as “personal weapons” such as a bat, gun, knife, etc.

- The SVV found that 32% of domestic violence, 33% of intimate partner violence and 31% of stalking incidents involve a weapon; and each of these crimes was significantly more likely to involve a weapon if the victim was male, than female: domestic violence (36% male, 30% female); intimate partner violence (41% male, 30% female); and stalking (39% male, 29% female). In 2010, the NCVS reported that a weapon was used in 22% of all violent victimizations, 61% of serious* violent victimizations, and 20% of aggravated and simple assaults (Criminal Victimization , 2011 [NCVS, 2010]). Six percent of all assaults involved a *firearm*, 4% involved a *knife*, and 8% involved *other* weapons.



3. Injury Incidence

- Approximately one-third (37%) of law enforcement reported domestic violence cases involved injury to the victim. Similarly, 40% of adult victims served by domestic violence service providers reported being physically injured from the domestic assault. The SVV reported that a significant proportion of those who were ever victims of domestic violence (44%), intimate partner violence (47%) and stalking (44%) were injured in their assaults. Nationally, In 2010, the NCVS reported that 29% of all victims of violence suffered an injury; and that 41% of victims of serious* violence suffered an injury.

4. Victim/Offender Relationship

- Current or former boyfriend/girlfriend comprised the victim/offender relationship of 45% of law enforcement reported cases; 19% were a current or former spouse; and 25% other relatives. Current or former boyfriend/girlfriend comprised the victim/offender relationship of 35% of domestic violence service provider reported cases and 52% were former or current spouses. In 2010, the NCVS reported that 64%

of reported and unreported domestic violence victimizations involved an intimate partner (current or former spouse, boyfriend or girlfriend). (NCVS, 2010).

5. Interpersonal Violence Reported to Law Enforcement

- In 2010, 55% of domestic violence victims who went for help reported their victimization incident to law enforcement. Nationally, half of all violent victimizations were reported to law enforcement. (NCVS, 2010). The SVV revealed significant differences in the rate of reporting to law enforcement by the victims of the three types of interpersonal violence crimes: domestic violence (38%), intimate partner violence (41%), and stalking (34%). Further, the SVV found that domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were more likely to file criminal charges (1 in 7, respectively) than stalking victims (1 in 17). Again, domestic violence and intimate partner violence female victims were two times more likely to file charges than male victims. Conversely, female and male victims of stalking were equally likely to file criminal charges.

6. Rates of Suspect Arrest

- In 2010, 50% of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement resulted in a suspect arrest. The SVV found that arrest rates vary by the type of interpersonal violence crime. While 17% respectively, of domestic violence and intimate partner violence crimes resulted in a suspect arrest, only 5.5% of stalking crimes resulted in a suspect arrest. Moreover, in cases of domestic violence and intimate partner violence, more offender arrests were made when there was a female victim. With stalking crimes, the arrest rate was almost equal for crimes perpetrated against female (6%) and male victims (5%).

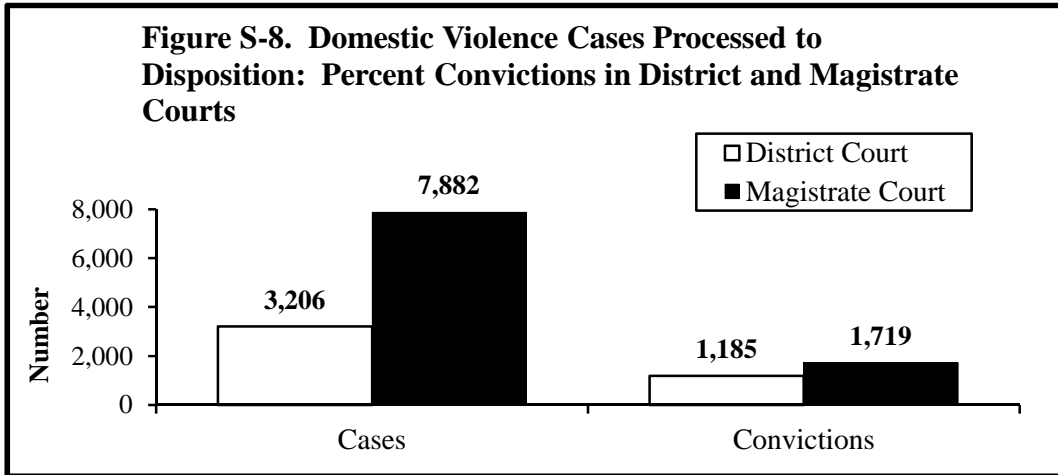
J. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND THE COURTS

1. Protection Orders and New Charges Filed

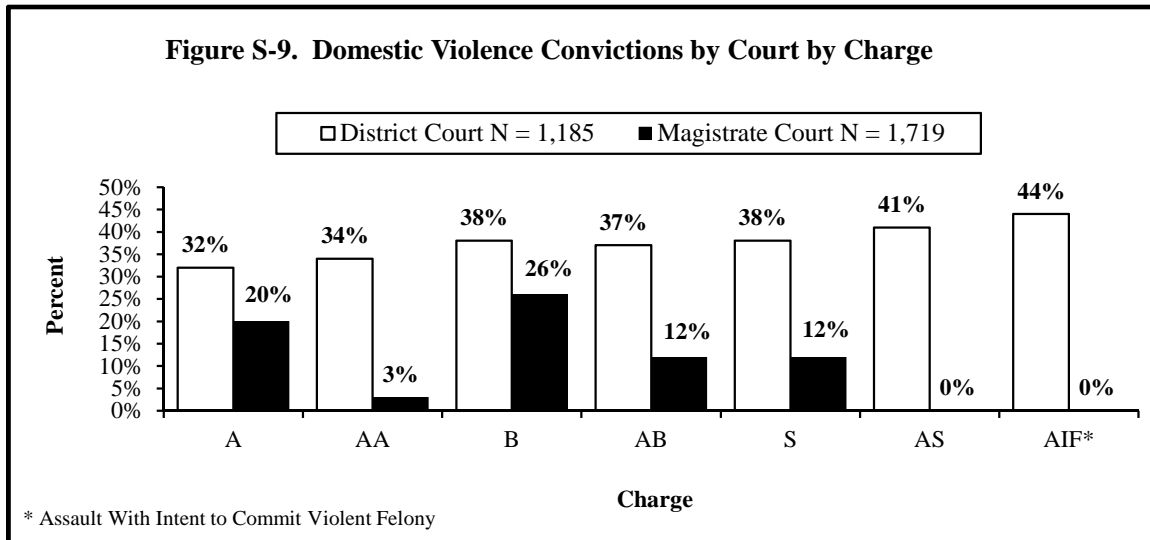
- In 2010, the number of protection or restraining orders issued in the district courts (3,638) was equal to 19% of the number of domestic violence incidents reported to law enforcement. The SVV revealed similar results, as roughly one-fifth to one-quarter of domestic violence (21%), intimate partner violence (23%), and stalking (26%) victims obtained a restraining order. However, results from the SVV showed that female domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were 2.5 times more likely to obtain a restraining order than their male counterparts. Similarly, female stalking victims were almost two times more likely than males to obtain a restraining order. Furthermore, the SVV found that over half of all restraining orders in interpersonal violence crimes were violated: domestic violence (53.5%); intimate partner violence (56%); and stalking (51%); and restraining orders obtained by male intimate partner violence victims had the highest rate of violation (58%).
- Overall, there were 10,738 domestic violence charges filed in statewide district and magistrate courts, not including the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court, in 2010. This represents 55% of the total number of domestic violence cases reported by law enforcement for the same time period.

2. Dispositions in Interpersonal Violence Crimes

- There were 7,882 domestic violence cases processed to disposition in statewide magistrate courts in 2010. Of these 1,719 (22%) resulted in a conviction.
- There were 3,206 cases of domestic violence processed to disposition in statewide district courts in 2010. Of these 1,185 (37%) resulted in a conviction.



- Of the 1,719 convictions of disposed domestic violence cases in magistrate courts, *battery* had the highest percent of convictions, 26%, followed by *assault* (20%). Twelve percent respectively, of disposed *aggravated battery* and *stalking* cases obtained a conviction.
- Of the 1,185 convictions of disposed domestic violence cases in the statewide district courts, *assault with intent to commit violent felony* (44%) and *aggravated stalking* (41%) had the highest conviction rates, followed by *battery and stalking* (38%, respectively).

- The SVV found that stalking offenders had the fewest outcomes with charges dropped (13%) compared to offenders of domestic violence (25%) and intimate partner violence (28%). Additionally, stalking offenders had the highest rate of guilty pleas or convictions (51%) over domestic violence offenders (38%) and intimate partner violence offenders (39%). Offenders of each interpersonal violence crime involving a female victim were significantly more likely to plead guilty than offenders of a male victim. The rate of acquittals for offenders of male domestic violence and intimate partner violence were 4 and 5 times, respectively, the rate of offender acquittals for these crimes with a female victim. Conversely, offenders of stalking with a male victim were much less likely to obtain an acquittal (<1%) than stalking offenders with a female victim (5%).
- The SVV found that roughly two-thirds of all those sentenced for interpersonal violence crimes were sentenced to jail or prison. The average sentence length for convicted domestic violence offenders (3.04 years) was longer than that of intimate partner violence offenders (2.7 years) and stalking offenders (1.97 years). Domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders received a longer average sentence when the victim was a female, while stalking offenders received a slightly longer average sentence when the victim was a male. Offenders sentenced for stalking a male victim actually served a longer average sentence (2.0 years) than offenders sentenced for intimate partner violence with a male victim (1.5 years).
- In a 2007 retrospective study of sentencing in felony domestic violence cases in New Mexico, 15% of felony domestic violence cases from 2000-2005 statewide were dismissed; 58% of defendants received probation; 27% received a jail or prison sentence; and the average sentence served after partial suspensions was 23 months.

**Serious* is defined by rape, sexual assault, robbery and aggravated assault.

K. IMPLICATIONS OF THE FINDINGS

1. Evidence Supporting a Reduction in the Incidence of Domestic Violence

- While the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey captures reported and unreported *intimate partner* violence rates and will offer state-to-state and state-to-national comparisons of intimate partner violence, it does not capture domestic violence beyond that perpetrated by current or former intimate partners. Without an annual statewide victimization survey it is not possible to measure change in the rate of domestic violence incidence that captures reported and unreported cases in New Mexico. It is only possible to capture changes in *reported* domestic violence. Our best indicator for measuring change in reported incidents is the number of domestic violence cases reported to statewide law enforcement agencies. From 2005-2010, there was a 31% decrease in the number of domestic violence incidents reported to statewide law enforcement agencies while the number of law enforcement agencies reporting to the Central Repository (an average 102 each year) and the proportion of the state population represented by participating law enforcement agencies (an average 92%) have remained relatively constant. This is welcome news as it indicates that prevention initiatives over the last five years are making a difference.

2. Improvements in Suspect Arrests

- The motivation to accurately identify a *primary aggressor* in violent situations is to obtain better outcomes for the victim and children (safety and referrals for services); and to separate the offender from those at risk for harm. Perhaps an unintended benefit to the improved ability of officers to identify the primary aggressor in a violent situation is an increase in the number of domestic violence incidents that resulted in a suspect arrest. The proportion of domestic violence incidents with in a suspect arrest increased significantly (19%), from a low in 2005 (29%) to a high in 2010 (50%).

3. Stalking Technology, Training and Victim Referral

- Even with new stalking policies, there are still too few cases of stalking recognized and charged as such by law enforcement agencies throughout the state. In the 12 months prior to the SVV, 2.0% of adult women and 0.4% of adult men were victims of stalking in New Mexico. Nationally in 2010, the NISVS found that 4% of adult women and 1.3% of adult men were victims of stalking. In 2010, statewide law enforcement agencies identified 2,330 victims of harassment and 125 stalking victims. The ages of the stalking victims are not reported. However, even if all the law enforcement reported stalking victims were 18 and older, this represents 0.008% of the adult men and women in New Mexico, and demonstrates that the number of stalking victims that come to the attention of statewide law enforcement is 250 to 500 times less than that reported for women in the SVV (2.0%) and NISVS (4%), respectively, and 50 to 163 times less than that reported for men in the SVV (0.4%) and NISVS (1.3%), respectively.
- There are numerous administrative and procedural issues that affect accurate reporting of domestic violence and stalking incidents ranging from whether and how police offense incident reports are written, and how these reports are entered into law enforcement databases or otherwise counted.
- The issues surrounding identification of stalking incidents and victims are particularly worrisome. One possible explanation is that most stalking cases are labeled other crimes (harassment, vandalism, destruction of property, arson, trespassing, car theft, etc.) and are therefore not captured. The inability to differentiate between stalking victims and victims of isolated crimes means that stalking victims are not getting referred for appropriate services. This is a significant problem as the SVV found that 87% of stalking victims also reported being a victim of domestic violence, other physical attack, and/or sexual assault. These victims and their children are at greater health and safety risk and need to be referred for appropriate services; and these types of referrals are not likely to happen as a result of a trespass, vandalism, or other similarly labeled isolated crime incident. It is imperative to provide necessary training to all law enforcement officers, administrative personnel, and executive personnel whose policies guide law enforcement procedure regarding the description, documentation and data entry of stalking crimes. In 2010, APD and a few other law enforcement agencies implemented new technology for officers at the scene to access information regarding prior offenses and protection order information. It is hoped that this technology will improve identification and referral of stalking victims and the documentation of stalking incidents.

4. Evidence Supporting the Focus on Early Intervention to Prevent Domestic Violence

- In 2010, two-thirds (64%) of the law enforcement incidents documenting the victim/offender relationship, were perpetrated by a current or former intimate partner, 45% of these by current or former boyfriends/girlfriends who are or were dating or living together. Similarly, 87% of adult victims who sought services from a domestic violence service provider were assaulted by a current or former intimate partner, one-third of these were dating or living together. The SSV found that two-thirds (66.5%) of domestic violence incidents were perpetrated by current or former intimate partners, one-third of these were dating or living together. Further, stalking behaviors begin in adolescence and the incidence of adolescent stalking is almost twice that of adolescent intimate partner violence. The high proportion of interpersonal violence cases perpetrated by those not yet married, demonstrate that true prevention requires early education initiatives on building healthy relationships during adolescence.

5. Sexual Assault Prevention and Treatment for Domestic Violence Child and Adult Victims

- In 2010, 1 in every 3.4 incidents of domestic violence reported by law enforcement involved a child witness and an average of two children (1.6) were present at each. Additionally, at least one child was present in 1 out of every 2 adult victim cases handled by domestic violence service providers. Too many children experienced sexual abuse (6%) at the hands of their adult-victim's offender. Similarly, 17% of adult domestic violence victims were sexually assaulted by their offender.
- The rates of sexual abuse of adults and children are grossly underreported. Findings from the SVV reveal that almost half of the adults in New Mexico who were ever a victim of domestic violence, intimate partner violence or stalking were also sexually assaulted. Of those that were sexually assaulted, 45% were victimized by the age of 12. Further, the NISVS reported that 8.7% of women that were ever victims of intimate partner physical violence, were also raped by their intimate partner. This suggests that effective prevention and treatment programs for domestic violence victims must include components of sexual assault prevention and treatment or must provide referrals to appropriate sexual assault services.

6. Interpersonal Violence Advocacy and Prevention

- In New Mexico in 2010, 28% of domestic violence victims identified by law enforcement were males. Findings from the SVV demonstrated that 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, 1 in 10 a victim of intimate partner violence, and 1 in 14 a victim of stalking. More outreach must be done to identify male victims of interpersonal violence to offer prevention and treatment programs specific to males.

7. Providing Offender Treatment Programs

- In New Mexico, 74% of suspects identified by law enforcement and 82% of offenders identified by domestic violence service providers are *male*. Findings from the SVV revealed that 83% of stalking offenders and 80% of domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders respectively, are male. Even when males are the victims in interpersonal violence crimes, half to two-thirds are being victimized by a male. Perhaps greater outcomes in domestic violence prevention may be realized through greater availability of offender

prevention and therapeutic programs that include strategies for addressing aggression in male socialization.

8. Evidence Supporting the Need to Identify Domestic Violence Victims in the Healthcare Setting

- From 2005-2010, law enforcement reported that an average one-third (35.5%) of adult victims were physically injured as a result of domestic violence. Similarly, statewide service providers reported that one-third respectively, of adults (37%) and nearly half (48%) of the children were physically injured by the adult victim's offender. The SVV found that 44% of domestic violence victims were injured and over one-third of them sought medical treatment. This suggests that increased accuracy in reporting domestic violence incidents and identifying victims for referral to needed interventions requires interpersonal violence surveillance initiatives in New Mexico healthcare facilities.
- Patients that are seen in the healthcare/emergency room setting with a domestic violence-related injury are typically not reported to law enforcement and represent a substantial gap in reporting. While many healthcare facilities use screening tools to identify patients who are victims of domestic violence, no standardized monitoring system to reliably document the number of these individuals currently exists. Methods to determine healthcare utilization by victims of violence through e-codes or billing databases have been unsuccessful and are unreliable at best, due to definitional problems of the codes, practitioner discretion and inconsistencies in naming injuries, and the insurance related intentions of billing databases. The need to rectify these problems is underscored by findings from the SVV which revealed substantial comorbidity with domestic violence victims with regard to serious disabling injury and chronic mental health problems.

9. Evidence Supporting the Need for Better Court Data on Domestic Violence

- It is not at all clear why the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) changed the set of codes that defined domestic violence protection orders in 2006. This change omitted three previous codes from the definition set. The result in 2006 was a 32% drop in the number of protection orders related to domestic violence from the previous year. However, from 2006-2010, the definition set has been consistent and still, there was a 26% decrease in the number of protection orders issued by district courts in that time period.
- The Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court (BCMC) data is not standardized with data from other magistrate courts across the state and is separate from data captured at the AOC. While the AOC reports magistrate court data to the Central Repository, BCMC does not. Since BCMC is the largest jurisdiction in the state, there is no way to measure how closely the Central Repository's findings on magistrate court dispositions and convictions correspond to actual practices regarding the adjudication of domestic violence cases.
- It is important to obtain better court data because evidence of currently available data demonstrates that there has been a steady *decrease* in the rate of domestic violence convictions in statewide district and magistrate courts. In 2010, the conviction rates of disposed domestic violence cases in district (37%) and magistrate courts (22%), represent the lowest rates of conviction over the last six years.

- Without better data from the courts, too much vital information remains unknown: 1) how many new domestic violence charges get dismissed and why; 2) why the rate of conviction for domestic violence cases is so low; 3) what the typical sentence is for misdemeanor and felony domestic violence charges; and 4) what the average length of incarceration is for domestic violence felonies compared to other felonies. Answers to these questions will serve to improve the efficacy of legal advocacy for domestic violence victims.
- The AOC has “three staff attorneys who serve as the point of contact for designated subject matter areas: water, access to justice, and child welfare and juvenile justice”. In 2011, a position for a point of contact attorney within the AOC for violence against women issues was created and funded by the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). The purpose of the point of contact attorney position is to “explore the need for and make recommendations regarding standard policies, practices and procedures for processing domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking cases. There has never been a greater need for this position. The Central Repository is working with the point of contact attorney to address the current data issues. The scope of domestic violence includes much more charges than what currently define it in the courts, typically battery and aggravated battery, assault and aggravated assault. Without a greater scope of definition and communication of case information, we will not be equipped to address the obstacles to improved legal advocacy for domestic violence victims.

10. Interpersonal Violence and Needed Changes in Law Enforcement, Prosecution and The Courts To Reduce The Risk of Harm for Male and Female Victims

- Findings from the SVV demonstrate that female victims are more likely than male victims to report their offense, two times more likely to file criminal charges against their offenders and are more likely to get a restraining order against their offenders, even though interpersonal crimes with male victims involve more alcohol/drugs, weapon use and more serious disabling injury. Additionally, while half of all restraining orders are violated, male victims of intimate partner violence crimes are more likely to have a restraining order violated, less likely to have their offenders arrested, and significantly more likely that the charges against their offenders will be dropped or the offenders will obtain an acquittal. Further, if their offenders are convicted, offenders of male victims are more likely to serve less time in jail or prison than offenders of female victims.
- While all of the system failures that contribute to the high risk of harm for female victims of interpersonal violence are widely known, it is clear from these findings that interpersonal violence is dangerous for males, as well. While both genders do not utilize system protections as they should, male victims are even less likely than female victims to do so; and even when system protections are sought for intimate partner violence, violations of restraining orders are more frequent and convictions of their offenders less frequent for male victims. All of this speaks to: 1) the need for early education to correct misconceptions in gender socialization; 2) greater community education to increase awareness of the incidence and risk of interpersonal violence among males; and 3) comprehensive training of law enforcement, prosecutors and judges regarding the high risk of harm for men and women victims of interpersonal violence and the development of protocols in their respective disciplines aimed at reducing the likelihood of harm, disability and death of all interpersonal violence victims.

I. INTRODUCTION

In 2005, the Department of Health, Office of Injury Prevention obtained funds to conduct a statewide violence victimization survey. The survey was conducted by Schulman, Ronca and Bucuvalas, Inc. (SRBI) a national research organization with over 25 years experience conducting national and statewide surveys on health and trauma issues.

The purpose of the survey was to obtain state estimates of the prevalence and nature of victimization among adults in New Mexico. The sample for the Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico was drawn from a statewide sample of telephone households developed by random digit dialing (RDD). A statewide random sample of 4,000 adults aged 18 and older: 2000 males and 2000 females, were interviewed. Interviewing for the survey was conducted between December 6, 2005 and January, 22 2006. Comprehensive information regarding the survey methods used (sample construction, instrument design, programming, testing, interviewer selection, training, monitoring, conducting the interviews, response rates, field outcomes, data preparation and processing) is found in the *Survey Methods Report* available upon request from the Central Repository.

Preliminary findings from the Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico were published in *Incidence and Nature of Domestic Violence In New Mexico VI*, July 2006. Due to cost and other factors, statewide victimization surveys, like national victimization surveys, are not conducted each year, rather survey data are analyzed over a period of several years. A summary of the findings from the Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico in 2005, is found in **Appendix A**. It offers statewide rates of the incidence and prevalence of domestic violence, intimate partner violence and stalking, together with a discussion of the findings on selected characteristics of these interpersonal violence crimes. Selected findings from the survey can be found in the *Fact Sheet* of this report, as well. In 2007, additional findings from the Survey of Violence Victimization in New Mexico regarding beliefs about violent crime and accommodating behaviors were published in the *Incidence and Nature of Domestic Violence In New Mexico VII*, July 2007 report. A summary of these findings is found in **Appendix B**.

This report has three sections: *Section One* presents an analysis of 2010 sex crimes data from the New Mexico Interpersonal Violence Data Central Repository, which includes findings from law enforcement, service providers and statewide Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) units; *Section Two* presents a discussion of the implications of the findings; and *Section Three* offers county tables to present important trends information specific to each county.

The Central Repository is supported by the State of New Mexico Department of Health, Office of Injury Prevention and Behavioral Health Services Division and the New Mexico Crime Victims Reparation Commission Violence Against Women STOP Grant Program. It was established in 1998 to house data submitted from a variety of agencies statewide (law enforcement, district and magistrate courts, and domestic violence service providers) that deal with the issue of domestic violence. In 2001, the Central Repository began capturing statewide sexual assault data, as well. To this end, data from rape crisis centers, statewide mental health centers and sexual assault nurse examiner units (SANEs) that provide services for sexual assault victims are also submitted to the Central Repository.

II. DEFINITIONS

Domestic violence incidence as determined by law enforcement include all incidents of *assault*, *aggravated assault*, *battery*, and *aggravated battery* as outlined in the “Crimes Against Household Members Act” in statutes 30-3-10 through 3-3-18. Full definitions are found in **Appendix C**.

Data submitted from *law enforcement agencies* are used to determine statewide domestic violence *reported* incidence and the county rates of *reported* domestic violence.

Domestic violence cases as determined by *domestic violence service providers* include all *adult victims* who are accepted as clients by the providers for delivery of services. Data on children victim-witnesses and offenders served by domestic violence service providers are also analyzed and presented herein. None of the cases served by the domestic violence service providers are considered in the county reported rates of incidence to avoid possible duplication of reporting.

Domestic violence data from all *magistrate* and *district* courts include codes that capture *aggravated assault, aggravated battery, aggravated stalking, assault, battery, stalking* and *assault with intent to commit a violent felony*, all against a household member. These codes and the number of protection orders granted are extracted from the Administrative Office of the Courts Judicial Information System.

Currently, standardized data from each aforementioned discipline are submitted to the Central Repository on a quarterly basis. The data from the Central Repository analyzed for this report covers domestic violence data for the period 1/1/10 – 12/31/10.

SECTION ONE: ANALYSIS OF 2010 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE DATA FROM THE CENTRAL REPOSITORY

I. FINDINGS

A. How Many Domestic Violence Incidents in 2010 Were Identified by Law Enforcement

There were 102 law enforcement agencies that submitted domestic violence data to the Central Repository during 2010 (see **Appendix D**). Data from each participating agency was extracted from police offense incident reports and submitted in aggregate form on the standardized *Law Enforcement Domestic Violence Data Collection Form* (see **Appendix E**).

The total number of reports for each variable analyzed from law enforcement will vary as all questions may not be answered on each report submitted. The number of reports considered for each question analyzed is stated throughout the report as the findings on each variable are discussed.

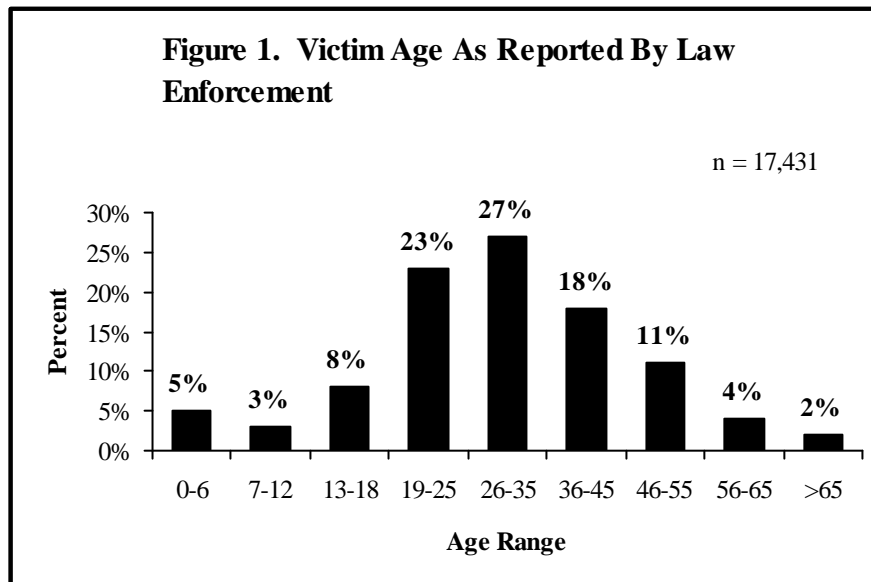

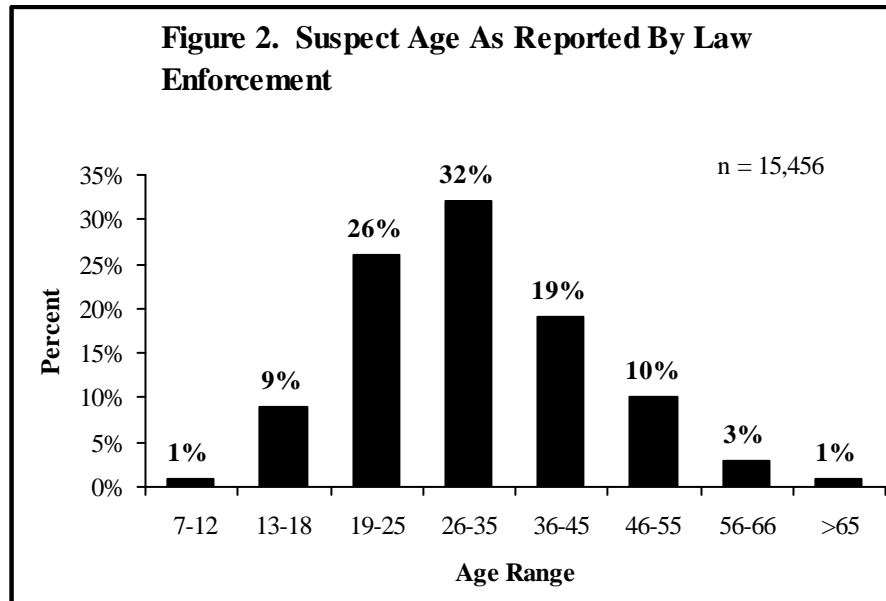

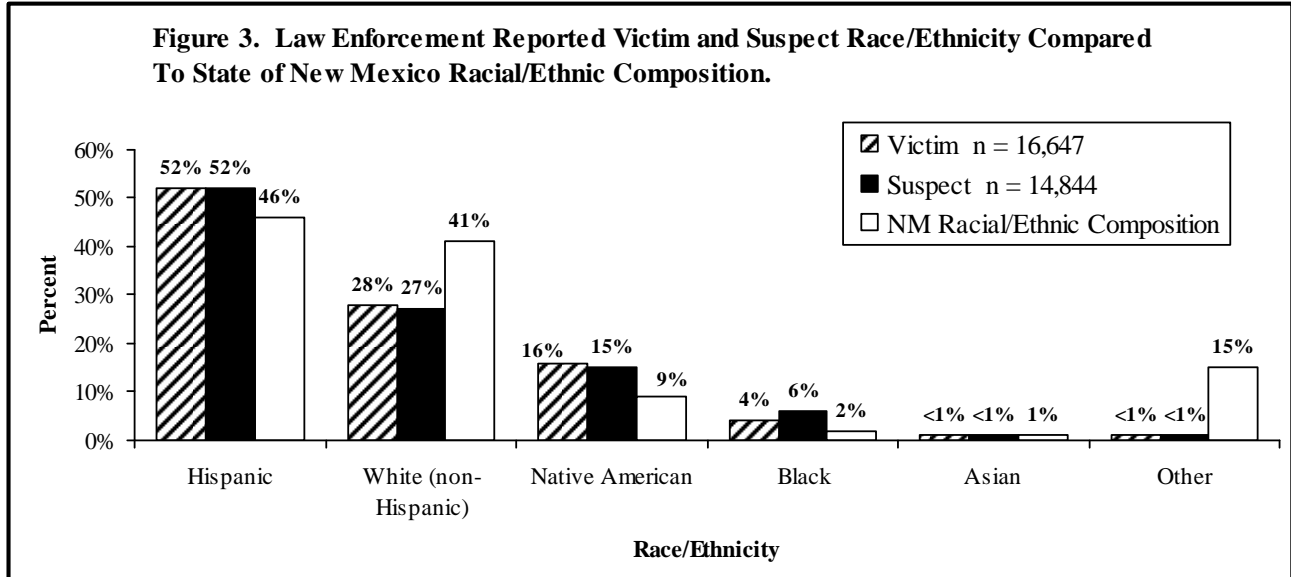
Of 16,647 domestic violence victims, 52% (8,626) were *Hispanic*, 28% (4,739) *White (non-Hispanic)*, 16% (2,586) *Native American*, 4% (591) *Black*. *Asian* victims (67) and victims of “*other*” races (38) comprised <1% respectively, of all victims. Likewise, of the 14,844 reports that identified *suspect race/ethnicity*, 52% (7,654) were *Hispanic*, 27% (3,994) *White (non-Hispanic)*, 15% (2,273) *Native American*, and 6% (863) *Black*. Suspects of “*other*” races (13) and *Asian* suspects (47) comprised <1% respectively, of all suspects. For a comparison of victim and suspect race/ethnicity to racial/ethnic compositions in New Mexico, see **Figure 3**.

E. How Many Stalking or Harassment Incidents Were Identified by Law Enforcement

There were 3,628 reports that documented how many stalking cases came to the attention of law enforcement in 2010. Of these, 125 (3%) stalking cases were identified. Similarly, there were 5,311 reports that documented how many harassment cases came to the attention of law enforcement. Of these, 2,330 (44%) harassment cases were identified.

1. Number Seeking Services

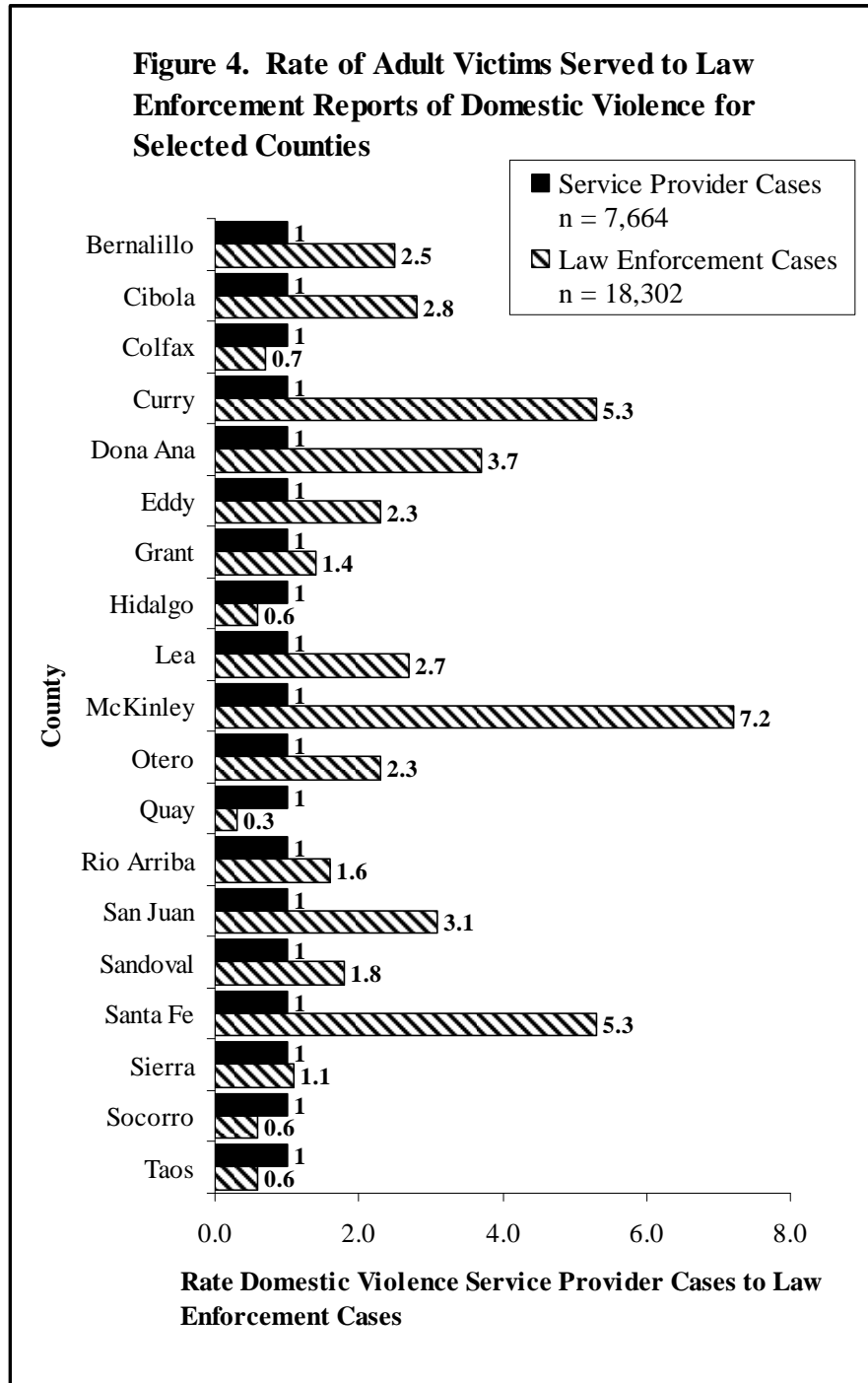
There were 15,490 new clients served during 2010, which is a 3% decrease in the number of clients served in 2009.

An analysis was conducted comparing the number of adult victims served to the number of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement (in counties with the law enforcement agency from the largest city reporting, and where the direct service provider reported in all four quarters of 2010). This analysis revealed that *McKinley County* had the fewest number of victims receiving services relative to the number of incidents reported to police (1 out of 7.2), followed by *Santa Fe* and *Curry* counties (1 out of 5.3, respectively), *Dona Ana County* (1 out of 3.7), and *Cibola County* (1 out of 2.8). See **Figure 4**.



Adult victims who went for help in 2010 (8,860) represent 45% of domestic violence incidents identified by law enforcement (19,587). This is similar to the 43% of law enforcement victims represented by adult victims served in 2009.

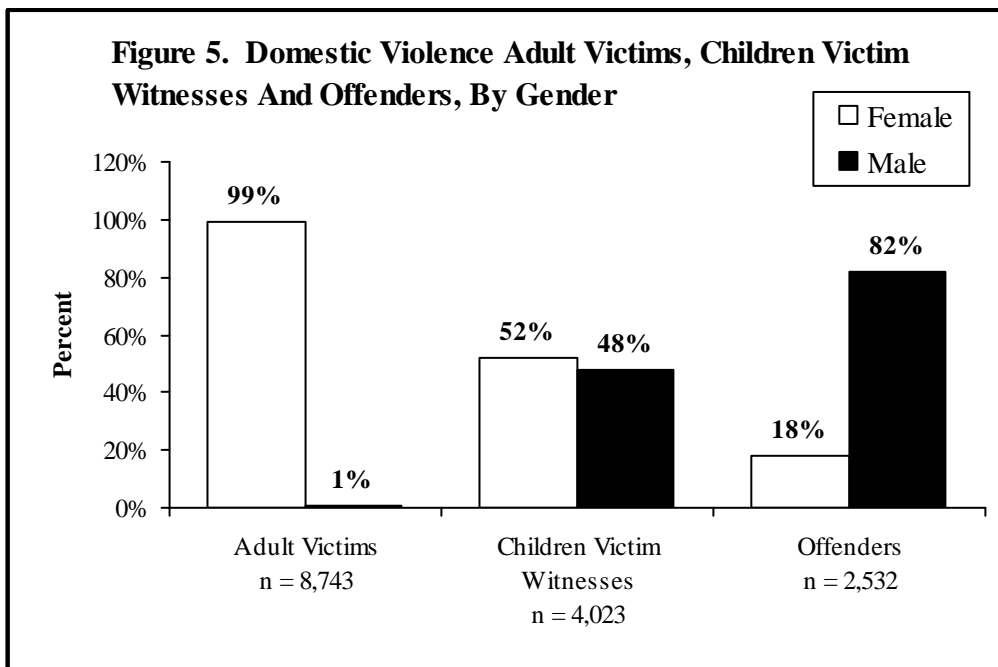
► Five Year Trends in The Percent of Law Enforcement Domestic Violence Incidents Represented by The Number of Adult Victims Served for Individual Counties

Offenders who went for treatment (2,533) represent 12% of the domestic violence suspects identified by law enforcement. This is 1% more than were represented in 2009.

2. Gender of Those Served

Survivor gender was documented in 8,743 of 8,860 adult victims served. Ninety-nine percent (8,259) of the *adult victims* served were *female*. Conversely, 82% (2,074) of the 2,532 reports that documented *offender* gender, reported the offender was *male*. Gender was documented in 4,023 of the 4,030 *children victim-witnesses* served. Slightly more of *female children*, 52% than *male children*, 48% witnessed the abuse of an adult victim. See **Figure 5**.

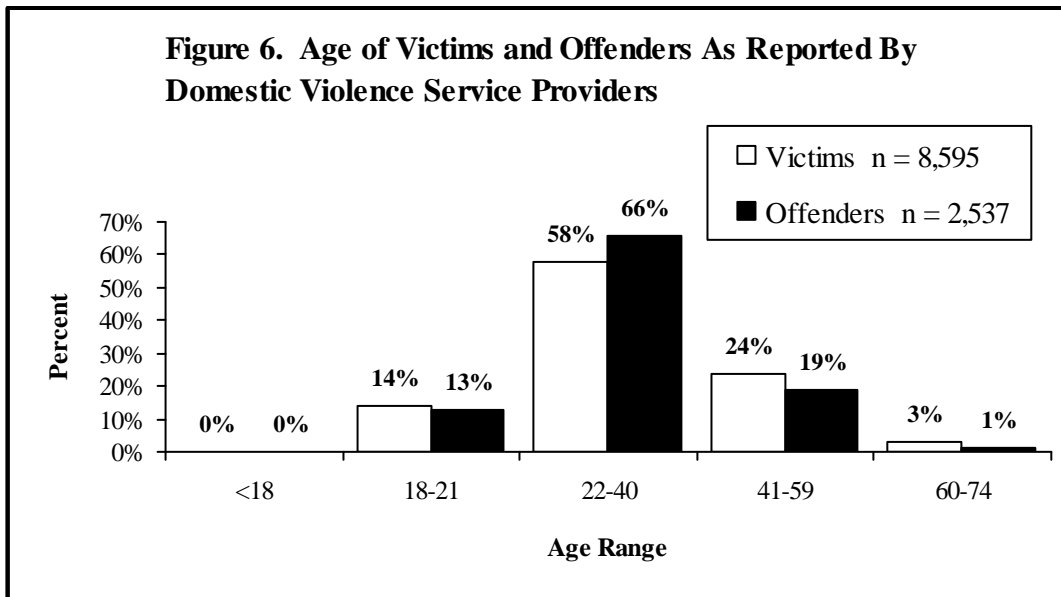


- Number and Gender of Adult Victims Served for All Agencies

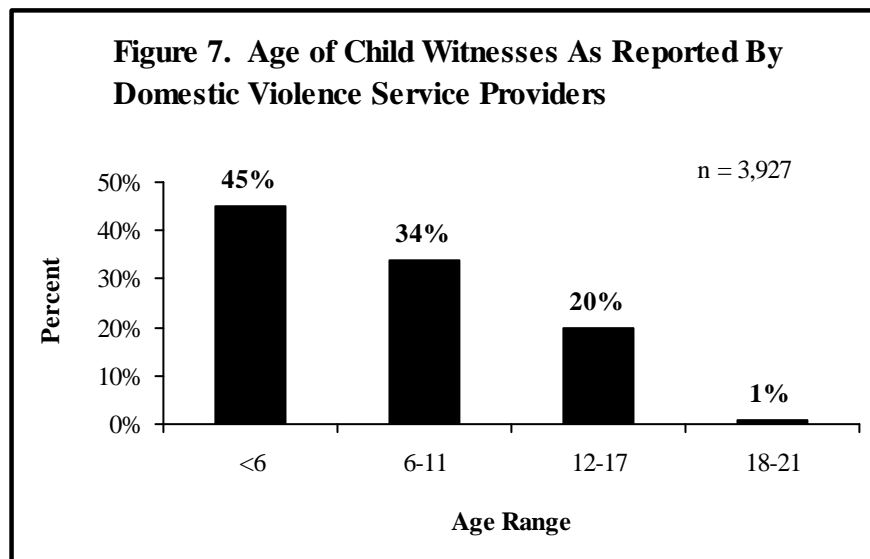
3. Ages of Those Served

The age of the *adult victim* was documented in 8,595 provider reports. Adult victims, 58% (5,023) were predominately 22-40 years of age, 24% (2,070) were 41-59 years of age, and 14% (1,229) were 18-21 years of age. Victims *age 60 and older* comprised 3% (236) of all adult victims served. See **Figure 6**.



Of the 2,537 reports that documented *offender age*, 66% (1,671) were 22-40 years old, 19% (493) were 41-59, and 13% (331) were 18-21. Offenders age 60 and older comprised 1% (35) of all offenders served and those <18 years of age comprised <1% (7) of all offenders. Refer to Figure 6.

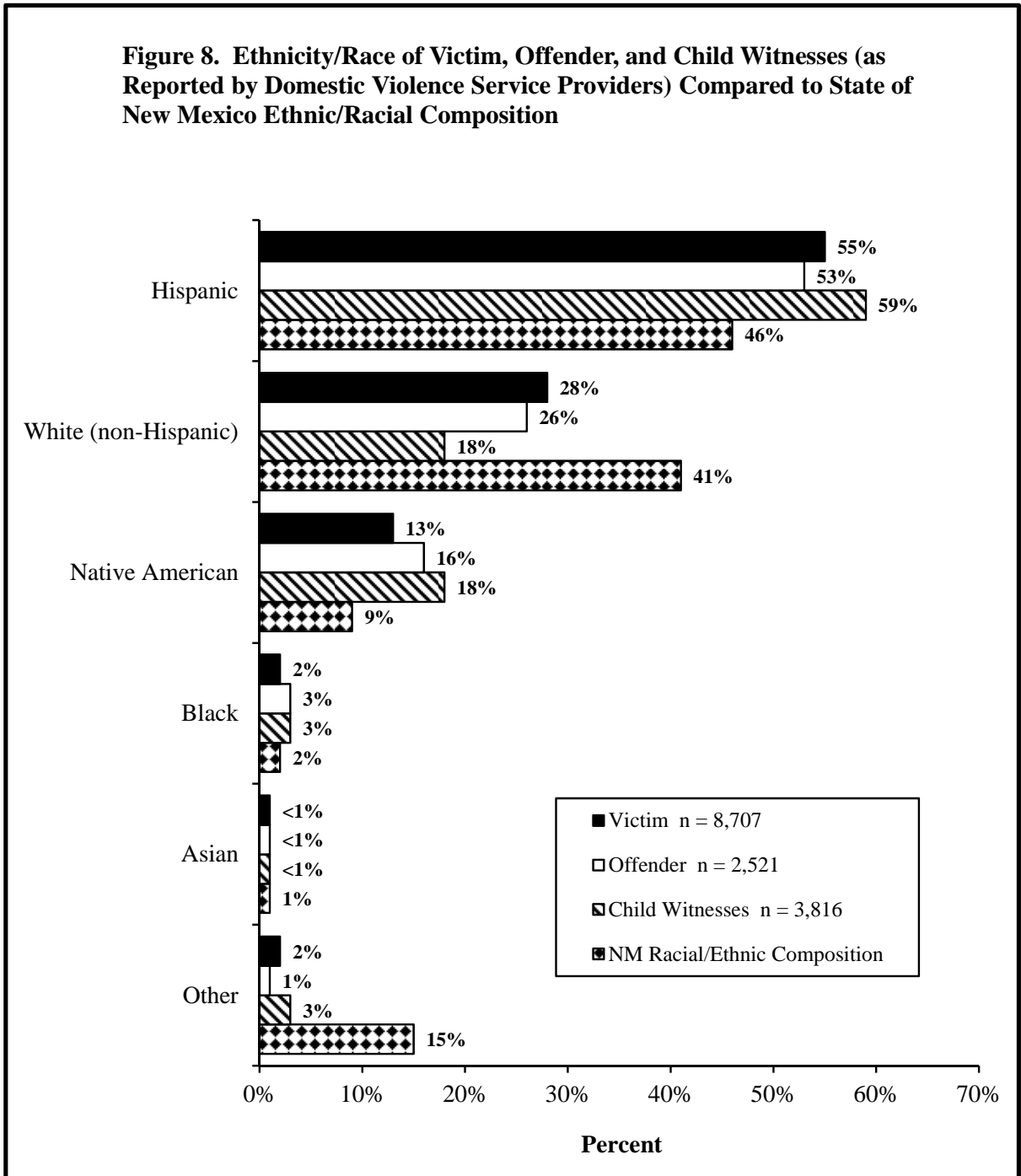
The age of *children victim-witnesses* was documented in 3,927 of the 4,033 children served. Forty-five percent (1,771) of the *children victim-witnesses* were <6 years old, 34% (1,348) were 6-11 years old, 20% (783) were 12-17 years old, and 1% (22) were 18-21 years old. See Figure 7.



4. Race/Ethnicity of Those Served

The *race/ethnicity of the adult victim* was identified in 8,707 reports. Of these, 55% (4,773) were *Hispanic*, 28% (2,433) *White (non-Hispanics)*, 13% (1,113) *Native American*, 2% (205) *Black*, 2% (155)

Other, and <1% (28) Asian. For a comparison of adult victim racial/ethnic distribution to the racial/ethnic composition of New Mexico, see Figure 8.



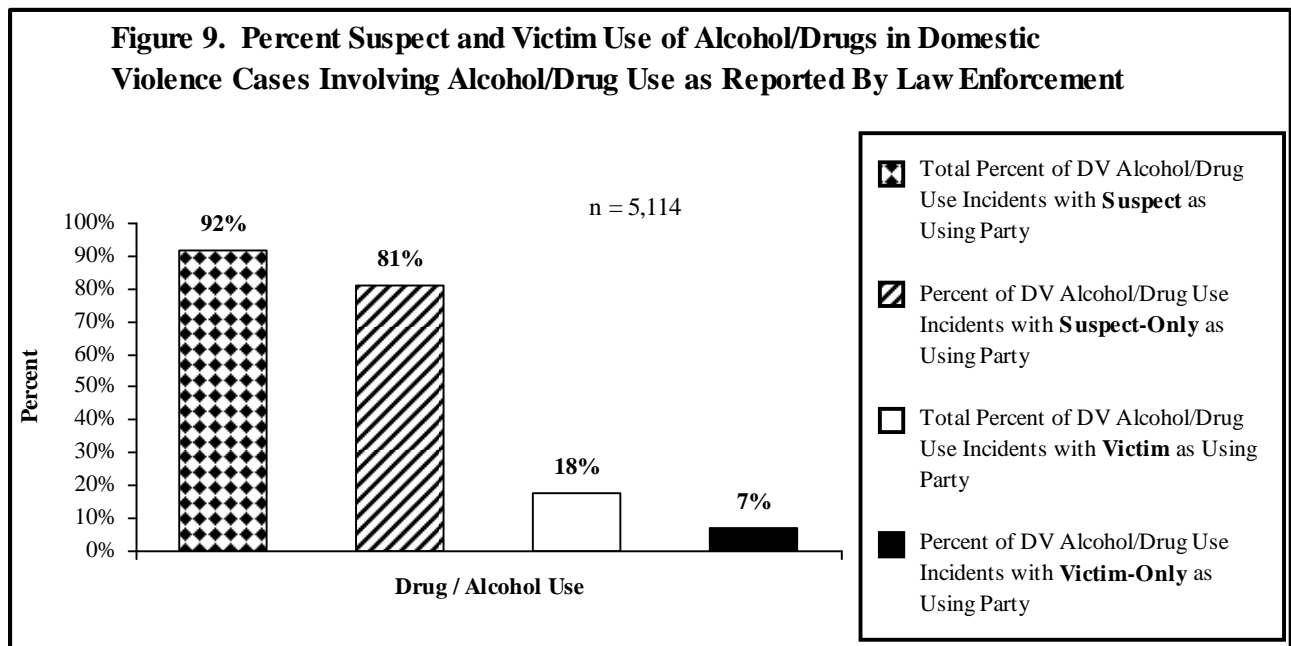
Hispanics comprised 59% (2,243) of the 3,816 children victim-witnesses where race/ethnicity was documented, followed by 18% (677) White (non-Hispanic), 18% (672) Native Americans, 3% (114) Blacks, <1% (10) Asians, and 3% (100) Other. Refer to Figure 8.

Of the 2,521 offender reports that documented *offender race/ethnicity*, the racial/ethnic group with the greatest number of offenders represented were *Hispanics*, 53% (1,339), followed by *Whites (non-Hispanics)*, 26% (662), *Native Americans*, 16% (394), *Blacks*, 3% (85), *Other race/ethnicity*, 1% (35) and *Asians*, <1(6). 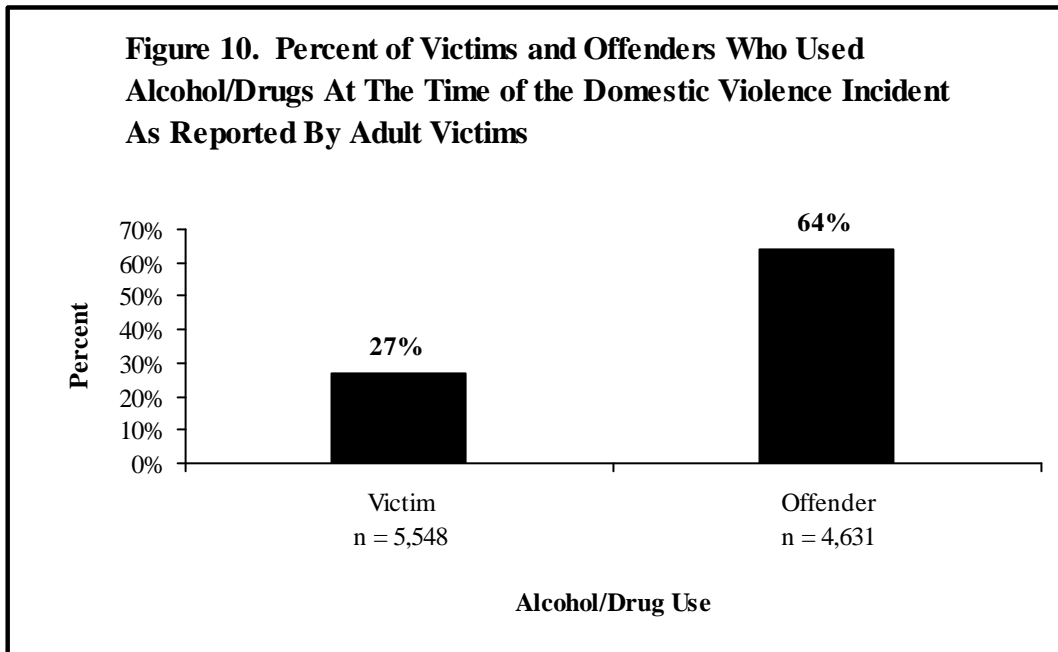

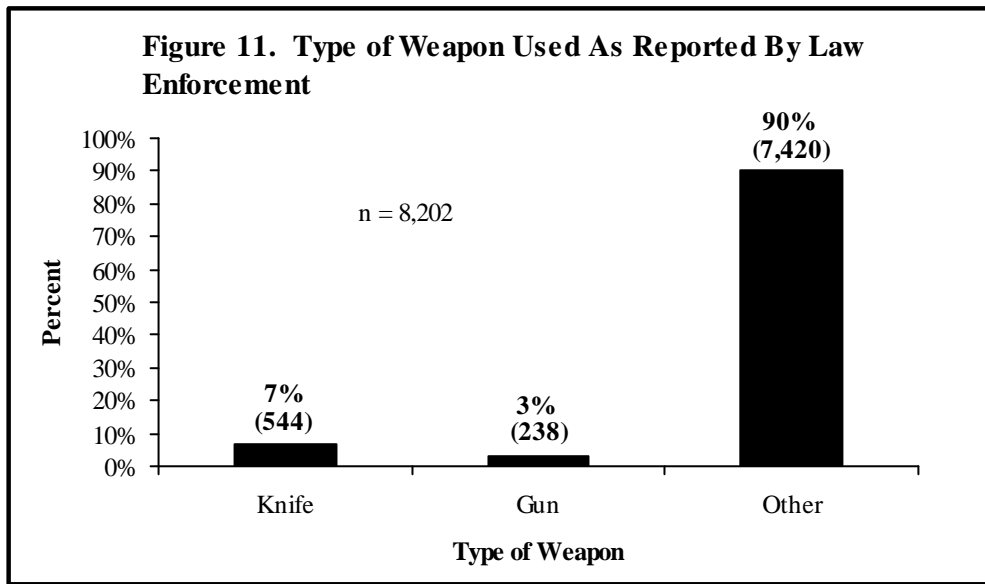

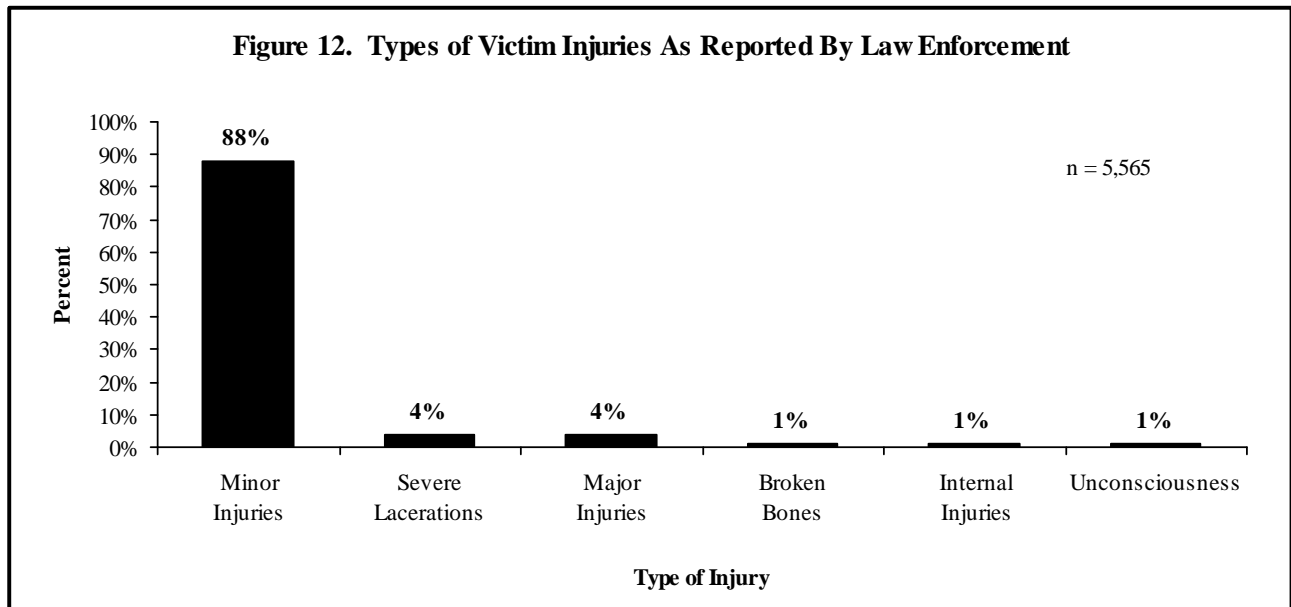

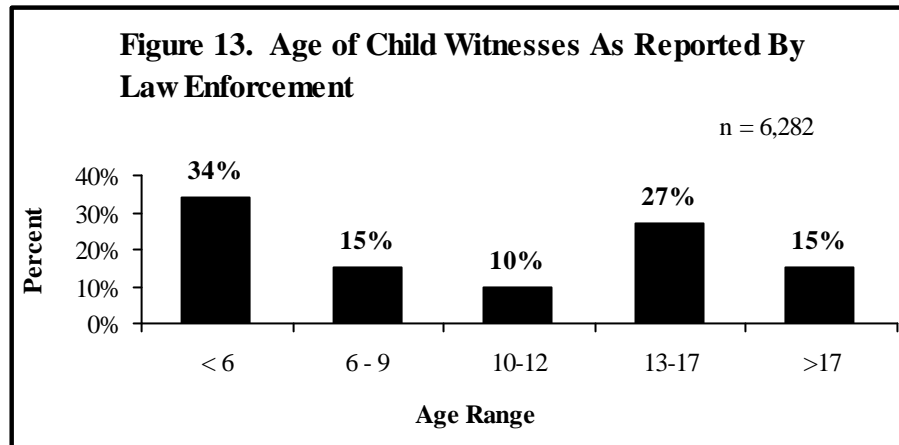
There were 5,565 injuries documented in the 5,356 cases involving injury. Of these, *minor* injuries comprised 88% (4,887) of all injuries reported, *severe lacerations* 4% (231), and *major* injuries 4% (219). *Broken bones* (80), *internal injuries* (40) and victims rendered *unconscious* (82) comprised 1% respectively, of all victim injuries. As reported by law enforcement, the ages of the children were documented in 6,282 cases. One-third (34%) of these children were under 6 years of age, 15% were 6-9 years of age, and 10% were age 10 - 12. Therefore, over half (59%) of those children who witnessed domestic violence incidents were not yet adolescents. Adolescents between the ages of 13 - 17 comprised 27% of the children at the domestic violence scenes, while young adults, 18-21, comprised 15% of those who witnessed domestic abuse. 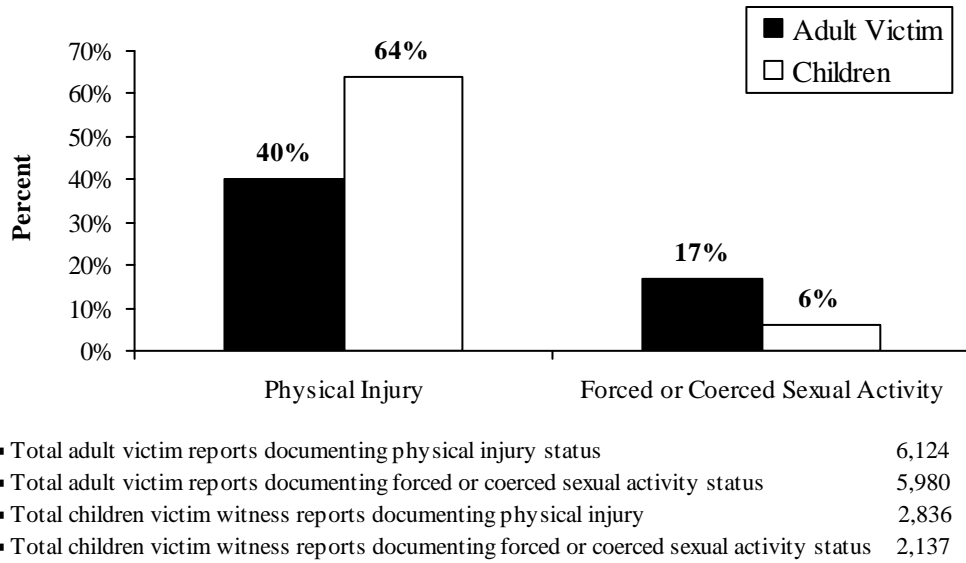
There were 13,972 law enforcement reported domestic violence incidents that documented both the number of *incidents* with children present and the number of *children* present. Of these incidents, 4,098 had children present and the total number of children present was 6,483 or 1.6 children per incident. The analysis of these incidents allow for a more accurate determination of the average number of children present when children witness family violence incidents.

M. What About Injury and Sexual Assault Among Adult Victims and Children Who Went For Help

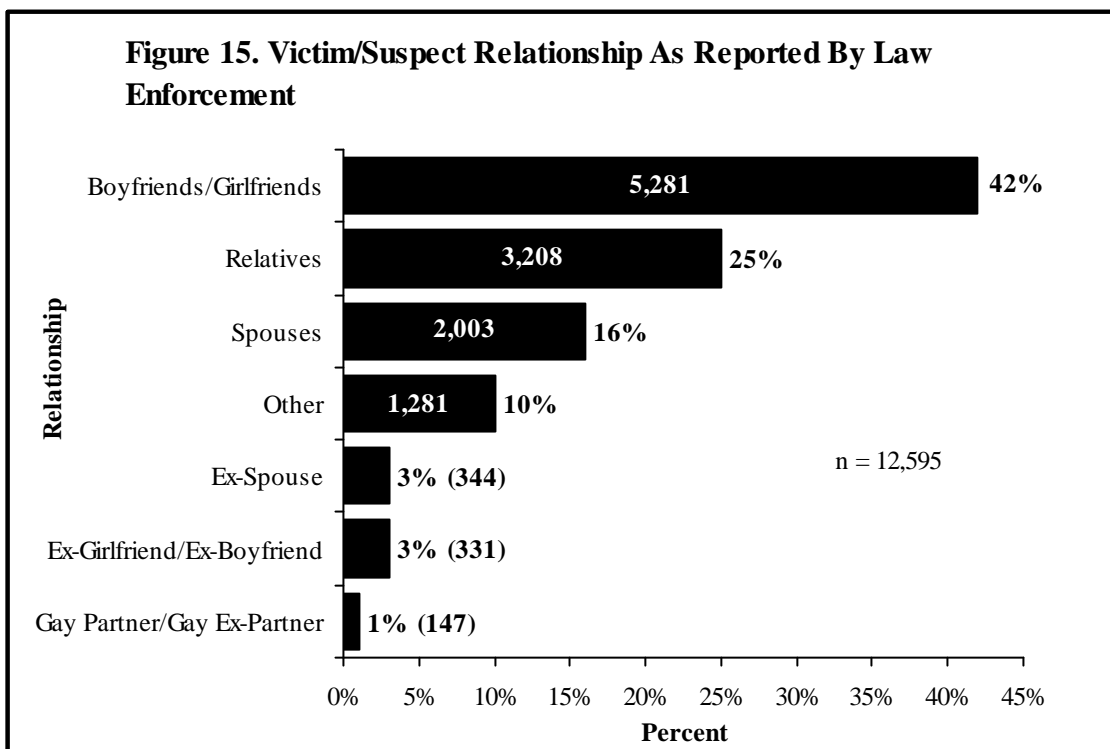
Figure 14. Percent Adult Victims and Children Victim-Witnesses Who Experienced Physical Injury and Sexual Assault from the Adult Victim's Offender

Of 6,124 service provider reports, 2,472 (40%) *adult victims* reported being *physically injured* from the domestic assault. Similarly, there were 5,980 provider reports that identified 1,030 (17%) adult victims who experienced *forced or coerced sexual activity* from the current offender. See **Figure 14**.

There were 2,836 service provider reports that identified 1,805 (64%) *children victim-witnesses* that experienced *physical abuse* from the current offender of the adult victim. Similarly, there were 2,137 provider reports that identified 125 (6%) *children victim-witnesses* who experienced *sexual abuse* from the current offender of the adult victim. Refer to Figure 14.

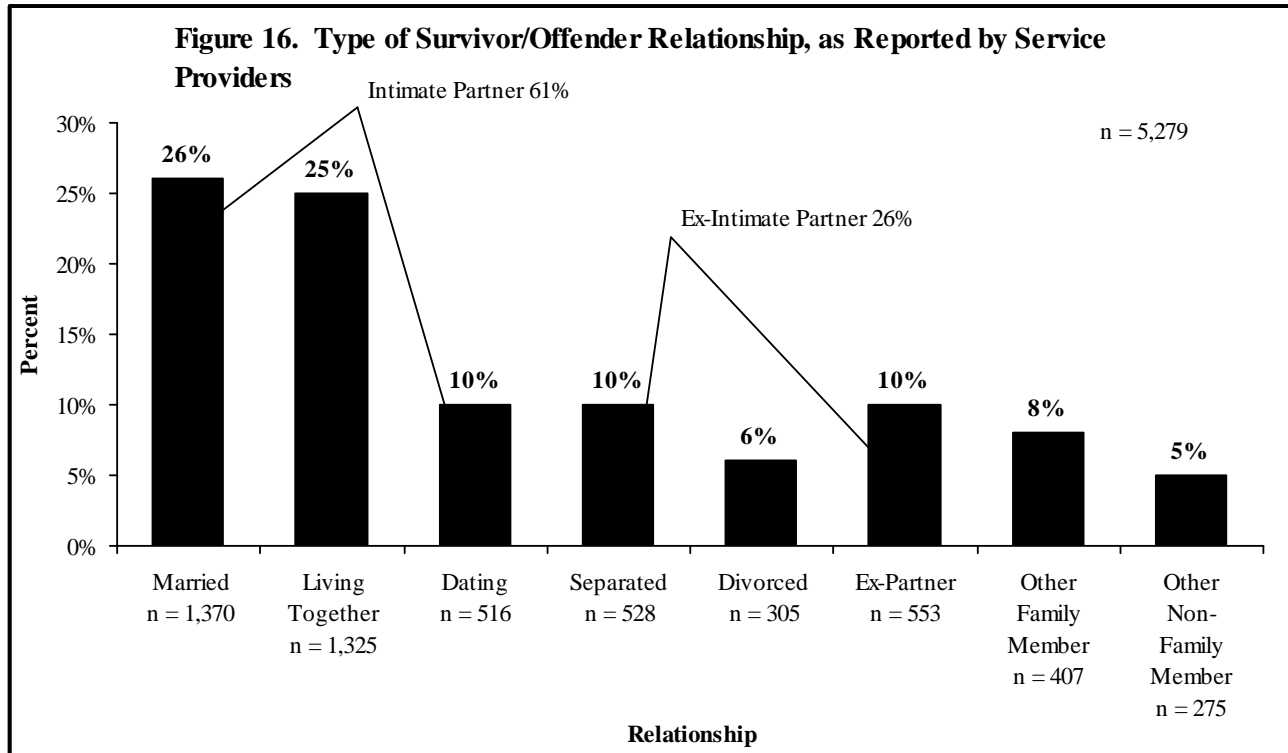
N. Who Are The People Hurting Their Partners or Family Members

Of 20,561 suspects reported by law enforcement, their relationship to the victim was documented among 12,595. Of these, a total of 45% were *boyfriend/girlfriend* (42%) and *ex-boyfriend/girlfriend* (3%). The *victim/suspect relationships* in 19% were *spouse* (16%) and *ex-spouse* (3%). *Relatives* accounted for 25% of identified *victim/suspect relationships*. See **Figure 15**.

The *victim/offender relationship* was documented in 5,279 service provider victim reports. Over one-quarter, 26% (1,370) of victims were *married* to their offender, and an additional 25% (1,325) were *living together*. Another 10% (516) were *dating* their offender and 26% were either an *ex-partner* (10% or 553), *separated* (10% or 528) or *divorced* (6% or 305). Therefore, 87% of those receiving direct services were the result of violence perpetrated by a former or current intimate partner. See **Figure 16**.

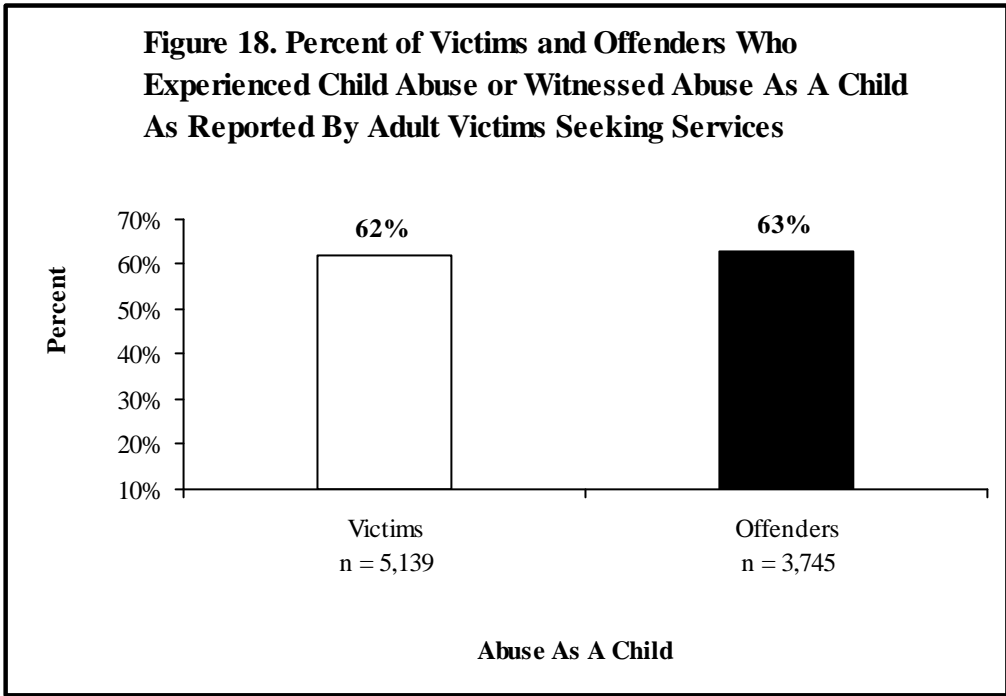


O. How Long Have Domestic Violence Victims Been In A Relationship With Their Offenders

There were 4,657 reports that documented the *length of relationship* between the victim and offender. The greatest number of victims, 25% respectively, reported a relationship with a duration of 3-5 years (1,167) and 11 -20 years (1,154), followed by those who reported a relationship of 6-10 years 21% (973) and 1-2 years 18% (853). Eleven percent (510) were together *less than a year* and 8% (377) were together over 20 years. See **Figure 17**.

P. How Many Victims and Offenders Have Been Victims Of Abuse When They Were Children

Past victim abuse and/or the witnessing of abuse as a child was documented in 5,139 provider reports. Almost two-third (62% or 3,196) of *adult victims* reported experiencing *abuse as a child*. See **Figure 18**. Additionally, 84% or 5,303 of 6,311 of adult victims reported experiencing at least one prior domestic violence incident as an adult.



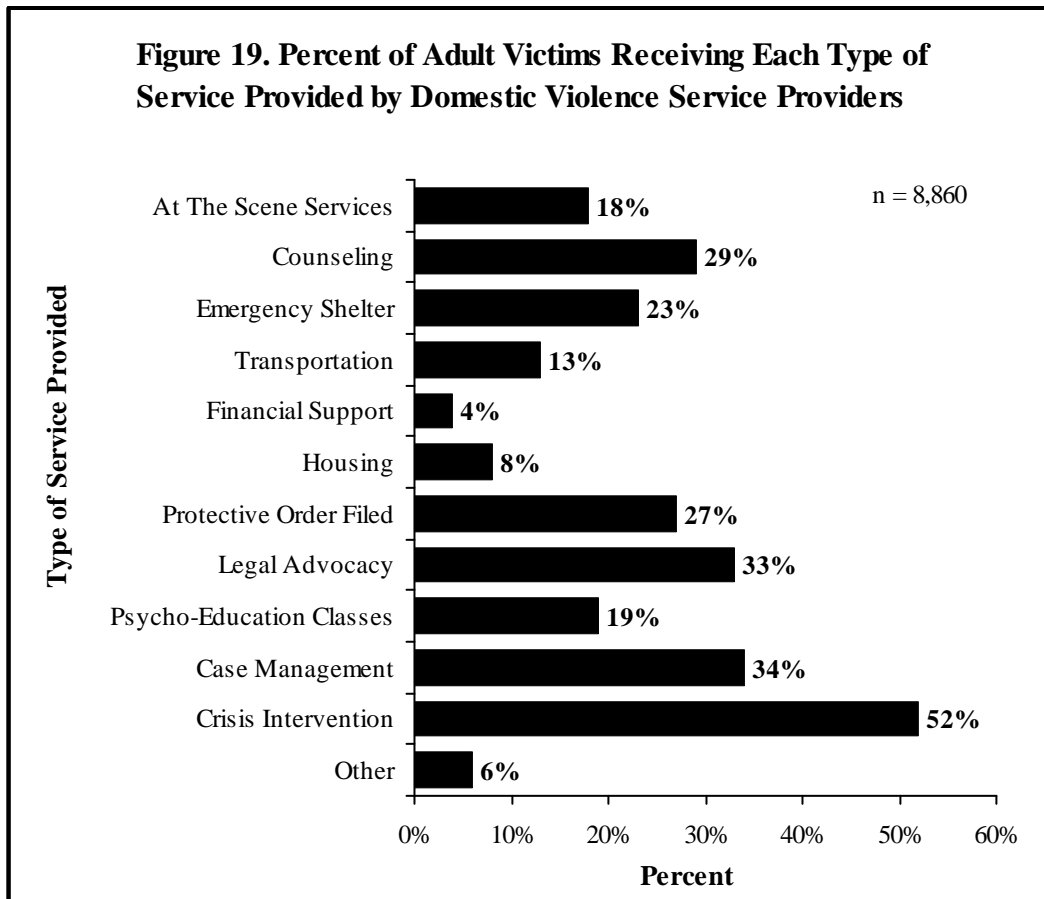
In 2010, there were 1,918 offender reports that documented past abuse. Of these, 37% (703) reported experiencing abuse as a child. However, when *victims* were asked if their *offender* was abused as a child, 63% (2,341 of 3,745) reported that their offender experienced abuse as a child. Refer to Figure 18.

Q. Who Refers Adult Victims for Help and What Kind of Services Do They Receive

Most adult victim referrals to service providers were by *law enforcement* (29%), self-referrals (28%) and *adult court* (7%). Additionally, service providers throughout the state responded to 18,052 crisis/hotline calls. The *Domestic Violence Resource Center* (Albuquerque) (4,914) and *El Puente* (Socorro) (4,890) responded to the most crisis calls, 27% respectively, followed by *SAFE House* (Albuquerque) (1,149) and the *Family Crises Center* (Farmington) (1,098), 6% respectively.

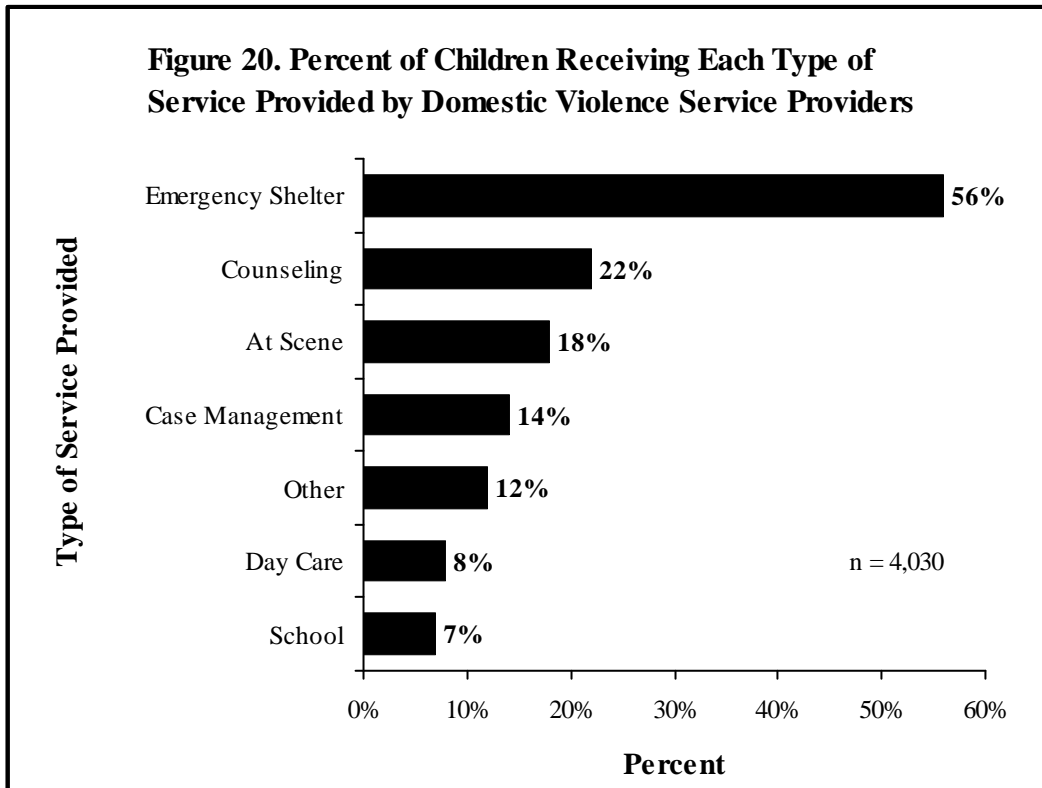

O 2,804 children referrals, most 43% (1,194) were referred by a *family member/relative* and *law enforcement*, 25% (708).

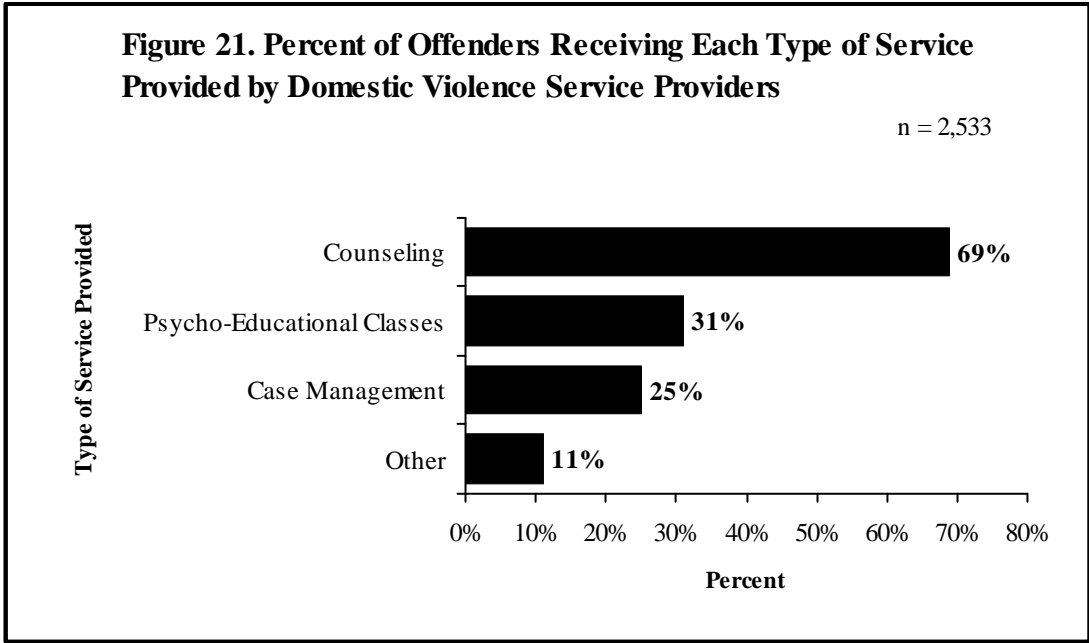

Of 2,414 offender referrals, most were referred for services by *adult court* 75% (1,811). Ten percent of offenders were referred by *law enforcement* (236), 6% (152) were *self-referred*, and 5% (115) were referred by *CYFD Child Protective Services*.

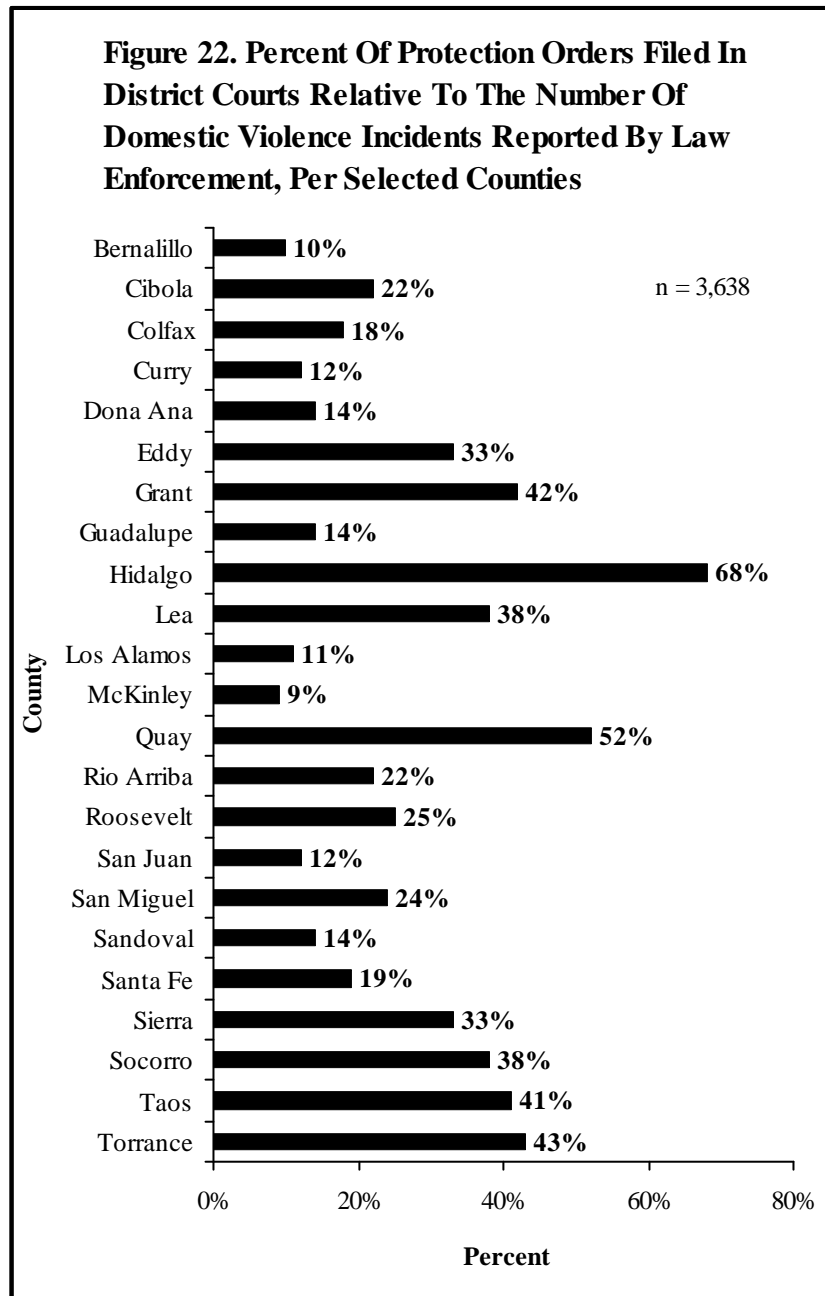

In counties with the most complete reporting (those with the law enforcement agency from the largest city in the county reporting and with a minimum of 20 cases) a comparison was made between the number of protection orders filed in each county and the number of domestic violence cases reported to law enforcement in each county. *Hidalgo County* had the highest number of protection orders filed in District Court relative to the number of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement in *Hidalgo County* (68%), followed by *Quay County* (52%), *Torrance County* (43%) and *Grant County* (42%). *McKinley County* had the fewest

X. How Many Domestic Violence Charges Were Filed in District and Magistrate Courts in 2010

In law enforcement there is an undetermined number of domestic violence cases documented and processed as other crimes, such as fire, destruction of property, vandalism, homicide, false imprisonment, car collisions, etc., that are not known to be domestic violence related, or when known, are not always entered into each law enforcement agency's database coded as domestic-related. Therefore, the family violence nature of the crime is not captured. This same problem in capturing some domestic violence incidents is true in the courts, as well.

With aggregate data, the best approach to capture as much reliable domestic violence incidents as possible, is to establish a consistent definition of domestic-violence when extracting such data from law enforcement and court information systems. To this end, domestic violence cases examined from the courts include the following law enforcement charges, all perpetrated against a household member: *assault* (A), *aggravated assault* (AA), *battery* (B), *aggravated battery* (AB), *stalking* (S), *aggravated stalking* (AS), and *assault with intent to commit violent felony* (AIF). Data from all 32 district courts (**Appendix K**) and 48 magistrate courts (**Appendix L**) were extracted from the statewide Administrative Office of the Courts automated system. Data from the *Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court* (BCMC) case management database system were not provided to the Central Repository for this report.

Of the 3,206 domestic violence cases disposed by the district courts in 2010, *Albuquerque District Court* disposed half, 52% (1,659), followed by the *Las Cruces District Court*, 10% (324). *Clovis* (137) and *Aztec* (133) district courts disposed 4% of domestic violence cases, respectively. *Bernalillo* (107), *Santa Fe* (89) and *Roswell* (84) district courts disposed 3%, respectively of all district court cases.

Of the 7,882 domestic violence cases disposed by the magistrate courts in 2010, *Las Cruces Magistrate Court* disposed 14% (1,095), followed by the *Gallup Magistrate Court*, 9% (716), *Santa Fe Magistrate Court*, 8% (641), *Farmington Magistrate Court*, 7% (520) and *Bernalillo Magistrate Court*, 6% (462).

Z. What Types of Domestic Violence Charges Are Processed In the Courts

1. District Court

Three-quarters (76%) of the disposed district court domestic violence cases included charges of *battery* (52%) or *aggravated battery* (24%). *Aggravated assault* and *assault* comprised 14% and 7% of domestic violence cases, respectively. *Aggravated stalking* comprised 2% of domestic violence cases, while *stalking* and *assault with intent to commit violent felony* comprised 1%, respectively. See **Figure 23**.

2. Magistrate Court

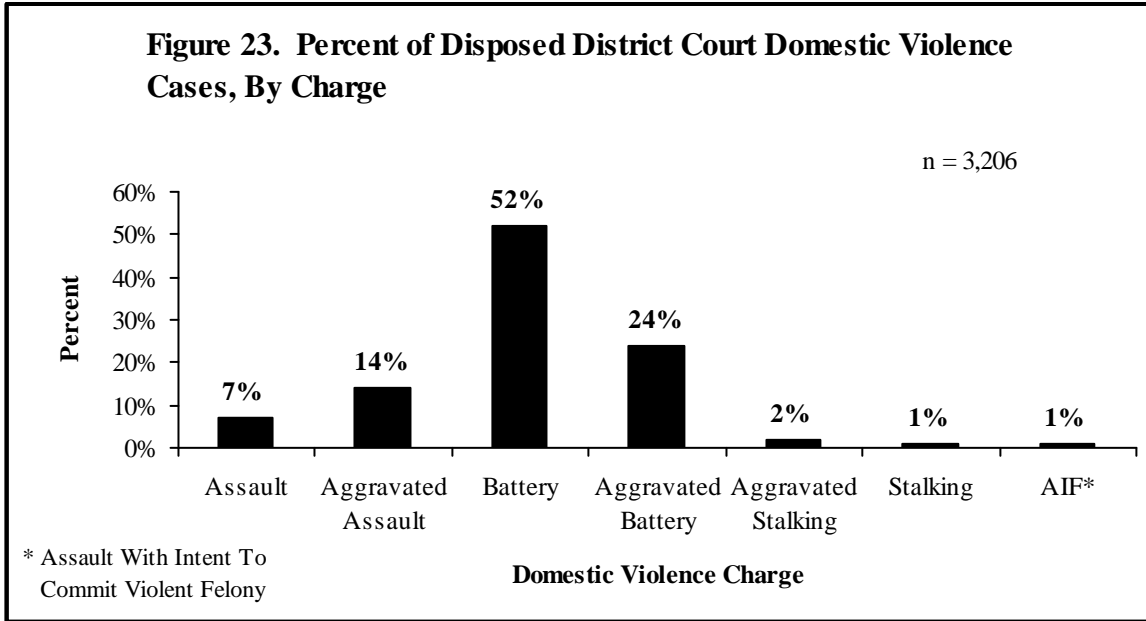
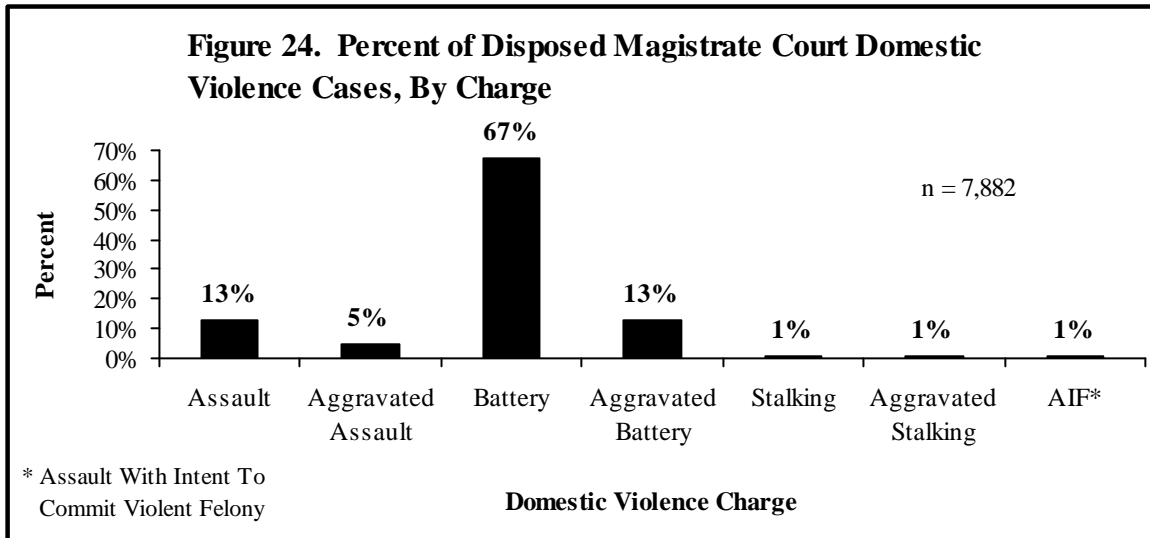


Figure 24. Percent of Disposed Magistrate Court Domestic Violence Cases, By Charge

Of 7,882 disposed cases of domestic violence in magistrate courts, 80% were *battery* (67%) and *aggravated battery* (13%) charges. *Assault* and *aggravated assault* comprised 13% and 5% of cases, respectively. *Stalking* and *aggravated stalking*, comprised 1%, respectively, of domestic violence cases disposed by the magistrate courts (see **Figure 24**). These small proportions of domestic violence crimes with aggravating circumstances in magistrate courts are a reflection of the purview of the magistrate courts. Normally, crimes with aggravating circumstances, such as *aggravated battery*, *aggravated stalking*, *aggravated assault* and *assault with intent to commit a violent felony* are processed as felonies in the district courts.

Figure 23. Percent of Disposed District Court Domestic Violence Cases, By Charge

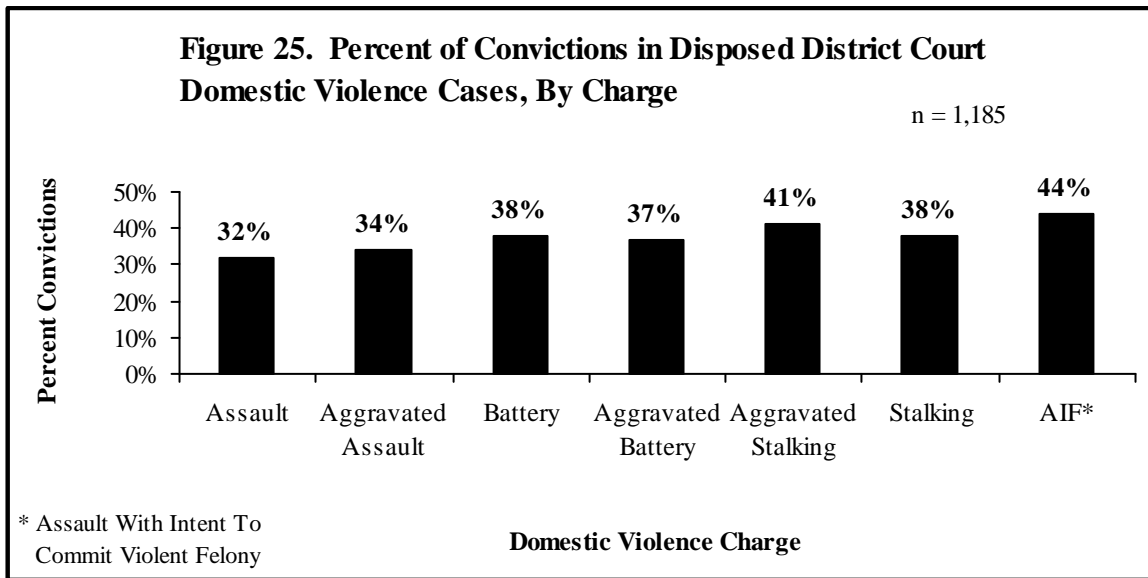

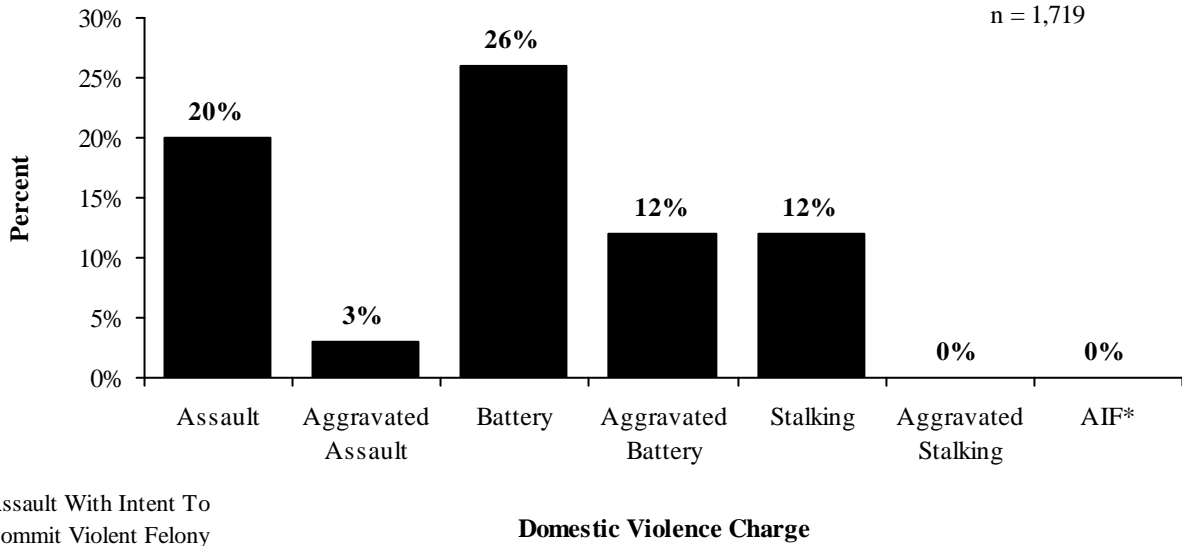

SECTION TWO: IMPLICATIONS OF THE FINDINGS AND FUTURE DATA NEEDS

I. IMPLICATIONS OF THE FINDINGS

A. Evidence Supporting a Reduction in the Incidence of Domestic Violence

While the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey captures reported and unreported *intimate partner* violence rates and will offer state to state and state to national comparisons of intimate partner violence, it does not capture domestic violence beyond that perpetrated by current or former intimate partners. Without an annual statewide victimization survey it is not possible to measure change in the rate of domestic violence incidence that captures reported and unreported cases in New Mexico. It is only possible to capture changes in *reported* domestic violence. Our best indicator for measuring change in reported incidents is the number of domestic violence cases reported to statewide law enforcement agencies. From 2005-2010, there was a 31% decrease in the number of domestic violence incidents reported to statewide law enforcement agencies while the number of law enforcement agencies reporting to the Central Repository (an average 102 each year) and the proportion of the state population represented by participating law enforcement agencies (an average 92%) have remained relatively constant. This is welcome news as it indicates that prevention initiatives over the last five years are making a difference.

B. Improvements in Suspect Arrests

The motivation to accurately identify a *primary aggressor* in violent situations is to obtain better outcomes for the victim and children (safety and referrals for services); and to separate the offender from those at risk for harm. Perhaps an unintended benefit to the improved ability of officers to identify the primary aggressor in a violent situation is an increase in the number of domestic violence incidents that resulted in a suspect arrest. The proportion of domestic violence incidents with in a suspect arrest increased significantly (19%), from a low in 2005 (29%) to a high in 2010 (50%).

C. Stalking Technology, Training and Victim Referral

Even with new stalking policies, there are still too few cases of stalking recognized and charged as such by law enforcement agencies throughout the state. In the 12 months prior to the SVV, 2.0% of adult women and 0.4% of adult men were victims of stalking in New Mexico. Nationally in 2010, the NISVS found that 4% of adult women and 1.3% of adult men were victims of stalking. In 2010, statewide law enforcement agencies identified 2,330 victims of harassment and 125 stalking victims. The ages of the stalking victims are not reported. However, even if all the law enforcement reported stalking victims were 18 and older, this represents 0.008% of the adult men and women in New Mexico, and demonstrates that the number of stalking victims that come to the attention of statewide law enforcement is 250 to 500 times less than that reported for women in the SVV (2.0%) and NISVS (4%), respectively, and 50 to 163 times less than that reported for men in the SVV (0.4%) and NISVS (1.3%), respectively.

There are numerous administrative and procedural issues that affect accurate reporting of domestic violence and stalking incidents ranging from whether and how police offense incident reports are written, and how these reports are entered into law enforcement databases or otherwise counted.

The issues surrounding identification of stalking incidents and victims are particularly worrisome. One possible explanation is that most stalking cases are labeled other crimes (harassment, vandalism, destruction of property, arson, trespassing, car theft, etc.) and are therefore not captured. The inability to differentiate between stalking victims and victims of isolated crimes means that stalking victims are not getting referred for

appropriate services. This is a significant problem as the SVV found that 87% of stalking victims also reported being a victim of domestic violence, other physical attack, and/or sexual assault. These victims and their children are at greater health and safety risk and need to be referred for appropriate services; and these types of referrals are not likely to happen as a result of a trespass, vandalism, or other similarly labeled isolated crime incident. It is imperative to provide necessary training to all law enforcement officers, administrative personnel, and executive personnel whose policies guide law enforcement procedure regarding the description, documentation and data entry of stalking crimes. In 2010, APD and a few other law enforcement agencies implemented new technology for officers at the scene to access information regarding prior offenses and protection order information. It is hoped that this technology will improve identification and referral of stalking victims and the documentation of stalking incidents.

D. Evidence Supporting the Focus on Early Intervention to Prevent Domestic Violence

In 2010, two-thirds (64%) of the law enforcement incidents documenting the victim/offender relationship, were perpetrated by a current or former intimate partner, 45% of these by current or former boyfriends/girlfriends who are or were dating or living together. Similarly, 87% of adult victims who sought services from a domestic violence service provider were assaulted by a current or former intimate partner, one-third of these were dating or living together. The SSV found that two-thirds (66.5%) of domestic violence incidents were perpetrated by current or former intimate partners, one-third of these were dating or living together. Further, stalking behaviors begin in adolescence and the incidence of adolescent stalking is almost twice that of adolescent intimate partner violence. The high proportion of interpersonal violence cases perpetrated by those not yet married, demonstrate that true prevention requires early education initiatives on building healthy relationships during adolescence.

E. Sexual Assault Prevention and Treatment for Domestic Violence Child and Adult Victims

In 2010, 1 in every 3.4 incidents of domestic violence reported by law enforcement involved a child witness and an average of two children (1.6) were present at each. Additionally, at least one child was present in 1 out of every 2 adult victim cases handled by domestic violence service providers. Too many children experienced sexual abuse (6%) at the hands of their adult-victim's offender. Similarly, 17% of adult domestic violence victims were sexually assaulted by their offender.

The rates of sexual abuse of adults and children are grossly underreported. Findings from the SVV reveal that almost half of the adults in New Mexico who were ever a victim of domestic violence, intimate partner violence or stalking were also sexually assaulted. Of those that were sexually assaulted, 45% were victimized by the age of 12. Further, the NISVS reported that 8.7% of women that were ever victims of intimate partner physical violence, were also raped by their intimate partner. This suggests that effective prevention and treatment programs for domestic violence victims must include components of sexual assault prevention and treatment or must provide referrals to appropriate sexual assault services.

F. Interpersonal Violence Advocacy and Prevention

In New Mexico in 2010, 28% of domestic violence victims identified by law enforcement were males. Findings from the SVV demonstrated that 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, 1 in 10 a victim of intimate partner violence, and 1 in 14 a victim of stalking. More outreach must be done to identify male victims of interpersonal violence to offer prevention and treatment programs specific to males.

G. Providing Offender Treatment Programs

In New Mexico, 74% of suspects identified by law enforcement and 82% of offenders identified by domestic violence service providers are *male*. Findings from the SVV revealed that 83% of stalking offenders and 80% of domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders respectively, are male. Even when males are the victims in interpersonal violence crimes, half to two-thirds are being victimized by a male. Perhaps greater outcomes in domestic violence prevention may be realized through greater availability of offender prevention and therapeutic programs that include strategies for addressing aggression in male socialization.

H. Evidence Supporting the Need to Identify Domestic Violence Victims in the Healthcare Setting

From 2005-2010, law enforcement reported that an average one-third (35.5%) of adult victims were physically injured as a result of domestic violence. Similarly, statewide service providers reported that one-third respectively, of adults (37%) and nearly half (48%) of the children were physically injured by the adult victim's offender. The SVV found that 44% of domestic violence victims were injured and over one-third of them sought medical treatment. This suggests that increased accuracy in reporting domestic violence incidents and identifying victims for referral to needed interventions requires interpersonal violence surveillance initiatives in New Mexico healthcare facilities.

Patients that are seen in the healthcare/emergency room setting with a domestic violence-related injury are typically not reported to law enforcement and represent a substantial gap in reporting. While many healthcare facilities use screening tools to identify patients who are victims of domestic violence, no standardized monitoring system to reliably document the number of these individuals currently exists. Methods to determine healthcare utilization by victims of violence through e-codes or billing databases have been unsuccessful and are unreliable at best, due to definitional problems of the codes, practitioner discretion and inconsistencies in naming injuries, and the insurance related intentions of billing databases. The need to rectify these problems is underscored by findings from the SVV which revealed substantial co-morbidity with domestic violence victims with regard to serious disabling injury and chronic mental health problems.

I. Evidence Supporting the Need for Better Court Data on Domestic Violence

It is not at all clear why the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) changed the set of codes that defined domestic violence protection orders in 2006. This change omitted three previous codes from the definition set. The result in 2006 was a 32% drop in the number of protection orders related to domestic violence from the previous year. However, from 2006-2010, the definition set has been consistent and still, there was a 26% decrease in the number of protection orders issued by district courts in that time period.

The Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court (BCMC) data is not standardized with data from other magistrate courts across the state and is separate from data captured at the AOC. While the AOC reports magistrate court data to the Central Repository, BCMC does not. Since BCMC is the largest jurisdiction in the state, there is no way to measure how closely the Central Repository's findings on magistrate court dispositions and convictions correspond to actual practices regarding the adjudication of domestic violence cases.

It is important to obtain better court data because evidence of currently available data demonstrates that there has been a steady *decrease* in the rate of domestic violence convictions in statewide district and magistrate courts. In 2010, the conviction rates of disposed domestic violence cases in district (37%) and magistrate courts (21%), represent the lowest rates of conviction over the last six years.

Without better data from the courts, too much vital information remains unknown: 1) how many new domestic violence charges get dismissed and why; 2) why the rate of conviction for domestic violence cases is so low; 3) what the typical sentence is for misdemeanor and felony domestic violence charges; and 4) what the average length of incarceration is for domestic violence felonies compared to other felonies. Answers to these questions will serve to improve the efficacy of legal advocacy for domestic violence victims.

The AOC has “three staff attorneys who serve as the point of contact for designated subject matter areas: water, access to justice, and child welfare and juvenile justice”. In 2011, a position for a point of contact attorney within the AOC for violence against women issues was created and funded by the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). The purpose of the point of contact attorney position is to “explore the need for and make recommendations regarding standard policies, practices and procedures for processing domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking cases. There has never been a greater need for this position. The Central Repository is working with the point of contact attorney to address the current data issues. The scope of domestic violence includes much more charges than what currently define it in the courts, typically battery and aggravated battery, assault and aggravated assault. Without a greater scope of definition and communication of case information, we will not be equipped to address the obstacles to improved legal advocacy for domestic violence victims.

J. Interpersonal Violence and Needed Changes in Law Enforcement, Prosecution and The Courts To Reduce The Risk of Harm for Male and Female Victims

Findings from the SVV demonstrate that female victims are more likely than male victims to report their offense, two times more likely to file criminal charges against their offenders and are more likely to get a restraining order against their offenders, even though interpersonal crimes with male victims involve more alcohol/drugs, weapon use and more serious disabling injury. Additionally, while half of all restraining orders are violated, male victims of intimate partner violence crimes are more likely to have a restraining order violated, less likely to have their offenders arrested, and significantly more likely that the charges against their offenders will be dropped or the offenders will obtain an acquittal. Further, if their offenders are convicted, offenders of male victims are more likely to serve less time in jail or prison than offenders of female victims.

While all of the system failures that contribute to the high risk of harm for female victims of interpersonal violence are widely known, it is clear from these findings that interpersonal violence is dangerous for males, as well. While both genders do not utilize system protections as they should, male victims are even less likely than female victims to do so; and even when system protections are sought for intimate partner violence, violations of restraining orders are more frequent and convictions of their offenders less frequent for male victims. All of this speaks to: 1) the need for early education to correct misconceptions in gender socialization; 2) greater community education to increase awareness of the incidence and risk of interpersonal violence among males; and 3) comprehensive training of law enforcement, prosecutors and judges regarding the high risk of harm for men and women victims of interpersonal violence and the development of protocols in their respective disciplines aimed at reducing the likelihood of harm, disability and death of all interpersonal violence victims.

II. LIMITATIONS OF THE DATA AND FUTURE DATA NEEDS

A. Law Enforcement

- Advances in technology are available and must be utilized to make it easier for law enforcement to establish a pattern of stalking from isolated incidents of crime and identify and refer victims and children for appropriate services. When stalking is identified, it must be charged accordingly with the

confidence that district attorneys will seriously prosecute this crime as is warranted and victims and their children must be referred to appropriate services.

B. District Attorney's Offices

- Greater study must be focused on what the district attorney's offices need to process domestic violence cases in a timely and accurate manner, and then appropriate steps taken to address identified roadblocks. In practice, those district attorney's offices that have a specialized prosecution unit, i.e. one or more prosecutors assigned exclusively to domestic violence cases (depending on the size of the court's jurisdiction) have less cases dismissed for lack of preparation and therefore, more cases prosecuted. For this reason, all statewide district attorney's offices should be encouraged to establish a specialized prosecution unit.
- Greater advances in vertical prosecution which prosecute crimes based on evidence and do not require the victim to press charges or testify, would greatly reduce the high number of dismissals for this reason. Requiring victims who fear retribution from the offender or economic ruin for themselves and their children to testify as a requirement of prosecution, merely encourages the cycle of abuse. In the end, only 21% of disposed magistrate court cases of domestic violence ended with an offender conviction. Furthermore, the percent of cases that did not make it to disposition is not exactly clear from currently provided data. This is not encouraging news for victims whose purpose for involving the court is to obtain protection from the offender. Indeed, it is the frequency of such experiences which discourages survivors from reporting subsequent assaults perpetrated on themselves and their children.
- Data needs from the Administrative Office of the District Attorney's (AODA) include case disposition information such as the number of convictions at trial, the number of pled cases and pled to lesser charges, the number of trial acquittals, and sentencing information on both misdemeanor and felony domestic violence charges. Currently, no reliable data from the AODA has been made available to the Central Repository.
- The New Mexico Sentencing Commission study proposed the "Next Step" in obtaining sentencing information from district attorney's offices:

"During the pilot project we learned there is not a single data source that maintains all the information needed to study sentencing in domestic violence cases. The District Attorneys have the majority of the information needed; but unfortunately it is not available in an electronic format. It is not feasible to travel to District Attorneys' offices to collect the incident characteristics, prior criminal history, and sentencing considerations for all cases statewide. However, it is important to collect this information on a larger sample of cases to see if a sentencing model can be developed based on incident characteristics and other variables. In December 2007, the project advisory group endorsed a prospective approach to collecting this information statewide. The approach involves asking District Attorneys' offices to fill out a data collection form provided by NMSC at the time of sentencing for every case that has a HHM (household member) crime."

Since District Attorneys' offices have been trained on how to complete the sentencing form, it is recommended that more District Attorneys' offices comply with the NMSC by completing and submitting the forms. This is necessary to allow NMSC to establish a comprehensive database that maintains all the information needed to critically study sentencing in domestic violence cases.

C. The Courts

- While the Administrative Office of the Courts provides domestic violence information to the Central Repository for all district and magistrate courts throughout the state, the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court (BCMC) does not participate. This is quite disturbing, since it is the largest jurisdiction in the state and handles the most misdemeanor cases. A better effort should be made on the part of BCMC to address whatever obstacles exist that prevent them from reporting on their court's activity regarding domestic violence crimes in Bernalillo County. It is hoped that the AOC Violence Against Women Point of Contact Attorney will establish the necessary communication to begin to access this information.
- In the last six years, law enforcement officers have been trained in the investigation of domestic violence cases to promote prosecution based on case evidence versus victim testimony, as is done in homicide, suicide and other crimes. However, many magistrate judges throughout the state still dismiss evidence-based prosecution cases if the victim does not appear, as well. The recommendation is for all magistrate judges to be trained on the merits of evidence-based prosecution so that cases without victim testimony will still be accepted for prosecution. Again, there is great expectation for the AOC Violence Against Women Point of Contact Attorney to advance efforts regarding judicial training on domestic violence issues.

D. Domestic Violence Service Providers

- Presently, the New Mexico Coalition Against Domestic Violence is working with the Central Repository to establish a system that allows for the collection of individual records from membership programs. This data will dramatically expand the variables to be collected and allow for more meaningful analysis, the findings from which will provide guidance to prevention, treatment, investigation and prosecution efforts. This conversion of summary data to the capture of unique records is scheduled to begin July 1, 2012.

E. Medical Facilities

- The process for collecting standardized domestic violence data from statewide medical facilities is not yet completed. Since many times the first, and perhaps only contact a victim may have with the "helping system" is through a hospital emergency department or physicians' office, this creates a significant void in the Central Repository data and represents a major obstacle in accurately defining the scope and nature of domestic violence in our state. Moreover, until better protocols are established for identifying patient visits associated with interpersonal violence, a significant portion of the total cost of interpersonal violence to individuals, their communities and the state cannot be estimated.

F. Closing Comments

The aforementioned improvements in data collection will ultimately be required to answer the type of domestic violence questions that are most critical in guiding public policy decisions, program development and the most effective allocation of resources. To this end, the Central Repository Director will continue to pursue collaborations with statewide agencies (both current participants and non-participants) and the State Department of Health and the Department of Public Safety to develop a process for enhancing our present data collection system.

Appendix A. Survey of Violence Victimization Summary

I. INTRODUCTION

Nationally, victimization surveys such as the National Crime Victims Survey and the National Violence Against Women Survey capture more comprehensive estimates of crimes, and in particular, interpersonal violence crimes than that which is captured by law enforcement. While New Mexico law enforcement agencies have reported their incidents of domestic violence, intimate partner violence, stalking and sexual assault to the Central Repository, determining the rates of these crimes that were *never* reported to law enforcement was not possible. The long term goal to rectify this problem and make possible more accurate estimates on the prevalence and incidence of interpersonal violence in New Mexico was to conduct our own statewide victimization survey. To this end, in 2005 the *Statewide Survey of Victimization in New Mexico* (SSV) was conducted, asking 2000 adult men and 2000 adult women about their experiences of violence. While all data captured from this survey will be analyzed over the course of time, several discouraging realities are clear from the preliminary findings of this survey:

1. The rates of domestic violence, intimate partner violence and stalking in New Mexico are staggering; and higher than national comparable rates found in the National Violence Against Women Survey (NVAWS), the most comprehensive victimization survey to date;
2. These interpersonal violence crimes are significantly under-reported to law enforcement;
3. There are significantly more victims of interpersonal violence than ever identified by law enforcement or service providers statewide, especially in the case of stalking;
4. There are significant co-morbidity and healthcare utilization associated with interpersonal violence; and
5. There are significant differences between males and females in the experience and adjudication of interpersonal violence crimes.

II. FINDINGS

A. Prevalence and Incidence of Interpersonal Violence

Fifteen percent or 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, and 32% or 1 in 3 adult females. Unfortunately, there is no comparable national rate available, as only physical assault in general, is captured.

Ten percent or 1 in 10 adult males has been the victim of intimate partner violence in his lifetime compared to 7% nationally (NVAWS). One-quarter (25%) or 1 in 4 adult females has been the victim of intimate partner violence in her lifetime compared to 22% nationally (NVAWS).

Seven percent or 1 in 14 adult males has been the victim of stalking in his lifetime compared to 4% nationally (NVAWS). One-quarter (25%) or 1 in 4 females has been the victim of stalking in her lifetime compared to 12% nationally (NVAWS).

In 2005 in New Mexico, 28,256 cases of domestic violence were reported to law enforcement, and 18,778 victims identified, which is half (51%) of the victims identified (36,594) in the SSV in the same time period. Domestic violence victims reported an average of 5.5 victimizations each by their offender in the last year, resulting in an estimated 201,267 incidents of domestic violence in New Mexico in 2005.

In 2005, law enforcement identified 206 stalking victims. The SSV identified 17,177 stalking victims in the same time period (83 times as many). Stalking victims reported experiencing an average of 14.3 stalking incidents each in the last year, resulting in an estimated 245,631 incidents of stalking in New Mexico in 2005.

B. Interpersonal Violence and Injury

Each year, law enforcement and service providers report the number of domestic violence victims that are injured as a result of their assault. In 2005, over one-quarter (28%) of law enforcement reported domestic violence incidents resulted in victim injury; and service providers reported that one-third (34%) of the adult victims they served were injured. Findings from the SSV reported that a significant proportion of those who were ever victims of domestic violence (44%), intimate partner violence (47%) and stalking (44%) were injured in their assaults. However, until now, we have never known how many victims of interpersonal violence sought medical care as a result of their injuries. In New Mexico, no standardized or centralized reporting process exists for capturing information on how many victims of interpersonal violence seek medical care.

C. Interpersonal Violence and Healthcare Utilization

Findings from the SSV reveal that slightly over one-third of those in New Mexico who were ever victims of domestic violence (35%), intimate partner violence (37%) and stalking (38%) went for medical treatment as a result of their injuries.

What we do not know, is how much healthcare utilization occurs as a result of co-morbidity among interpersonal violence victims. For instance, the SSV revealed that adults who were ever victims of domestic violence (16.5%), intimate partner violence (17%) and stalking (16%), experienced serious, disabling injury at twice the rate of the non-victimized population (8%). Additionally, adults who were ever victims of domestic violence (12%), intimate partner violence (11%) and stalking (12%) were nearly four times more likely to suffer from one or more chronic mental health conditions than non-violence victims (3%).

D. Men as Victims and Offenders in Interpersonal Violence

It is widely reported nationally and locally that most victims of interpersonal violence are females and most offenders are males. What was not known, and is most interesting, is that most *male* victims of interpersonal violence are victimized by a *male*, as well. A significant proportion of males who were ever victims of stalking (51%), domestic violence (62%) and intimate partner violence (49%) were victimized by a male.

E. Relationship Between Victims and Offenders of Interpersonal Violence

Two-thirds (66%) of victims of intimate partner violence were assaulted by an ex-romantic partner. Most (33%) stalking victims were stalked by someone they knew but not a relative or ever a romantic interest. Stalking victims were equally likely to be stalked by a stranger (28%) as an ex-romantic partner (27.5%).

F. Interpersonal Violence Involving Sexual Assault

The proportion of New Mexico adults who were ever stalked and also sexually assaulted in their lifetimes (48%) was greater than those who were ever domestic violence victims and sexually assaulted (45%) and intimate partner violence victims and sexually assaulted (44%). However, in the course of one's lifetime, one could be stalked by one person and sexually assaulted by another. A better measure of the rate of sexual assault by the same individual who commits physical assault is obtained by examining intimate partner violence in the last 12 months. Among intimate partner violence victims last year, 11.5% reported being sexually assaulted by their intimate partner. More female intimate partner violence victims were sexually assaulted (13%) than male intimate partner violence victims (9%).

G. Gender Differences in Interpersonal Violence

1. Interpersonal Violence and Weapons

In 2005, over one-third (38%) of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement involved a weapon. However, with aggregate reporting instead of individual records, it was not possible to determine if there was a difference in the rate of weapon use among the interpersonal violence crimes or if there was a difference in weapon use based on the gender of the victim. The SSV revealed that 32% of domestic violence, 33% intimate partner violence and 31% stalking incidents involved a weapon; and each of these crimes was significantly more likely to involve a weapon if the victim was male, than female: domestic violence (36% males, 30% female); intimate partner violence (41% male, 30% female); and stalking (39% male, 29% female).

2. Interpersonal Violence and Restraining Orders

Over the last four years, the Central Repository has reported that the average number of protection or restraining orders issued by the District Courts was equal to roughly one-quarter (26%) of the number of domestic violence incidents reported to law enforcement. The SSV revealed similar results, as roughly one-quarter of domestic violence (21%), intimate partner violence (23%) and stalking (26%) victims obtained a restraining order. However, results from the SSV showed that female domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were 2.5 times more likely to obtain a restraining order than their male counterparts. Similarly, female stalking victims were almost two times more likely than males to obtain a restraining order.

As a result of the SSV, we have our first measure of how many restraining orders are violated by the offender. Over half of all restraining orders in interpersonal violence crimes were violated: domestic violence (53.5%); intimate partner violence (56%); and stalking (51%); and

restraining orders obtained by male intimate partner violence victims had the highest rate of violation (58%).

3. Interpersonal Violence Reported to Law Enforcement and Rate of Arrests

Over the last three years, the Central Repository reported that an average of 54% of domestic violence victims who went for help reported their victimization incident to law enforcement. The SSV revealed significant differences in the rate of reporting to law enforcement by the victims of the three types of interpersonal violence crimes: domestic violence (38%), intimate partner violence (41%), and stalking (34%). While one-third of stalking victims reported their victimization to law enforcement, there were fewer arrests for stalking (5.5%), than for domestic violence and intimate partner violence (17%, respectively). Moreover, in cases of domestic violence and intimate partner violence, more offender arrests were made when there was a female victim. With stalking crimes, the arrest rate was almost equal for crimes perpetrated against female (6%) and male victims (5%).

4. Interpersonal Violence and Criminal Charges

Domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were more likely to file criminal charges (1 in 7, respectively) than stalking victims (1 in 17). Again, domestic violence and intimate partner violence female victims were two times more likely to file charges than male victims. Conversely, female and male victims of stalking were equally likely to file criminal charges.

H. Dispositions in Interpersonal Violence Crimes

Stalking offenders had the fewest outcomes with charges dropped (13%) compared to offenders of domestic violence (25%) and intimate partner violence (28%) offenders. Additionally, stalking offenders had the highest rate of guilty pleas or convictions (51%) over domestic violence offenders (38%) and intimate partner violence offenders (39%). Offenders of each interpersonal violence crime involving a female victim were significantly more likely to plead guilty than offenders of each with a male victim. The rate of acquittals for offenders of male domestic violence and intimate partner violence were 4 and 5 times, respectively, the rate of offender acquittals for these crimes with a female victim. Conversely, offenders of stalking with a male victim were much less likely to obtain an acquittal (<1%) than stalking offenders with a female victim (5%).

Roughly two-thirds of all those sentenced for interpersonal violence crimes were sentenced to jail or prison. The average sentence length for convicted domestic violence offenders (3.04 years) was longer than that of intimate partner violence offenders (2.7 years) and stalking offenders (1.97 years). Domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders received a longer average sentence when the victim was a female, while stalking offenders received a slightly longer average sentence when the victim was a male. Offenders sentenced for stalking a male victim actually served a longer average sentence (2.0 years) than offenders sentenced for intimate partner violence with a male victim (1.5 years).

APPENDIX B. RESPONDENT BELIEFS ABOUT PERSONAL SAFETY FOR WOMEN TODAY, THEIR OWN PERSONAL SAFETY AND ACCOMMODATING BEHAVIOR

- The SVV data was examined to assess respondents' beliefs about personal safety for women today, beliefs about their own personal safety, and accommodating behavior, specifically whether or not they carry something with them to defend themselves or alert other people. These variables were examined by the respondents' education level, race/ethnicity and whether or not they have been a victim of interpersonal violence (victims/non-victims).

1. Education Level

- Overall, the higher the education level, the more likely respondents are to believe that personal safety for women today has gotten worse. While this is true for males and females, the average proportion of females of every education level (51%) is significantly more than their male counterparts (38%) that believe that it *has gotten worse*. In fact, more high school males actually believe that personal safety for women *has improved* (36%), than believe it *has gotten worse* (30%).
- For females, the higher the education level, the more likely they are to be *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety. Over half (54%) of female respondents with a college/post-college degree report being *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety compared to 42% of those with some high school or less.
- Male respondents by education level, report the inverse of females with regard to beliefs about their own personal safety. More males with some high school or less (42%) are concerned about their own personal safety, compared to 26% of males with a college/post-college degree.
- The higher the education level for females, the more likely they are to carry something with them to defend themselves. Almost one-third (31%) of college/post-college women report they carry something compared to 11% of women with some high school or less.
- For males, more high school graduates and those with some college education (26%, respectively) carry something to defend themselves, than males from any other education level.

2. Race/Ethnicity

- Over half of *White (non-Hispanics)* (53%) and *Blacks* (56%) believe that personal safety for women today *has gotten worse* since they were a child, while slightly over one-third (38%, respectively) of *Hispanics* and *American Indians* believe this to be the case.
- There is a dramatic disconnect between Hispanic males and females with regard to beliefs about personal safety for women today. The greatest proportion of females (44%) report that personal safety for women today *has gotten worse*, while the greatest proportion of males (40%) report that it *has improved*.
- More *American Indians* (53%) report being *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety than respondents from all other racial/ethnic groups. An equal proportion

of *Blacks* (50%, respectively) are *somewhat or very concerned* as were *not really or just a little concerned*.

- For males, more *American Indians* (58%) and *Blacks* (55%) are *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety than males from other racial/ethnic groups where more reported being *not really or just a little concerned*. Slightly over one-quarter of *Hispanic* males and females, and one-third respectively of *White (non-Hispanic) females* and *American Indian males* carry something with them to defend themselves.

3. Victim/non-Victim Status

- While more *victims* (48%) than *non-victims* (41%) in New Mexico believe that personal safety for women *has gotten worse*, more respondents in both groups believe it *has improved or stayed about the same*. Ironically, however, twice as many *female non-victims* believe that personal safety for women today *has gotten worse* (46%) than believe it *has improved* (23%).
- More females whether they have ever been a victim or not, are *somewhat or very concerned* about their own personal safety than their male counterparts; and significantly more *female victims* are *somewhat or very concerned* (55%), than *female non-victims* (41%).
- Slightly over one-third of male and female *victims* carry something with them to defend themselves compared to less than one-quarter of *non-victims* that carry something to defend themselves.

APPENDIX C. DEFINITIONS

Domestic violence incidence as determined by law enforcement include all incidents of assault, aggravated assault, battery, and aggravated battery as outlined in the “Crimes Against Household Members Act” as follows:

30-3-10. Short Title.

This act (30-3-10 to 30-3-18 NMSA 1978) may be cited as the “Crimes Against Household Members Act”.

30-3-11. Definitions

- A. As used in the Crimes Against Household Members Act (30-3-10 to 30-3-18 NMSA 1978), “household member” means spouse, former spouse, parent, present or former step-parent, present or former parent in-law, grandparent, grandparent-in-law, a co-parent of a child or a person with whom a person has had a continuing personal relationship. Cohabitation is not necessary to be deemed a household member for the purposes of the Crimes Against Household Members Act;
- B. “continuing personal relationship” means a dating or intimate relationship.

30-3-12. Assault against a household member.

- A. Assault against a household member consists of:
 - (1) an attempt to commit a battery against a household member; or
 - (2) any unlawful act, threat or menacing conduct that causes a household member to reasonably believe that he is in danger of receiving an immediate battery.
- B. Whoever commits assault against a household member is guilty of a petty misdemeanor.

30-3-13. Aggravated assault against a household member.

- A. Aggravated assault against a household member consists of:
 - (1) unlawfully assaulting or striking at a household member with a deadly weapon; or
 - (2) willfully and intentionally assaulting a household member with intent to commit any felony.
- B. Whoever commits aggravated assault against a household member is guilty of a fourth degree felony.

30-3-14. Assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony.

- A. Assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony consists of any person assaulting a household member with intent to kill or commit any murder, mayhem, criminal sexual penetration in the first, second or third degree, robbery, kidnapping, false imprisonment or burglary.
- B. Whoever commits assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony is guilty of a third degree felony.

30-3-15. Battery against a household member.

- A. Battery against a household member consists of the unlawful, intentional touching or application of force to the person of a household member, when done in a rude, insolent or angry manner.
- B. Whoever commits battery against a household member is guilty of a petty misdemeanor.
- C. Upon conviction pursuant to this section, an offender shall be required to participate in and complete a domestic violence offender treatment or intervention program approved by the children, youth and families department pursuant to rules promulgated by the department that define the criteria for such programs.
- D. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, if a sentence imposed pursuant to this section is suspended or deferred in whole or in part, the period of probation may extend beyond three hundred sixty-four days but may not exceed two years. If an offender violates a condition of probation, the court may impose any sentence that the court could originally have imposed and credit shall not be given for time served by the offender on probation; provided that the total period of incarceration shall not exceed three hundred sixty-four days and the combined period of incarceration and probation shall not exceed two years.

30-3-16. Aggravated battery against a household member.

- A. Aggravated battery against a household member consists of the unlawful touching or application of force to the person of a household member with intent to injure that person or another.
- B. Whoever commits aggravated battery against a household member by inflicting an injury to that person that is not likely to cause death or great bodily harm, but that does cause painful temporary disfigurement or temporary loss or impairment of the functions of any member or organ of the body, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- C. Whoever commits aggravated battery against a household member by inflicting great bodily harm or doing so with a deadly weapon or doing so in any manner whereby great bodily harm or death can be inflicted, is guilty of a third degree felony.
- D. Upon conviction pursuant to Subsection B of this section, an offender shall be required to participate in and complete a domestic violence offender treatment or intervention program approved by the children, youth and families department pursuant to rules promulgated by the department that define the criteria for such programs.
- E. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, if a sentence imposed pursuant to the provisions of Subsection B of this section is suspended or deferred in whole or in part, the period of probation may extend beyond three hundred sixty-four days but may not exceed two years. If an offender violates a condition of probation, the court may impose any sentence that the court could originally

have imposed and credit shall not be given for time served by the offender on probation; provided that the total period of incarceration shall not exceed three hundred sixty-four days and the combined period of incarceration and probation shall not exceed two years.

30-7-17. Multiple convictions of battery or aggravated battery.

- A. Whoever commits three offenses of battery against a household member as provided in Section 30-3-15 MNSA 1978 or aggravated battery against a household member as provided in Subsection B of Section 30-13-16 NMSA 1978, or any combination thereof, when the household member is a spouse, a former spouse, a co-parent of a child or a person with whom the offender has had a continuing personal relationship is guilty of a fourth degree felony.
- B. Whoever commits four or more offenses of battery against a household member as provided in Section 30-3-15 NMSA 1978 or aggravated battery against a household member as provided in Subsection B of Section 30-3-16 NMSA 1978, or any combination thereof, when the household member is a spouse, a former spouse, a co-parent of a child or a person with whom the offender has had a continuing personal relationship is guilty of a third degree felony.
- C. For the purpose of determining the number of offenses committed, each offense must have been committed after conviction for the preceding offense.

30-3-18. Criminal damage to property of household member; deprivation of property of household member.

- A. Criminal damage to the property of a household member consists of intentionally damaging real, personal, community or jointly owned property of a household member with the intent to intimidate, threaten, or harass that household member.
- B. Whoever commits criminal damage to the property of a household member is guilty of a misdemeanor, except that when the damage to the household member's interest in the property amounts to more than one thousand dollars (\$1000), the offender is guilty of a fourth degree felony.
- C. Deprivation of the property of a household member consists of intentionally depriving a household member of the use of separate, community or jointly owned personal property of the household member with the intent to intimidate or threaten that household member.
- D. Whoever commits deprivation of the property of a household member is guilty of a misdemeanor.
