MARCH 29, 2023

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Health Council Gathering Theme: No Borders



The objective of the meeting was to engage, share and learn from one another by breaking from our borders and boxes of confinement to support capacity building and collaboration with one another. The purpose of the March 29th Gathering was centered around NO BORDERS. The intent of this virtual gathering was to allow NE Region Health Councils to hear from one another about what they're doing, to address health priorities, and learn about new resources to support mental and behavioral health.

Bringing together health councils elevates and refreshes the everyday experience by providing a larger pool of ideas. We heard from three county health councils and got a behind the scenes look into how 988 operates. These presentations increase our awareness of what else is happening in New Mexico.

It's easier to see a bigger picture when we shift our focus beyond the borders of our individual counties. A gathering of health councils cultivates an opportunity to connect with peers facing similar challenges.

Shaking off Borders through Wellness

To take care of ourselves before we settled into the rest of the day of collaboration and content, this wellness activity had two parts: an energizing movement, as physical manifestation of breaking free, and stretching, since we move within our range of motion, but perhaps don't always get incorporated into our usual activities.



To get everyone moving and counting at the same time together, we did a pattern of four moves: 8 shakes with the right hand, left hand, right foot, left foot a total of five times to Taylor Swift's song "Shake it Off."



Stretching can really help our posture and reduce stress and stiffness.

Heather led the group in four stretches: chin tilts, neck stretches, wrist stretches, and shoulder rolls.

GUADALUPE

Shelly Eiland, health council co-coordinator, is working to establish a new EMT license category for nurses as a very promising idea to address limited emergency healthcare access. Currently, nurses with EMT basic licenses cannot practice as registered nurses on ambulances. Shelly met with the NM EMS Bureau Chief to discuss feasibility.

988 Presentation

What is 988?

988 is a coordinated national effort to support 911 crisis intervention diversion for behavioral health emergencies as of July 16, 2022

You can call for any kind of emotional distress OR if you are worried about a loved one.

80% of calls go to the New Mexico Crisis and Access Line (NMCAL).

How does it work?

Callers hear a greeting while they are routed, by the area code of their phone number (not geolocation), to a local network of trained crisis counselors.

Texting connects to Lifeline crisis centers. Texters are provided a pre-survey that identifies their main area of concern. If they have to wait, a wait-time message will appear.

Take Aways

- Mobile Crisis Teams can be dispatched from the 988 call center and are operated by behavioral health providers to provide acute mental health crisis stabilization.
- Crisis Triage Centers are also available to provide crisis stabilization in a safe nonjudgmental environment. (La Sala in Santa Fe, Dona Ana Crisis Triage Center in Las Cruces. and Crisis Stabilization Unit in Albuquerque CARE on campus.
